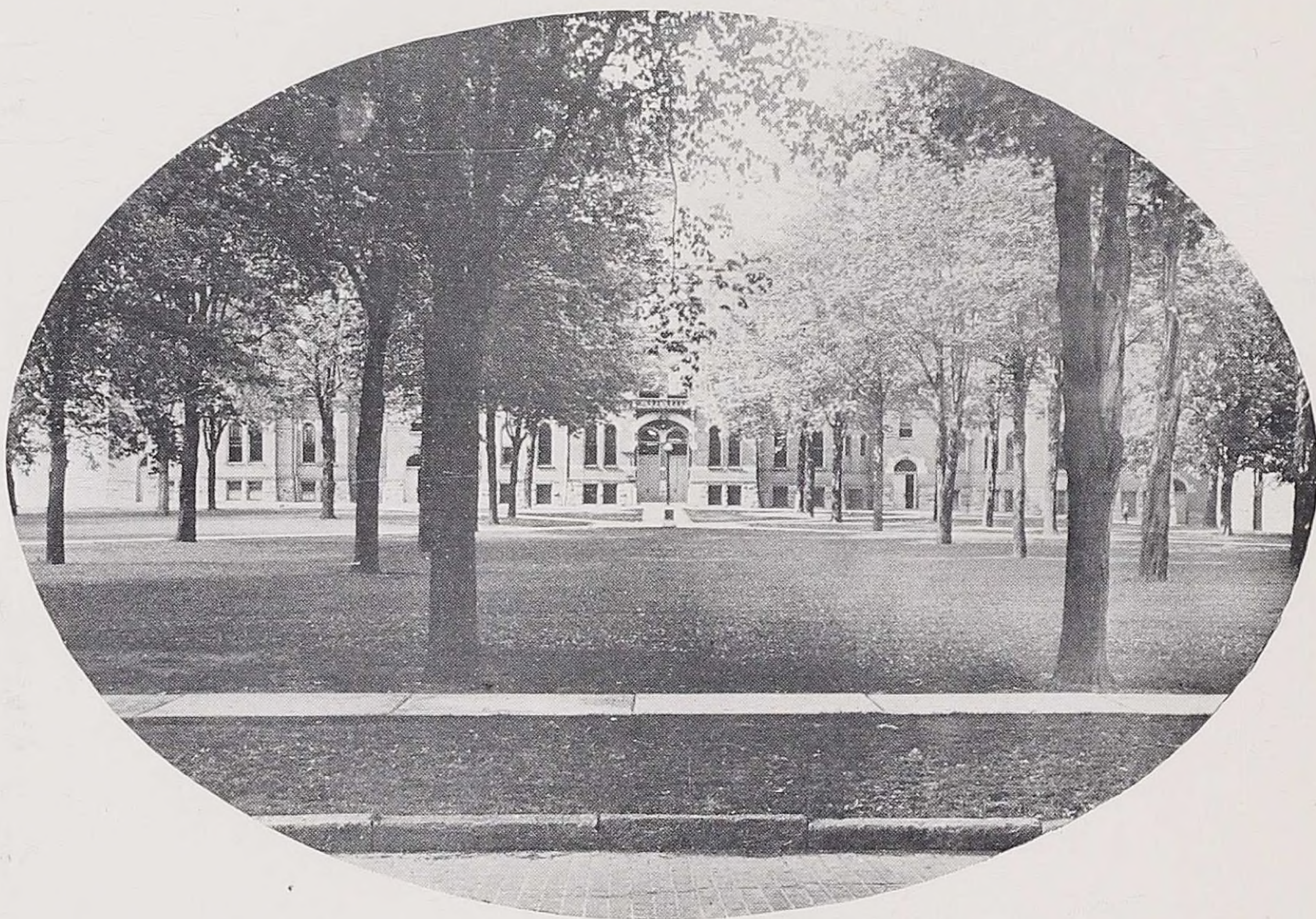

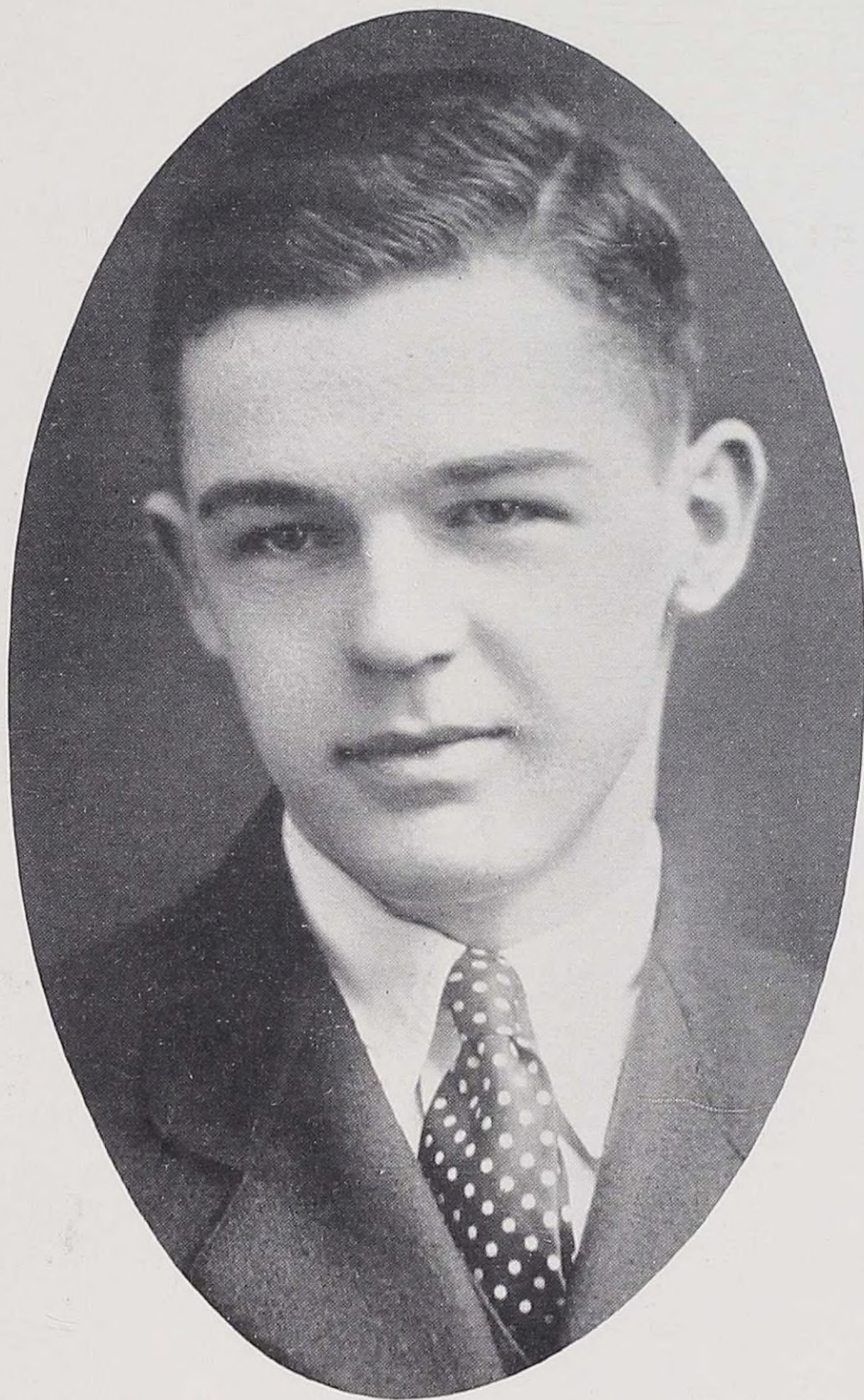

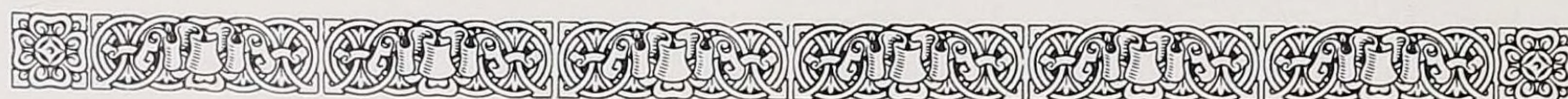

## Class History—Class of '28

We have all studied the history of Washington, Lincoln, Wilson, and last but not least—Lindbergh. That is all ancient history; now, we shall set forth a more modern history, that of the Class of '28.

When the members of this class entered into the great era of learning, few thought that within four years they would go forth on life's pathway as the next graduating class.

