From the Superintendent

District Capital Project Reported On Schedule & Within Budget

Hope this note finds everyone well and enjoying the autumn season. It is perhaps the best time of the year: Football, homecoming, pumpkins, and walking on those brisk, cool, sunny days enjoying the fall colors. Soon it will be Thanksgiving with family and friends; surely these simple pleasures are the best.

Thanksgiving is a time to reflect on how thankful we need to be for all the wonderful things in our lives. We have been truly blessed at the Olean City School District in so many ways. Not only are we busy improving the Olean City School District classroom instruction, but also our District is being transformed by a wonderful capital-building project. This project is presently on schedule and within budget. The \$16,150,000 referendum authorization addresses issues at all of our District schools and buildings.

East View Elementary School is experiencing the most significant improvements where we are focusing on improving the educational environment and ensuring greater safety. To accomplish these two goals we are renovating and renewing the entire school by changing the interior design from a 1970's open concept to a more secure and educationally sound design required of today's schools. The main office is being built at the front of the building for better safety and security. A new roof is being installed, and a new and improved HVAC system will create both a better learning environment and a more efficient heating and ventilation system.

Washington West Elementary School has received a new gas emergency generator and is receiving a new electrical service infrastructure. A new roof replacement is scheduled for the summer of 2019 along with updates to the glass block windows in the gymnasium.

Olean Intermediate Middle School witnessed a number of improvements over the summer of 2018. The entire roof was replaced and there were updates to the pool's dehumidification system. This coming summer will see a new parking lot installed at OIMS.

Olean High School has experienced significant improvements and upgrades in the area of new flooring on all four floors in the building. Terrazzo has replaced the outdated and gloomy tile on the second and third floors to coordinate with the first floor, which was refurbished in a previous project. The basement will be receiving a new epoxy floor. We are in the process of installing all new hallway lights, which really brighten up the environment. Additionally, updated wall tile is being installed on all floors, and all of the bathrooms are being modernized and refurbished to accommodate our changing times. The project is giving the High School a new face lift that has been terribly overdue.

We are pleased to report that the \$16,150,000 capital project is, at this time, on schedule and within budget. We are proud of how many local contractors we have been able to employ on this project and want to thank them for a job well done to date. We were fortunate to have mostly local contractors working on this project as it helps the economy of our region. Additionally, we want to thank the residents of the entire Olean City School District for their support with this capital-building project. You have allowed us to create school environments in which our students will be both safe and can receive an excellent education for years to come. Principals, faculty, staff, students, and parents should all be recognized for their flexibility, tolerance, and patience during this project. Thank you! We all are very fortunate to work and live in such a supportive and friendly community.

'Talk Abroad' Improves Students' Language Skills

JCC 2510 / 2520 French and Spanish students will be trying out their functional language skills in a very different way this year. Students are learning language through themes, topics and essential questions. At the end of the thematic unit, students are required to complete a thirty minute interactive conversation with a native speaker through our online Talk Abroad resource through JCC. Students may choose a speaker of their choice from many different areas around the globe. Last year our students successfully piloted this program for JCC. Students were amazed at their abilities to function at a reasonable proficiency level.

This approach to evaluating students is powerful because it expands their views of language while making the educational experience more engaging. Language is not something to be studied, but a way of seeing, understanding and communicating about the world in which we live.



Program Enables Spanish Students To Visit Area

Once again, this past summer, area families were invited to participate in hosting Spanish students from the beautiful Basque region of Spain. Students arrived in July and stayed four weeks with host families. Students took part in area activities and local festivals as well as visiting Niagara Falls, Darien Lake and NYC. 

FAMILY ID: ONLINE SPORTS REGISTRATION!

We are excited to announce that beginning this winter sports season, all sports sign-ups will be done through online registration using the platform Family ID. Family ID is a secure registration format that provides you with an easy, user friendly way to sign your child up for sports, and eliminates missing or lost paperwork and repetitious forms.

Your child will still be required to have a current physical on file, and the sports forms you need will be right online for your easy access. You can sign in and check on your child's status of sports approval at any time. You will only need to register your child once a year. The information will be saved on your personal account, so you don't have to re-register to do the health update before each season if your child plays multiple sports/multiple seasons.


Then...follow these steps!

 (If it is your 1st time you will need to create an account—if not, you can log in) Be sure to select I AGREE to the terms when you create your account!
- 3. To create your account, you will need your email address and to create a password.
- 4. You will receive an email with a link to activate your account—if you don't, be sure to check your junk or spam folder!
- 5. Click on your link in your activation Email, which will log you in to FamilyID.com.
- Once in the registration form, complete the information requested—all fields with a red (*) are required to have answers.
- 7. Click SAVE & CONTINUE when your form is complete.
- 8. Review your form & click SUBMIT.
