When the "Dash" arrives on the Continent, there will probably be a

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



Mr. Sackett appointed Miss Fitzgerald, class advisor, and the meeting was adjourned.

The school year opened with a freshman class of about 280 regular first year pupils, nearly 150 of whom were new members of high school, promoted from the grammar schools on the June preliminary certificates.

During the typhoid epidemic several members of the class were il! from the disease and one, Dorothy Story, died. She was greatly loved by her classmates, and her loss was a great grief to all the group.

ATHLETIC COUNCIL

The athletic program of the Olean High School originates with and is carried on by the Athletic Council. This consists of three student members, elected annually,-namely, the president, vice-president, and secretary, respectively, of the athletic association.

In addition to these, there are permanent and ex-officio members as follows: the principal of the high school, the supervisor of physical education, the faculty treasurer of the athletic association, the coach of athletic teams, and the manager of whatever athletic team may then be in season.

After organization in September, the athletic council holds executive meetings each Wednesday. At these meetings, all routine business of the association is conducted. Recommendations of the coach covering equipment and supplies are brought before the council for approval. Reports of managers are received, bills are audited, varsity letters are awarded by this group. Membership in the council becomes, therefore, a matter of real responsibility and is so regarded by both student and faculty representatives.

Following in the wake of the immortal team of the 1926 football season, this year's team did not seem so good but considering the loss of material by graduation and the size of the students coming in, Coach Frey brought out a strong eleven with a record that cannot be marred by the Bradford defeat.

On September 11 the candidates donned their moleskins and entered the stadium for their first practice at 2:30 o'clock. At 6:00 they left, via the stretchers and crutches, but that is what made them able to take punishment later on in the season. The next day showed an improvement and also a decrease in the number of candidates.

About a week after the season opened, the typhoid epidemic broke out and Little Valley and Hornell immediately cancelled, leaving dates that could not be filled upon such short notice. This same reason also served to keep down the attendance at the games.

Olean opened the season by giving Cuba a trouncing to the tune of 50-0.

The next opponent of the Crimson and Gold, Depew, proved to be a

fairly tough assignment but the team succeeded in putting them down to defeat.

Then along came Dunkirk who last year upset the dope of the scribes and beat us, but this year it was different, we beat them 12-0.

Salamanca's Indians were the next victims going down beneath the fearful onslaught of our line; this game crippled our team, though, and thereby caused future defeats.

Jamestown was the stumbling block for the team. In a sea of mud and a heavy rain they sent the Yeomen back home with a 6 to 0 defeat.

When Olean went to North Tonawanda it was just too sad. They hit probably the best team in Western New York and this probably accounts for the defeat.

The Bradford game this year was a disappointment; for after having beaten teams that Bradford couldn't, the team was trounced 6 to 0 before a record crowd in the Bradner Stadium.

A brief review of the season follows:


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- **December 7**—The basketball season was opened with a decisive victory over Ten Broeck Academy at Franklinville. The final score in this first league encounter was 20-13.
- **December 14**—The Freymen received their first setback in the league when Allegany invaded Olean to take a 30-21 victory.
- January 5—In the first non-league contest on the schedule, East Aurora downed the Crimson and Gold 27-26 in a hectic battle.
- January 12—Although favored to win, the Alfred University Freshmen proved easy and the Yeomen annexed a 20-14 victory.
- January 19—The next team Olean encountered was Fredonia. The lake shore school had a fine aggregation, but the Freymen were superior. The score was 25-15.
- January 26—Playing a stellar brand of ball, Olean was invincible and Delevan was humbled 28-13.
- February 1—In a contest which was both fast and rough, Warren succeeded in turning back the Freymen by an 18-14 score.
- February 2—Franklinville put up a strong battle the next night, but the Ten Broeck five was subdued 34-23 in an exciting game.
- February 8-With a spotless record in the league loop, Allegany appeared

unbeatable on their own court. After a thrilling encounter, Olean returned home with a 14-12 victory.

February 15—Portville was the next opponent. In a listless contest, Olean outscored that quintet, 43-16.

- February 16—Jamestown High was fine and had a wonderful group of basketeers. In a majestic court battle Olean was conquered 30-18.
- February 22—Fredonia, the first school Olean encountered on a two day trip, proved superior and the Freymen were turned back 24-20.
- February 23—From Fredonia the Yeomen journeyed to Erie and met Erie Central. The Crimson and Gold five put up a great fight but were defeated, 36-21.



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March 1—The Freymen concluded their league schedule in a blaze of glory by defeating Delevan 28-19 in an exciting contest.

March 2—Bradford, our ancient rival, provided the opposition for the most thrilling encounter of the season. The Red and Black quintet fought hard in the closing minutes of play in an effort to overcome Olean's lead. When the whistle blew, Olean was leading by the narrow margin of one point. The final score was 22-21.