The election of class officers was held in Junior Study Hall with Mr. Sackett presiding. The election resulted in the following choices: John Toohey, President; Mary O'Brien, Vice-President; Mary Turner, Secretary; and Paul Fox, Treasurer. Dorothy Otto represented us in the Student Council and Miss Fitzgerald was chosen advisor. The class was not predominate in the field of athletics, but its talents were displayed in other lines, for the competitive assembly of which the play, "Country Justice," was the big factor, easily defeating our rivals, the Sophmores.

After a summer vacation, we once more resumed our studies, not as Freshmen but as Sophmores. The first important duty of the class was the election of class officers, at which time we elected Martin Donohue, President; Lenora Brown, Vice-President; Douglass Petty, secretary; and Mary Griffin, Treasurer. Nelson Torrey and Bessie Stives were our representatives in Student Council. Miss Wade was chosen advisor.

In the line of athletics we broke into the limelight with LeRoy Spears on the football team and Rudolph Bergsten on the track team, both receiving the coveted "O". In inter-class sports, the class also shone, for the boys basketball team won, thereby gaining the first leg on the inter-class trophy.

The Sophmore Class held a very pretty and successful party in the High School Gym on November 14.

In September, 1926, we started forth toward the third milestone. Our first problem was to select as officers of the Junior Class: Frank Foster, President; Lenora Brown, Vice-President; Helen Hurwitz, Secretary; Ned Mountain, Treasurer. LeRoy Spears, Jane Karl and Rosemary Quinlan were our choices for the Student Council. Miss Wombough, who had long guided the destinies of the Juniors, was chosen faculty advisor.

The competitive assembly, March 23, brought forth the play, "The Red Lamp", which was judged superior to the play given by the Seniors, and was chosen for the All-Class Entertainment. The outstanding social event of the year was the Junior-Senior Prom, held in the K. of C. ball-room, on June 20, 1927. It was said to be the most successful prom held in years.

In the line of sports we produced seven letter men. In football, LeRoy Spears; in basketball, Oscar Cain and Harold O'Donnell; in track, Rudolph Bergsten, LeRoy Spears, Theadore Tapp and Robert Tifft. In



the inter-class basketball league the boys were again successful, obtaining the second leg on the cup.

In September, 1927, our class returned to school to finish the last short stretch of the high school journey. Mr. Sackett called a meeting of the Seniors, at which time William Kulp was elected President; Irene Rouse, Vice-President; Ned Mountain, Secretary; and Jane Karl, Treasurer. To Lenora Brown, Bethia Conrad, Frank Kamler and John Toohey was intrusted the task of representing the class on the Student Council.

Congress, this year, was run by a special Journalism class with Mrs. Larkin and Miss Zuber as instructors. The Editors chosen were Lucille Alsworth, Editor-in-chief; William Kulp, Advising Editor; John Toohey, Managing Editor; and Jack Luther, Business Manager. The associate editors were: Charles Gelder, Alen Geuder, Roland Lollar, Walburga McAdam, LaVerne McDermott, Ned Mountain, Rosemary Quinlan, Mary Turner and Virginia Watkins. The class aided materially, not only in running the weekly Congress, but also in publishing this year book.

It is not often that a class predominates in the field of sports as well as in social activities. Ours was a most successful class from every viewpoint. In athletics, we had in football, Handley; Herron; Captain-elect, Lollar; O'Donnell; O'Hern, Manager; Spears, Tapp and Tifft. Our basketball team had a brilliant season, surpassing any other previous records, winning 17 of their 20 games. They first won the county championship by defeating Salamanca in the play-off at the Armory. Next they went to Buffalo as a representative in the sectional contests. There the O. H. S. defeated Middleport and Kenmore, leaving only Masten Park of Buffalo in the path of their march to the state finals. Masten, however, proved too strong and Olean bowed in defeat for the third and last time, but only with the resolution to win the N. Y. State Championship next year. The Senior Basketball letter men were Oscar Cain, Bill Kulp, Jack Luther, manager; Harold O'Donnell, and Toddy Tapp.

Following in the footsteps of a wonderful basket-ball season the track team was also able to establish an enviable record. The Seniors won the Inter-Class Track meet this year. Following this meet Olean triumphed in both the Tri-City and County contests and placed third in the State Sectional. Track letters given only to Seniors were: Rudolph Bergsten, Roland Lollar, Jack Luther, Ned Mountain, Manager; Theodore Tapp and Robert Tifft.

The class of 1928 broke away from the seal ring, which had been used for so many years. This year it was decided to have a signet ring of unusual beauty and intricate design.

