SUMMARY & BACKGROUND On March 11, 2021, the President signed into law the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (ARP). ARP makes available \$122.8 billion nationally in a third round of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. New York State has been allocated nearly \$9 billion under the ARP Act's Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund. The ARP Act requires that a minimum of \$8.09 billion (90 percent) be allocated to LEAs, including charter schools and Special Act School Districts that are LEAs. Pursuant to the terms of the ARP Act, LEA allocations have been calculated using the relative shares of grants awarded under Title I, Part A of the ESEA for the most recent federal fiscal year (2020). Each eligible LEA's ARP-ESSER allocation may be found [HERE](#). Under section 2001(d)(2) of ARP Act of 2021, each State Educational Agency (SEA) must make ARP-ESSER allocations to LEAs in an expedited and timely manner and, to the extent practicable, not later than 60 days after the SEA receives its ARP-ESSER funds. The first portion of ARP-ESSER Funds was awarded to states on March 24, 2021, and 60 days from that day is May 24, 2021. The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) has taken the position that an SEA makes allocations when it authorizes the LEA to begin to obligate funds in accordance with its needs. To enable New York State's LEAs to begin to obligate ARP-ESSER funds by USDE's May 24, 2021 deadline, the application for LEA 90% base ARP-ESSER allocations is being administered by NYSED as a two-part application process:

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 1: The first step was for each LEA to submit signed assurances to NYSED by May 24, 2021. Upon receipt of signed LEA assurances, NYSED provided an email notice to the LEA of substantially approvable application status. Upon receipt of such notice, LEAs were able to begin obligating their allocation of 90% base ARP-ESSER funds.

ARP-ESSER Application – Part 2: The second step will be the submission of a full application and budget by the LEA. NYSED will issue a Grant Award Notice (GAN) to the LEA after the LEA's application is fully reviewed and approved by NYSED. Part 2 will address several of the plan-related assurances an LEA must provide in Part 1 of the application process.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to reserve at least 20% of their 90% ARP-ESSER allocation to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care. Funds must be fully liquidated by October 31, 2024. **Project Number** The project number stem for the program is: *ESSER: 5880 - 21 - XXXX*. This number should be used on the appropriate FS-10 budget form. **Submission Deadline** Completed applications are due by **August 31, 2021** (with extensions by request), and will be reviewed on a rolling basis. Please note that applications must be submitted and fully approved by no later than March 23, 2022. LEAs that have not been issued a Grant Award Notice by that time will be at risk of having their ARP-ESSER allocation returned to the United States Department of Education.

APPLICATION PROCESS FOR LEA ALLOCATIONS OF ARP-ESSER SEA RESERVE FUNDS The federal ARP statute requires SEAs to reserve:

not less than 5 percent of the total amount of grant funds awarded to the State (\$449.4 million) to carry out activities to address the impact of lost instructional time by supporting the implementation of evidence-based interventions;

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based summer enrichment programs; and

not less than 1 percent (\$89.9 million) to carry out the implementation of evidence-based comprehensive afterschool programs.

The 2021-22 enacted state budget directs that these required SEA set-asides be allocated as grants to specified school districts. OLEAN CITY SD 042400010000 Title VIII of Division B of the CARES Act directs the Department to carry out the Education Stabilization Fund, of which the ARP ESSER funds are a part. The Olean City School District generated input from various stakeholders by collecting needs and recommendations from parents, faculty, staff, community partners, and others. Building principals gathered input to address priorities in their schools. Directors of facilities, technology, food service, and others responsible for school operations provided recommendations for needs in their respective areas. Administrative teams met to compile these recommendations, research and develop areas to address with the use of these funds, and prioritize needs for this application. District and school groups, including committees, departments, administrators, board members, and community partners were involved in the development process. The ARP-ESSER plan was also presented in various draft forms through BOE meetings prior to submission. Presentations regarding funding plans and the implementation of project activities will be scheduled as part of board meeting presentations approximately four times per year or more as needed, as well as at relevant board committee meetings, such as Operations, Buildings and Grounds, and Audit and Finance meetings. Public comment received at board meetings as well as other feedback submitted directly to school and district administrators via phone, email, ParentSquare, or other communications will be reviewed with the appropriate board committees for consideration in the ongoing implementation of the project activities. Additional stakeholder input will be sought through school/district level groups, such as faculty, department, and committee meetings, as well as advisory groups with high school students and community partners as implementation updates are provided and discussed.

Several components of Olean's ARP-ESSER plan address prevention and mitigation strategies and can be found in the requests made under Use of Funds #17, 18, and 19. These include: School Nurse, HVAC Technician, Building Cleaner, Maintenance Worker, Outdoor Physical Education Space, Air Handler Systems, and Uninterruptible Power Supply. The services provided by these individuals and improvements to the district facilities will assist in addressing CDC guidance for safely reopening schools for in-person instruction. Combined, these expenditures total \$2,456,988.

4. **In the space provided below, please describe the data that the LEA will use to identify student needs and monitor student progress as a result of planned interventions and supports.**

The Olean City School District will use a combination of formative and benchmark assessments to monitor student progress as a result of planned interventions and supports. In grades P-7, these measures include ELA and Math benchmark data, including curriculum based measures, Star Early Literacy, Reading, and Math, IRLA (Independent Reading Level Assessment), as well as attendance data and behavioral referrals. In grades 8-12, course grades, unit assessments, attendance data, and behavioral referrals will be used. Teachers and administrators will review assessment data to monitor the progress of students receiving interventions and adjust supports as needed through a tiered intervention system. Attendance, behavioral, and course/assessment performance data will be reviewed to consider how students are meeting or not meeting grade level expectations. Based on criteria set for each (ex. 90% or better attendance, no discipline referrals, grade level performance on assessments and passing courses), students not meeting these expectations will be provided interventions in accordance with our AIS/RTI plans. These assessments and interventions are under continuous review to make sure that we are meeting students needs to the best of our ability. For example, students performing at an at-risk or intensive/emergency levels will have interventions at Tier 2 or Tier 3 provided that are suited to each intensity level and skill areas need. Regular review of data on the identified areas will help monitor students' progress until the students no longer require interventions or supports to be successful.

