The game was truly full of excitement! At the conclusion of the hour-long game, the score was deadlocked at 5-5 and was decided by a 4-3 penalty kick shootout in favor of the staff! Huge shoutouts to the students who keep this husky tradition going, the staff that volunteer their time to make it happen, local businesses who contribute prizes, and the Olean Schools Foundation who helped offset the cost of apparel the students receive for participating in the event. All funds for this event stay local to help those with housing insecurity, the food pantry, and a scholarship students who participate in the event are eligible to apply for. Homeless Huskies represents the best of what Olean is about and we hope this tradition only continues to grow!

Dignity and Belonging

Dignity for all students continues to be a focus across the Olean City School District. Since going into effect in 2012, New York State's Dignity for All Students Act seeks to provide public elementary and secondary school students with a safe and supportive environment free from discrimination, intimidation, taunting, harassment, and bullying. The Dignity Act sets the expectation that each school provides instruction in civility, citizenship, and character education by expanding the concepts of tolerance, respect for others and dignity. This includes awareness and sensitivity in relations of all people. Some examples include race, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, mental or physical abilities, sexual orientations, and gender. OCSD has charged all buildings to ensure that The Dignity Act will be an integral part of our schoolwide planning to ensure students are not harassed or discriminated against.

In collaboration with this work, East View came together to look for ways to grow our building level instruction and character education in ways that directly teach awareness and sensitivity to a variety of groups of people. East View has been working hard to bring a greater understanding surrounding a variety of cultures and leaders from various times and places in history. Both our MTSS (Multi-Tiered System of Supports) and New York State's Culturally Responsive Framework have guided us in our efforts to design an environment that welcomes and celebrates all. Monthly recognitions honoring various groups who have faced and overcome adversity are on display in our hallways, along with our very own News Crew featuring the monthly celebration schoolwide. A "Leader Hall" also features eleven people of note throughout history that have shown habits students learn while exploring their "Leader in Me" curriculum. A collection of read-alouds for grades PreK-Third are shared to explore and discuss the stories of these individuals. Discussions surrounding the content of each shared story affords students an opportunity to look within themselves for

character traits allowing them to flourish. Some examples include determination, teamwork, seeking first to understand, and celebrating uniqueness. We want to ensure that our school and classrooms are safe and welcoming environments in which students can focus on learning while feeling accepted and supported.

Additionally, building-wide presentations and assemblies are also becoming an important part of our work. Just prior to Thanksgiving, we celebrated American Indian Heritage Month with a special visit from the Seneca Dancers whose dancing and story telling provided students and staff alike with enriching experiences that highlight the beauty and importance of Indigenous culture and traditions.

East View looks forward to learning and growing within this work. We are always looking for additional voices from all backgrounds and welcome any ideas and discussion pieces to better our work.