The dramatic ability of the class was displayed in its one act play, "The Valient", which was deemed of sufficient merit to win the competitive assembly and be sent to Ithaca, New York to compete in the Little Theatre tournament for one-act plays.

It was decided that the Senior Play would be "Once There Was a Princess." It was presented in the Haven Theatre, May 31, 1928. It



enjoyed notable success. The cast included Irene Rouse, John Kneiser, Vera Sturm, Elizabeth Shoff, Rowena Sheldon, Jane Gibbs, Margaret Humes, Mary Turner, Edna Shankman, Frank Kamler, LaVerne McDermott, John Toohey, Wilma Brenner, Anna Barbaro, Mildred Becker, Justin Harder, Margareta Kersperskie, Marion Foster, Gertrude Blessing and Charles Rosokoff.

A chapter of the New York State Honorary Society was chosen on May 11. The members were Doris Kamery, Lucille Alsworth, Lenora Brown, Ruth Kayes, Margaret Kehr, Rosemary Quinlan, Walburga McAdam, Frank Kamler, William Kulp, John Toohey, Jack Luther, and Ned Mountain.

Wayside held its annual Spring Party at the K. of C., May 25, 1928. It was the last social gathering of the season and was a most successful and enjoyable party and this brings to an end a most successful Senior, as well as High School career.

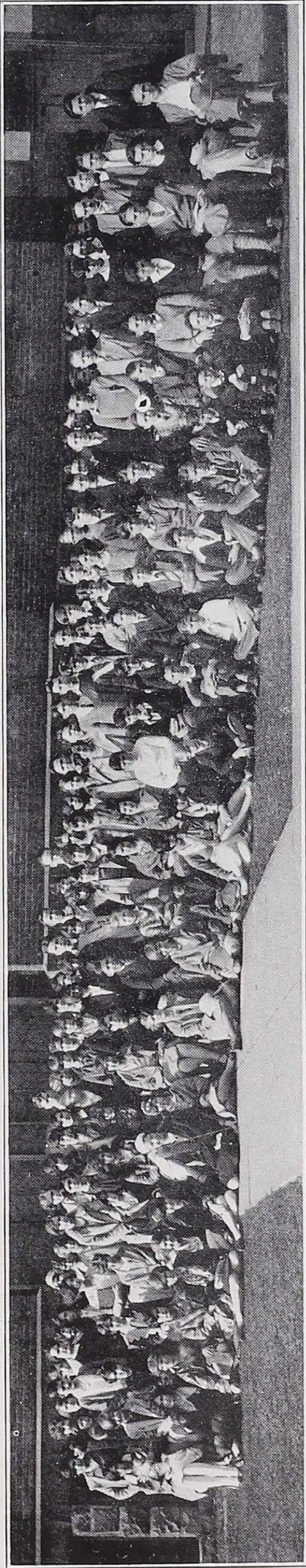
which we displayed our best talents was given at an entertainment, the proceeds of which were used to send the cast of "The Valiant" to Ithaca.

