

Dear Residents of the Olean City School District:

First, we truly are grateful to all of the wonderful members in our Olean community. It was everyone's resilience and teamwork which has allowed our community to navigate the pandemic. We particularly want to thank our students and their parents who were all extremely cooperative and had to endure a very difficult year. Additionally, we need to recognize all of our employees for their incredible effort during the COVID-19 pandemic. For over a year, our staff took on extra cleaning duties and delivering of meals to name just a few of the many additional tasks required to keep us functioning. Our teachers worked around the clock with students in person and in the remote model of instruction. We all answered the call to help keep our community safe and continue education while following the New York State and Cattaraugus County guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19. This has been a monumental task for all, especially for parents. Thank you for your support and understanding.

We also need to thank the federal and state governments for their financial assistance during the pandemic and the stimulus money that we have been informed we will receive. This assistance has allowed the Olean City School District to go out at a 0 % increase to the local tax share. To address the ever changing and fluid economic landscape, the Olean City School District is posturing to remain fiscally flexible throughout the recovery period and until the country has made a full recovery. We will be presenting a budget that requires a **0% tax levy increase** to the voters on Tuesday, May 18th.

To ensure the safety and welfare of the general public, due to concerns surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the school budget vote will be at the Olean Intermediate Middle School gymnasium this year. This will allow us to socially distance and keep everyone safe. All registered voters in the Olean City School District will be voting on a budget with a 0% tax levy increase. Also on this ballot will be names of candidates running to represent our community on the Board of Education. There are two seats available on the nine-member Board of Education. Registered voters will vote on the school budget and for two candidates for the Board of Education. Voters will also be

able to vote for three seats open to serve as a Trustee on the Olean Public Library Board.

Prior to the pandemic, we had a number of new programs and items included in the 2020-2021 budget which were removed. We are fortunate this year to be able to return those items in the budget. Some of those budgetary items include a variety of teaching positions, equipment purchases, increase in technology, and four elementary Math Teaching Assistants. This can be accomplished without an increase in the tax levy.

This will be the seventh time in eight years the district has not requested a tax levy increase. The district understands the economic climate we are all living in and wants to be sensitive to the taxpayers. We will be able to balance the 2021-2022 school year budget by appropriating \$50,000.00 from our Retirement Reserve Fund and \$600,000.00 from the Unrestricted Fund Balance. This budget was accomplished by responsible use of the district's fund balance to reach a budget that ensured a **zero tax levy increase**. Our goal in budgeting is to minimize economic stress on our local businesses and taxpayers while maintaining an excellent educational program.

Once again, we want to thank the residents of the Olean City School District for their continued support as well as the dedication of our faculty, staff, administration, and the Board of Education. The district wishes to recognize all of the hard work and dedication by the families that entrust us with their children. We have come a long way together. Knowing the character of the people of our community, we will pull together and make it through this difficult time for the good of our school, community, state, and country.

As we always say, "it takes all the Huskies to pull the sled!"

Thank you all for your dedication to and support of the Olean City School District.

Explanation of Three Part Budget Presentation - Chapter 436 of the Laws of 1997 require public school boards of education to present the proposed budget in three parts. As a result, this presentation is organized around the following components; administrative, capital, and program:

Administrative Component: Includes expenses associated with the operation of the school board, superintendent's office, and business office. Includes salaries and benefits for

all certified administrators and supervisors who spend a majority of their time performing administrative duties, consulting costs not directly related to instructional programs, and all other activities that are administrative in nature.

Capital Component: Includes debt service for all facilities financed by bonds and notes of the district, lease expenditures, costs resulting from judgments in tax certiorari proceedings, awards from court judgments, administrative orders and settled claims, cost of construction, acquisition, reconstruction, rehabilitation, and improvements of school buildings, all expenses associated with custodial and maintenance salaries and benefits, service contracts, supplies, utilities, maintenance, and repair of school facilities.

Program Component: Includes salaries/ benefits of teachers and any school administrator or supervisor who spend a majority of their time performing teaching duties, and all transportation operating expenses.





Olean High School's DECA (Distributive Educational Clubs of America) finds success at 2021 New York State Career Conference.

Six individuals from Olean High School attended New York States Career Conference. These six individuals competed virtually and their performance was amazing.

There was so much that had to happen this year for our students to find success. They first had to test at the Regional level. These six students performed academically so well at this level that they had earned a spot to compete at the New York State level.

For the New York State competition, these students had to test again in their competitive area and then do a virtual role play. All competitors were given a scenario that needed to be solved, and the students had to individually and professionally share his/her ideas and plans within a video. Students had to then upload a video to their advisors (Sue Frentz and Christine Stavish). The advisors had to review the video and upload the students' complete video to the judges (experts in the area). This was not an easy task for our students; the competitors were timed while reviewing and dissecting a business scenario. After digesting all the material, the students had only one opportunity to create their video for the judges to critique. Most of the students had to perform twice as they were given two different scenarios to share their business expertise.



This was Aaron Aiello's first year competing in DECA, and we are proud to share how wonderful Aaron did at the Regional Level to land him a competitive spot at DECA's State Competition. continue to perform and do a great job in his junior and senior years at OHS.



Mr. Knapp's Music Class

Almost every person in the world has a song or album that really speaks to them and they connect with. Whether this connection is through the lyrics that the performer sings, the instrumentals, or the overall effect that it has put upon their lives. In Music class, the 7th graders are working on





creating a new album cover for a song or album of their choice that has made an impact on who they are today. The main focus of this assignment was for me to learn more about the students and their interests in music, but it also was a different creative outlook to what they listen to in their day-to-day lives.

The first step the students took was to identify a song or album that they enjoy. I believe in letting students tell me exactly what they listen to in order to better understand how I am able to change the curriculum to fit what they enjoy. The students then began their drawings in which they looked at the original cover, or chose parts of the music that spoke to them. Some students went with a different approach by drawing the performer of the song, such as Mykel Rivera's drawing of NBA YoungBoy. Another approach that a student took was by drawing how the music video depicted the song Zanna Budaj did this approach with "That's My Best Friend" by Ec Marv in which the video takes place at a carnival.

The students then wrote paragraphs about why they chose that specific song/ album and what it meant to them. These ranged everywhere from "I like the song so I chose it," to telling me personal connections that the song has to their lives. The students finally researched about the artist and found out information about them that they may not have known. Each class worked as a team and created a rubric for what needed to be included in this portion. This gave the students the ability to choose exactly how they were to be graded, giving them more opportunities at decisions.

Overall, the project gave me the ability to see what the students enjoy, and it gave them the ability to express their musical interests in a different way other than just telling me. The students seemed to enjoy being able to show how creative they are and having the opportunity to learn more about their favorite artist or band.

The Heart of a Husky




Through a partnership with Cattaraugus Allegany BOCES and the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, students in the Olean City School District were offered an opportunity to participate in a virtual field trip called "BALTO: A History of Humans, Huskies & Health in Alaska." During this interactive virtual field trip, students learned about the deadly diphtheria epidemic in Nome, Alaska in 1925, and how twenty dogsled teams made up of huskies were used to deliver lifesaving medicine. Balto led the last dogsled team into Nome which finished a 6 day 674-mile journey across Alaska during brutal winter conditions.

Along with the virtual field trip, students also read stories and informational text about Balto, another

famous husky dog named Togo, husky dogs as a breed, and the famous dogsled race called the Iditarod. Teachers and students were able to connect our school mascot with such traits as determination, perseverance, fortitude, loyalty, and good work ethic. As we like to say, it takes all the huskies to pull the sled! And with the heart of a husky, we can persevere through trials and overcome obstacles together as a team!