March 5—In the first round of elimination in determining the Cattaraugus County Championship, Olean defeated Salamanca by a 12-11 score in the local armory. Salamanca had a great quintet but the Yeomen were a little bit better.

- March 7—Allegany, winner of the Class B championship, and Olean, winner of the class A championship, met on the armory floor to decide the County Championship and the right to represent this section at the sectional tournament in Buffalo. The Freymen staged a brilliant exhibition of basketball and after the first half, the result was never in doubt. When the final gun sounded, the Yeomen were leading 19-9.
- March 9—Olean met Jamestown in the first game of the sectional tournament. The Freymen were leading until the last few minutes of play, but the Red and Green quintet spurted ahead to take a 19-16 victory.
- March 13—Olean closed a very successful season at Bradford. The Red and Black five was superior on its own court and Olean was defeated 23-14.



At the first call for candidates for track about 35 men reported for practice. Of the thirty-five, only three lettermen, Petty, Tapp, and W. Swartz, returned to aid Coach Frey in moulding a team worthy of

Olean traditions. With so small a nucleus about which to build, Coach Frey was greatly handicapped. This year's team was probably the weakest aggregation in Crimson and Gold history. For the first time in the annals of the sport, Olean failed to send a representative to the State Meet. Although the squad was conquered in every meet, the athletes practiced faithfully until the conclusion of the season, and this fact, in the light of the disastrous season, is a fitting tribute to the perseverance of the men.

The season was inaugurated on May 8, when the Inter-Class Meet was held in Bradner Stadium. The Seniors, composed of Geuder, Phillips, Sturm, Petty, Odell, Ramsey, Luther and Millard, captured a majority of the events and walked off with 41 points to win first place. The Juniors were second with 20 points, while the post-graduates, represented by Tapp, took third with 13 points.


On May 11 the Crimson and Gold fell before the strong Bradford team in a meet which was held on the Senior High School Field in Bradford. The final score was 58 1-2 to 36 1-2. Tapp starred for the Yeomen taking firsts in the 440 and 880 yard runs. Lyons, Phillips, and Heberlee did commendable work for the Freymen.

In the County Meet which was held at Salamanca on May 25, Olean finished third following Salamanca and Gowanda, who took first and second, respectively. "Toddy" Tapp again starred for the Yeomen by taking first place in both the 440 and 880.

In the final meet of the season, the State Sectional, held in Bradner Stadium on June 1, the Freymen took sixth place. Tapp was second in the 440, Phillips was third in the high jump, and the relay team, composed of W. Swartz, Lee, Phillips, and Petty, took fourth place to give Olean her only points.

The following men were awarded the track letter at the close of the season: Theodore Tapp, Merrill Phillips, Logan Heberle, Lawrence Lyons and Manager George Luther.












HI-Y CLUB

The University of Buffalo SCHOOL OF DENTISTRY

Announcement



HE Council of the University of Buffalo announce the adoption of the four-quarter plan of instruction in the

teaching of dentistry. The first session will begin July 1st, 1929. The course is continuous and consists of twelve quarters of eleven weeks each with vacation periods of two weeks between the quarters.

The curriculum consists of a basic and a specialized course of instruction. The basic course considers dentistry, as a branch of medicine and in conjunction with the faculty of the School of Medicine, courses are offered in the fundamental subjects with credit toward the medical degree. The future contact of the medical and dental practitioners is secured through this common basic training. It is imperative in the conservation of human life that these two great professions of health service should have a common ground for the interchange of ideas. The object of the basic instruction is to gain a higher and broader interpretation of the relation which dentistry bears toward the cause and treatment of systemic disease.

The course of dental specialization is to teach the student to become a creative, independent practitioner. It consists of fundamental instruction in technical procedures which constantly alternate with infirmary schedules. Students are allowed to progress as fast as they may demonstrate their ability. They are given every opportunity for clinical experience in independent practice by the various assignments at the hospital wards and clinics.

The economic feature of this course is appealing to the average student who wishes to enter dental practice at the earliest opportunity, as it reduces the dental course of six years to one of five years (two years of pre-professional and three years of medico-dental study.) Unparalleled opportunities are offered at the hospitals to determine through study and research the interdependence of medicine and dentistry in cooperative diagnosis.

Professional study requires a type of education commensurate with the responsibilities of professional practice. In view of the recent advance in both the theoretical and clinical work, valuable time may be saved by utilizing the long summer vacation period. More constant contact with the professional curriculum results inevitably in a greater breadth of knowledge and a higher accomplishment in technical skill.

Dentistry offers unusual opportunities to those who wish to specialize in surgery, orthodontia, technical and scientific fields, and in general health education.

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
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
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
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