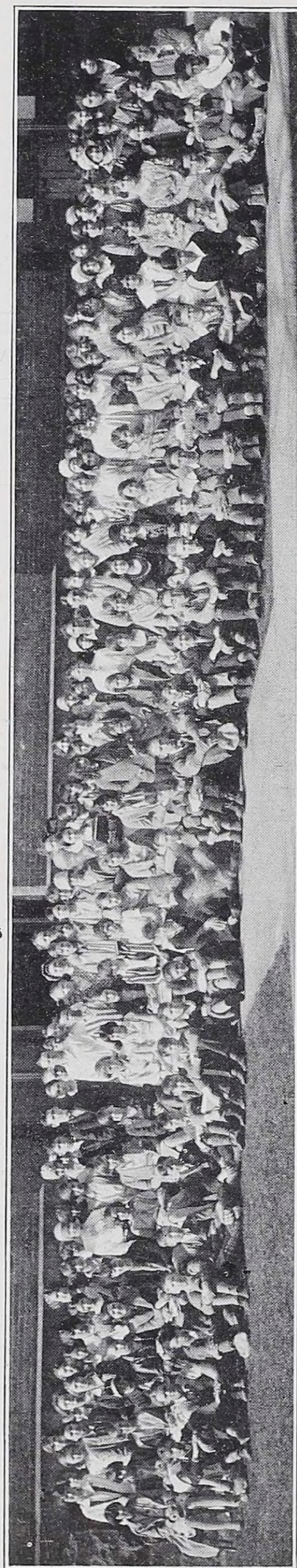
#### Class Activities

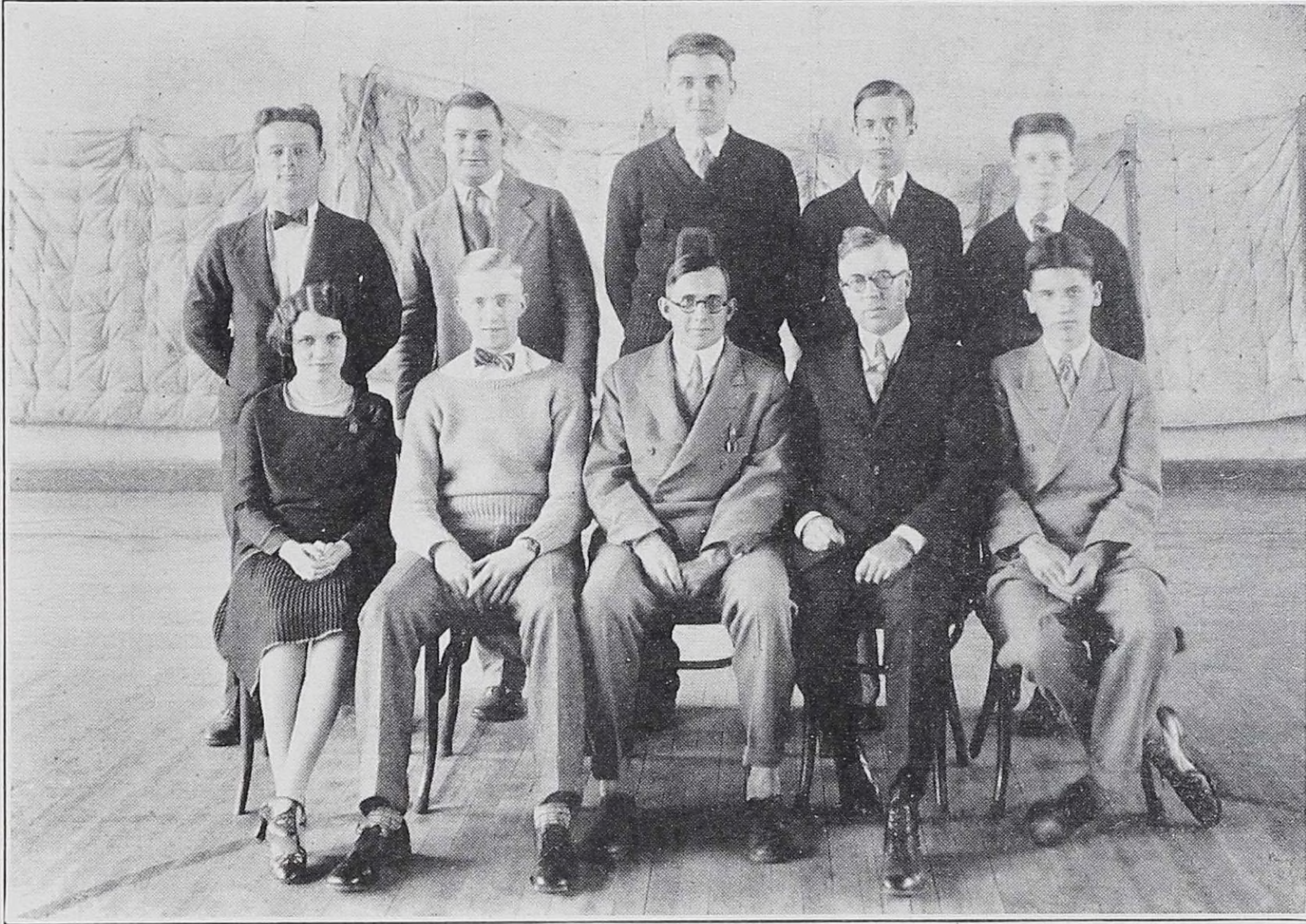
The Freshmen, from the first announcement, displayed the liveliest interest in the party given the students by the P. T. A., and secured their 200 tickets before the time limit expired.