5. **In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA will use the funds it reserves under section 2001(e)(1) - the required reserve of 20% of funds - to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year.**

In order to address the academic impact of lost instructional time, a number of additional supports and services are requested through ARP-ESSER funds to meet students' needs. After school programming is requested for East View and Washington West Elementary Schools to provide expanded programs for students in Pre-K-3rd grade. Teacher Assistants will provide interventions and supports in the areas of 8th Grade Transition, credit recovery, and academic intervention services. In each of the three buildings in grades K-7, an RTI Intervention Specialist/Coordinator will provide and coordinate interventions, assessments, data analysis, collaborative meetings, progress monitoring, data collection, and professional learning for teachers providing Tier 1 interventions. An Occupational Therapist and Occupational Therapist Assistant will work with students in grades Pre-K through 1st grade to address fine motor, handwriting, and self-regulation interventions at Tier 1 and Tier 2. Speech pathologists will provide speech and language interventions for students in Pre-K and at the Olean Intermediate-Middle School. A 5th Grade Elementary Teacher will allow for smaller class sizes in order to better provide Tier 1 and Tier 2 interventions for students who need them. Students will receive more consistent and qualified instruction with the addition of four Building Substitute Teachers who are assigned to each school and help prevent further instructional loss in the event of teacher absences due to illness, quarantine, or other reasons. Additional reading intervention services will be provided by two Reading Specialists who will teach an extra class period to help address academic intervention needs. Combined, these expenditures in Use of Funds #15 and 16 total \$2,813,457.

6. **In the space provided below, please describe how the LEA will spend its remaining ARP ESSER funds consistent with section 2001(e)(2) - the allowable uses of funds - of the ARP Act.**

In addition to the expenditures described in question #3 and #5, Olean's ARP-ESSER application requests funds to upgrade fiber connectivity to all district locations and expand/upgrade wireless access points to have access to full internet capacity. This will support students' use of 1:1 devices in their instruction. Additionally, mental health interventions and supports are requested to assist students, along with their teachers and families. Requested are two Social Workers, a Behavioral Specialist, and a School Psychologist. Combined, these expenditures in Use of Funds #13 and 14 total \$1,207,293.

The Olean City School District is developing systems to establish an Early Warning System and strengthen MTSS strategies. Data will be reviewed for all students, by subgroups of students, and by special populations, such as students experiencing homelessness or in foster care, to consider how best to support those disproportionately impacted by the pandemic. Building and district administrators will work with teams of teachers to monitor students' progress and evaluate the effect of interventions through data meetings, MTSS planning, and intervention team meetings. A benchmark and progress monitoring data dashboard is being set up at K-7 to assist intervention teams in analyzing and responding to students' progress. The RTI Intervention Specialists/Coordinators at these three buildings will play an integral role in tracking students' progress and assist teams in ensuring that students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic are provided interventions and supports that address their needs. In grades 8-12, the Early Warning System will generate a focus list of students that the Integrated School Level Team (MTSS) will review regularly to monitor and adjust interventions to meet students' needs. We serve all students from all populations based on needs. Our district has 20.3% of students identified with disabilities and a high percentage of students from low-income families. Subgroup assessment/course performance, attendance, and behavioral data for these and other subgroups (students of color, English learners, students experiencing homelessness, and children in foster care) will be disaggregated to review and plan for the needs of students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. We do not currently have any migratory students enrolled in our district.

The Olean City School District's Reopening Plan and related documents are posted on the district website. This document is reviewed at public board meetings, and public comment is offered at every regular board meeting. Board of Education meetings are held at a minimum of once per month, with 9 meetings remaining for the 2021-22 school year (<https://www.oleanschools.org/Page/9692>). Meeting dates for the 2022-23 and 2023-24 school years (through 9/30/23) will take place at a minimum of once per month. This schedule will be published shortly after the reorganizational meeting each July. In addition, the Olean City School District operates under a committee-based board structure. Reopening plans, including the need for any revisions and input from public comment sessions and other communications, are reviewed as part of the Operations, Buildings and Grounds, and Audit and Finance board committees, which meet monthly. Updates or revisions to the plan are posted both on the website and through ParentSquare, the district's communication platform for parents and guardians. ParentSquare posts have a comment feature available to collect feedback from users. Additionally, a dedicated email for students, families, and staff is utilized to encourage questions, concerns, suggestions, and other feedback on the reopening plan (huskystrong@oleanschools.org). Reopening plan revisions are coordinated by the district in consultation with CA-BOCES and the Cattaraugus County Department of Health to reflect the most current safety recommendations available. Revisions are reviewed through the Board committee process and presented and approved at Board meetings as needed.

Our planned construction activities include the installation of new air handling units in the Gym and Music Suite at our East View Elementary Building. The current units are located in interior mechanical spaces but will be replaced with new rooftop units and duct work. The estimated cost for the East View Gym air handling unit is \$524,000 and the estimated cost for the Music Suite is \$385,000. The District will also be replacing the air handling unit in our Library at the Olean Intermediate Middle School. The estimated cost of this is \$270,000. Lastly, we will be installing drainage and new topsoil on our outdoor physical education space at East View to expand our outdoor instruction space. This will allow our students additional space outside to socially distance while learning in physical education. The estimated cost of this is \$475,220.
