Fall Staff Development Day

On Friday, October 21st, the Olean City School District held its Fall Staff Development Day for all staff to attend professional learning events on various topics. The main event for all staff was attending a keynote address by Brian Mendler called “That One Kid: Changing Lives One Student at a Time.” During this heartfelt message, Brian Mendler told his story of being a special education student with a severe learning disability and severe ADHD, his recovery from addiction, and his work as a special education teacher of students with severe behavioral needs. His story was told from the perspective of a student who struggled in school and yearned to have a sense of belonging and strong relationships with teachers and classmates. He inspired staff to build strong relationships with all students in order to support their social-emotional learning as well as their academic learning. Brian also hosted a breakout session called “Watch Your Mouth: Non-Negotiables for Success with Your Toughest Kids” and then a question-and-answer session for classroom and special education teachers, teacher assistants, and teacher aides. The breakout session provided strategies for teachers, teacher assistants and teacher aides to use to build relationships with all students.



Another professional learning event offered on the October 21st Staff Development Day was “Engaging Students in Every Classroom” presented by Susan Hentz. This professional learning event was attended by classroom and special education teachers, and teacher assistants in grades 4-7. Susan Hentz led a lively session showing teachers and teacher assistants how to create highly engaged classrooms by utilizing active learning strategies. The active learning strategies presented to teachers were student-centered and connected the learning through reflection, movement, and discussion. The active learning strategies taught to staff are supported by brain research, and help students increase their energy level and assist their brains to store and retrieve information in efficient ways.

Leader in Me is a social-emotional learning framework that provides students with instruction on how to become leaders in their own lives. Pictured above are East View and Washington West Elementary Teachers engaged in designing a leadership school that grows leaders by instructing students in the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People, incorporating leadership language into classroom routines and interactions, and providing students a voice in creating a culture of leadership.

eSports team started at the High School



This fall saw the introduction of our first eSports team at Olean High School.

Powered by PlayVS, the official platform and league for eSports, the 20 Olean students who made up the team were able to compete against other schools throughout New York state in a variety of online video games. Spearheaded by Olean City School District's Director of Technology, Michael Martel and Information Technology Coordinator, Marc Friends, the Olean team, led by Coach/Technology Teacher, Scott Rucinski, was able to compete in a series of online games three times a week. The team utilized the school's new technology gaming room on Tuesdays through Thursdays

after school, participating in an eSports league which consisted of an 8 week-long season. There will be another season in the spring, culminating with PlayVS Cup to close the year. The team used PCs to compete in Rocket League and League of Legends and Nintendo Switch consoles to participate in Super Smash Bros. and Mario Kart. The PlayVS platform controls the scheduling, keeps track of all the stats and even has an online chat feature to keep the teams connected throughout competition. Players compete solo or in a group, as they take on teams from other schools in games ranging from fantasy to sport.

Olean eSports coach said this about the league, "The eSports league helps debunk the widely held perception that gamers are lazy kids who are holed up in the bedrooms all day playing video games and wasting their life away. While the main point behind playing a video game is obviously to have fun, the gaming industry has evolved so much that most of the games nowadays require an immense level of technical skill, concentration, strategy, and critical thinking. All of which can be transferred into today's classroom environment and benefit our student's growth and development."

Environmental Science Class



The co-taught Environmental Science Class learned about the Tragedy of the Commons: where individuals neglect the well-being of society in the pursuit of personal gain. 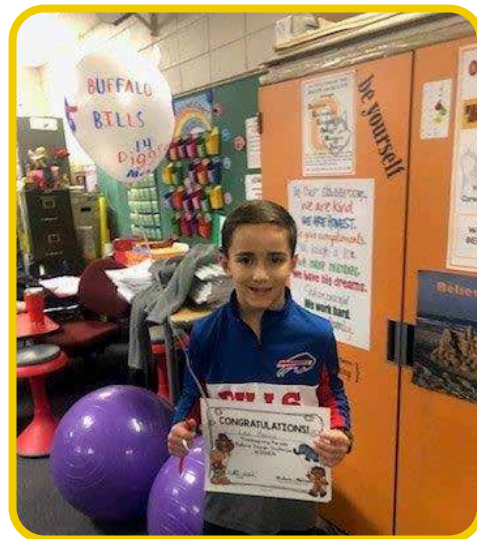