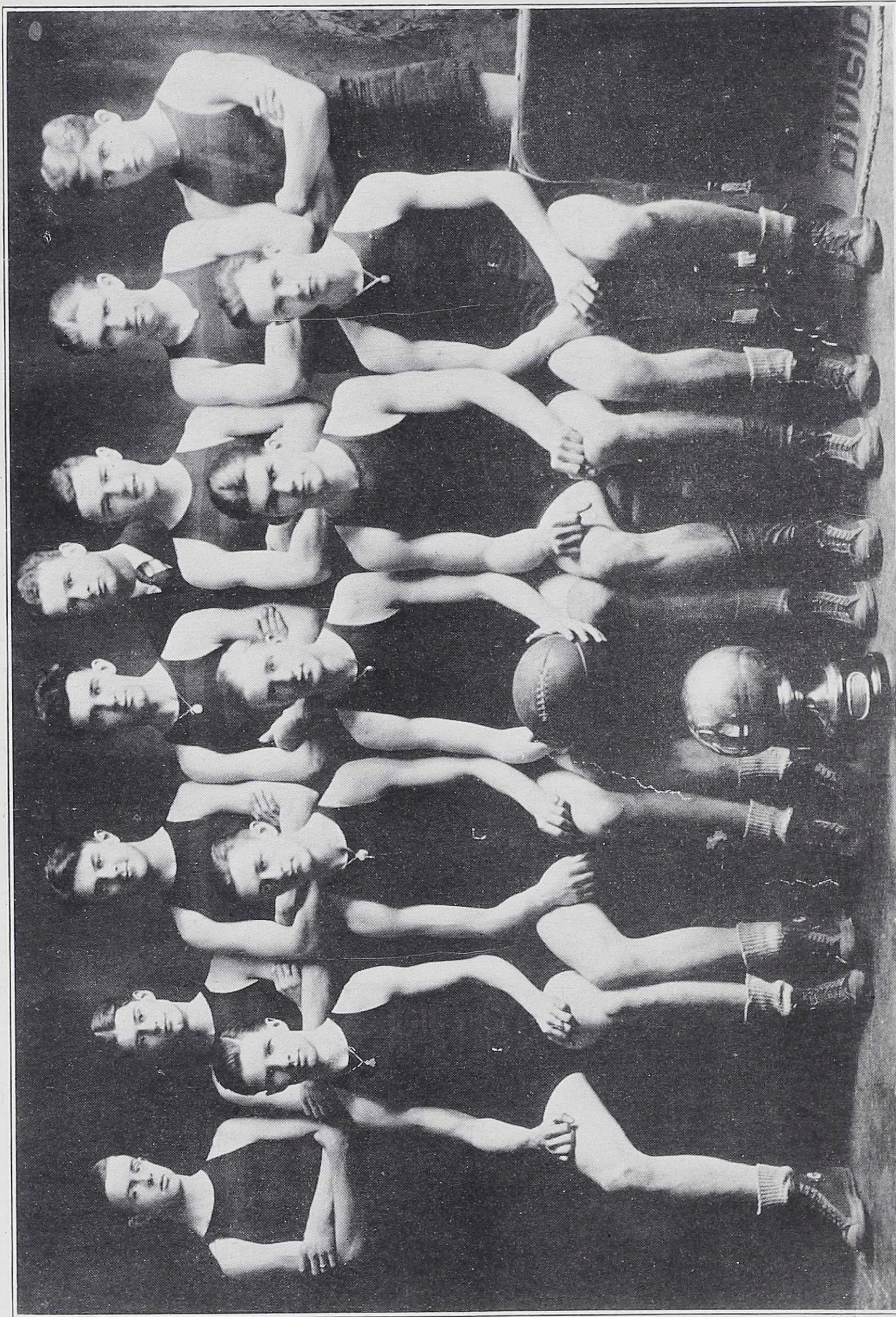

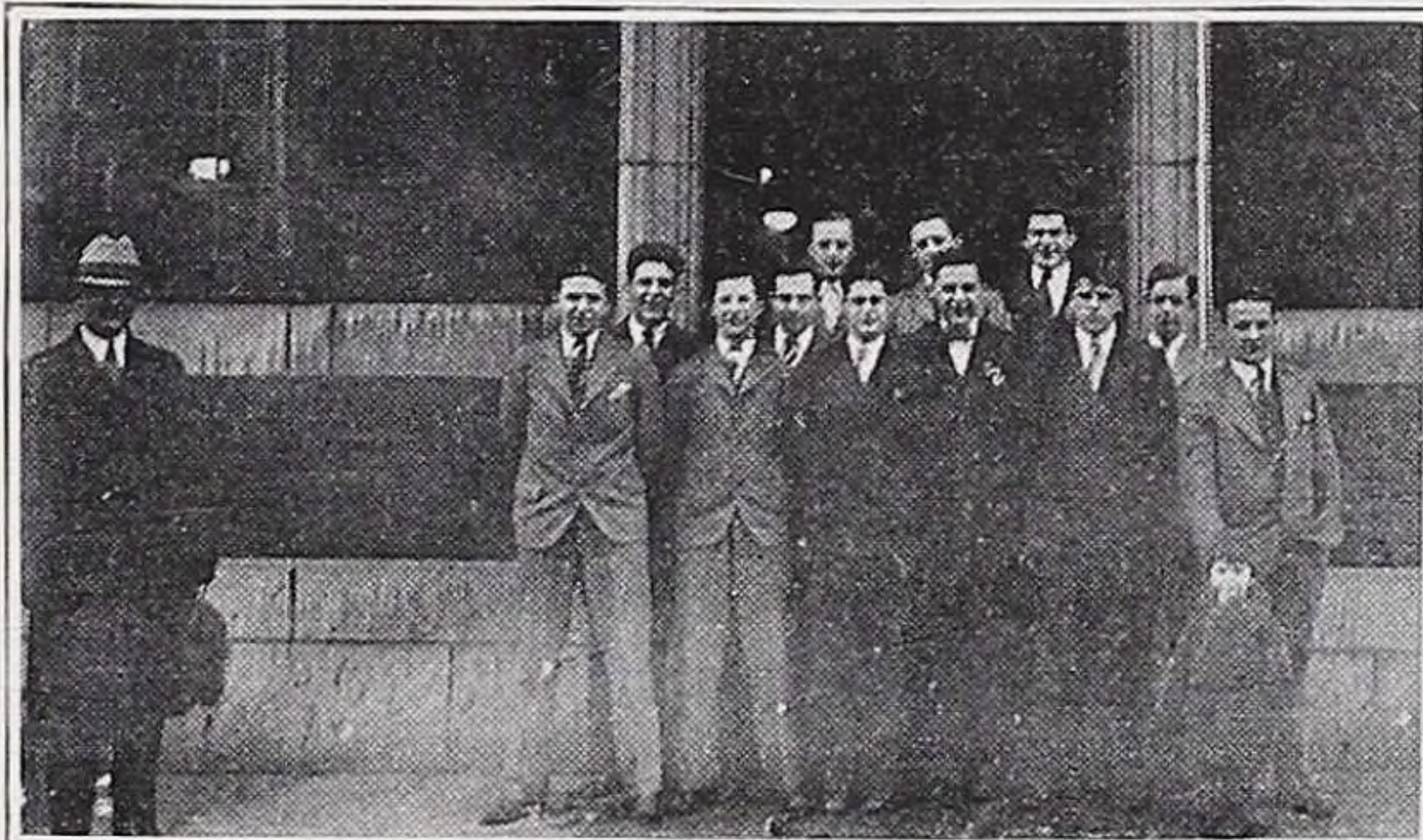

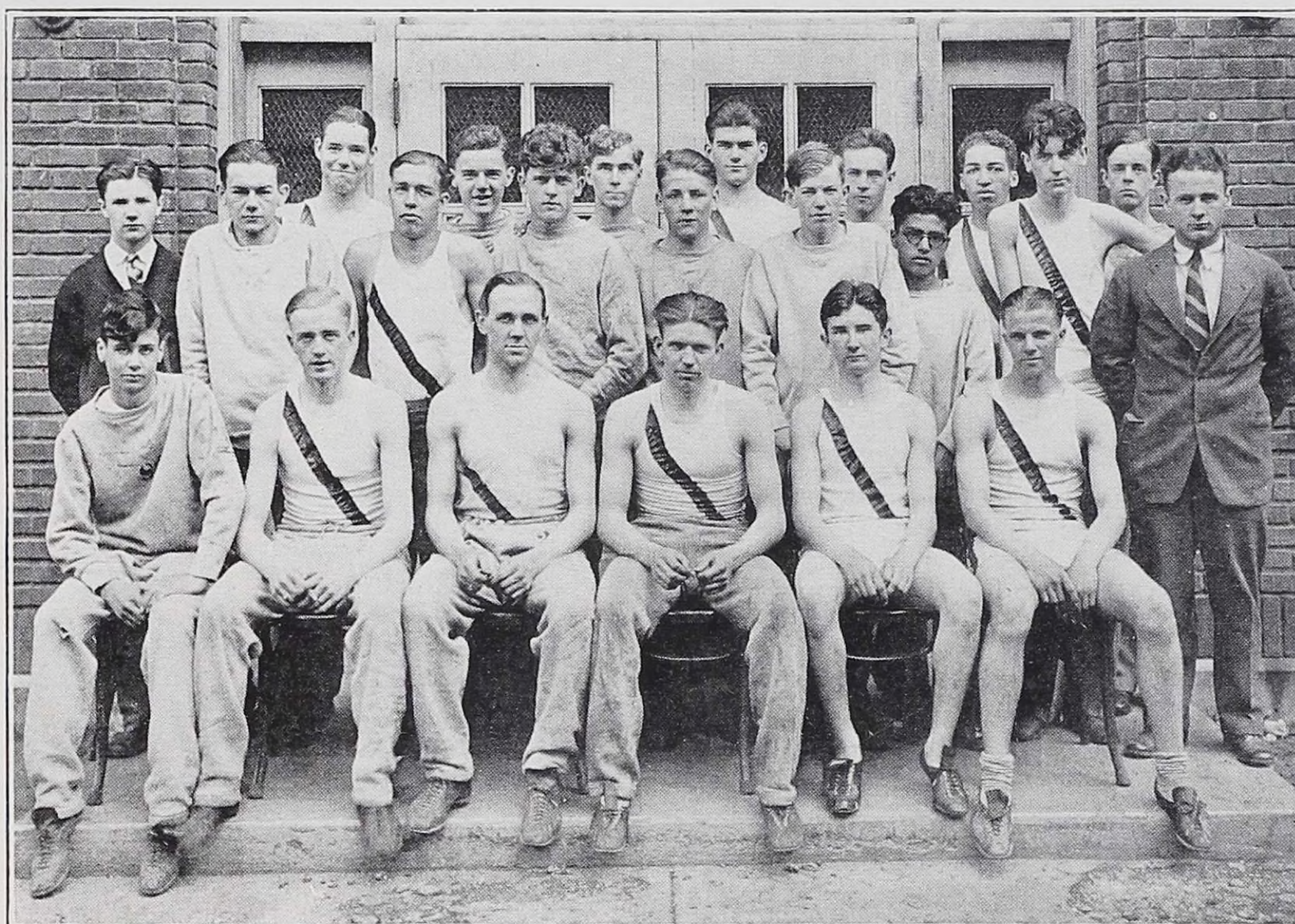

In all our contests the relay team proved to be the deciding factor, winning both the Tri-City and the County meets. In the latter they obtained permanent possession of the Harvey & Carey Relay Cup given to the school winning the relay race three times.

The most valuable man formed among the new material proved to be "Bud" Lollar, the fastest miler this school or any school in Cattaraugus County has yet produced. He was discovered at a very opportune time, being able to take Bergsten's place in the mile. "Ruddy" this year confined his efforts to the half mile. This year's track team was very weak in field events, but far excelled other schools on the track.



### **Inter-Class Meet May 4**

This is probably the last Alfred meet that Olean will enter for the present. It appears that it is a little too fast for Olean's company and the experience gained is not worth the effort.

### **Cattaraugus County Meet May 19**

This year the county meet was held in the fair town of Gowanda on a none too favorable track. Weather indications were unfavorable during the morning, but the ever threatening rain held off until night. Olean returned with its share of the booty, including five firsts, four seconds, one third, five fourths, and a tie for fourth, the county championship and for the third and last time the Harvey & Carey Relay Cup. Lollar and Bergsten broke records in the mile and half mile respectively, placing first and second in both races. Olean scored 41 of the 43 1-2 points in track events; thereby defeating its strongest rival, Salamanca, by 2 1-2 points.

### **State Sectional Meet May 26**

This meet was also held in Olean. This year the weather man failed to favor the scanti-clads with anything but a continual rain thus



handicapping the runners. Eighteen schools competed in two classes, A, for schools of more than 150 pupils and B, for schools of less than 150 pupils. Lollar was the first to score with a second place in the mile. Bergsten followed with a third in the half mile. Brundage produced a surprise by tying for second in the pole vault. The relay pulled the "iron man" stunt by defeating their keen rivals, Dunkirk, by less than a yard, thus winning the right to represent this section at Ithaca June 2nd.
