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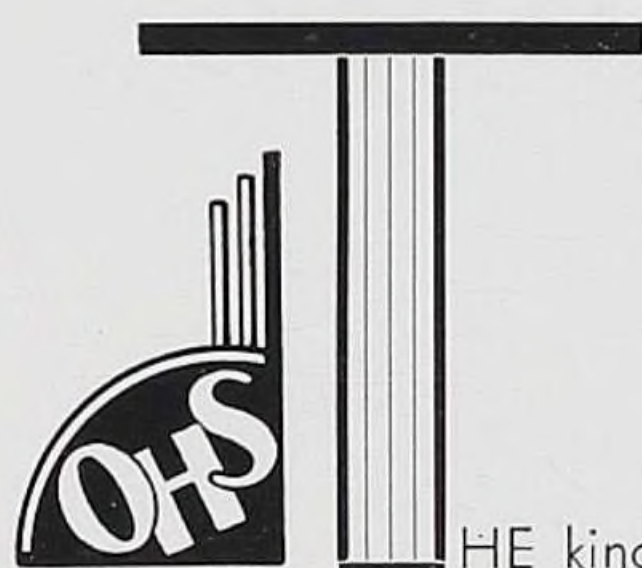
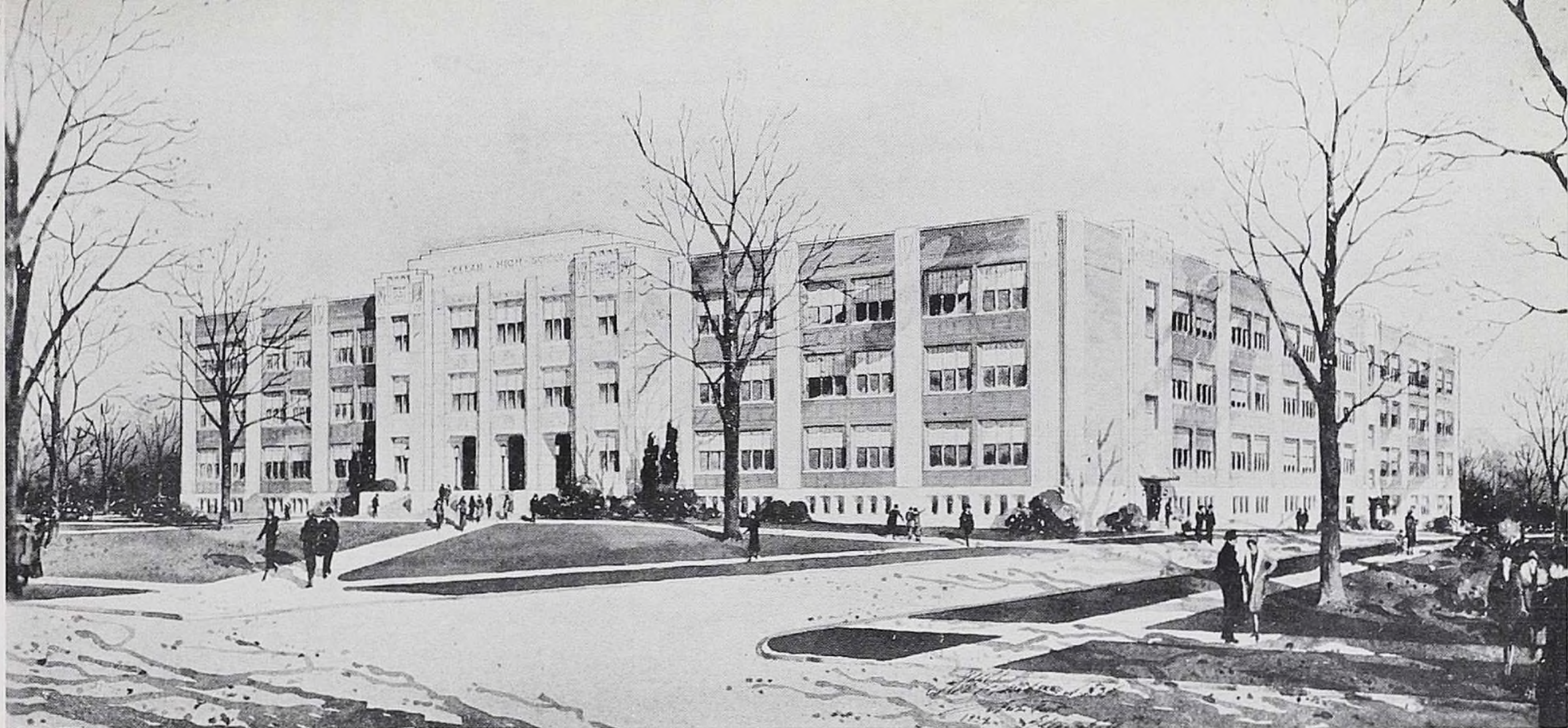

To all the Faculty and all the Students, who, in these days of necessary interruptions and inconveniences, have evidenced the best type of school spirit, we dedicate this book.





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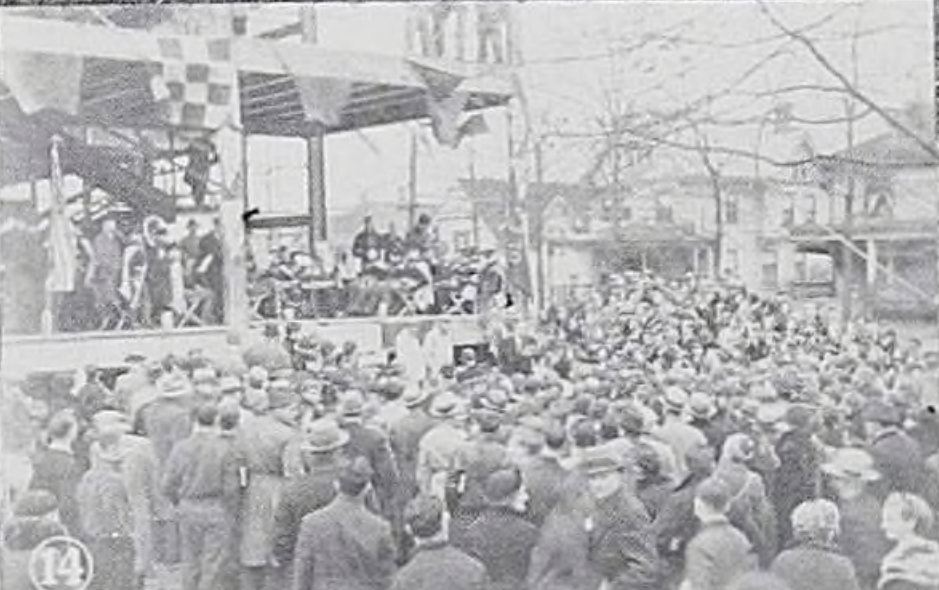
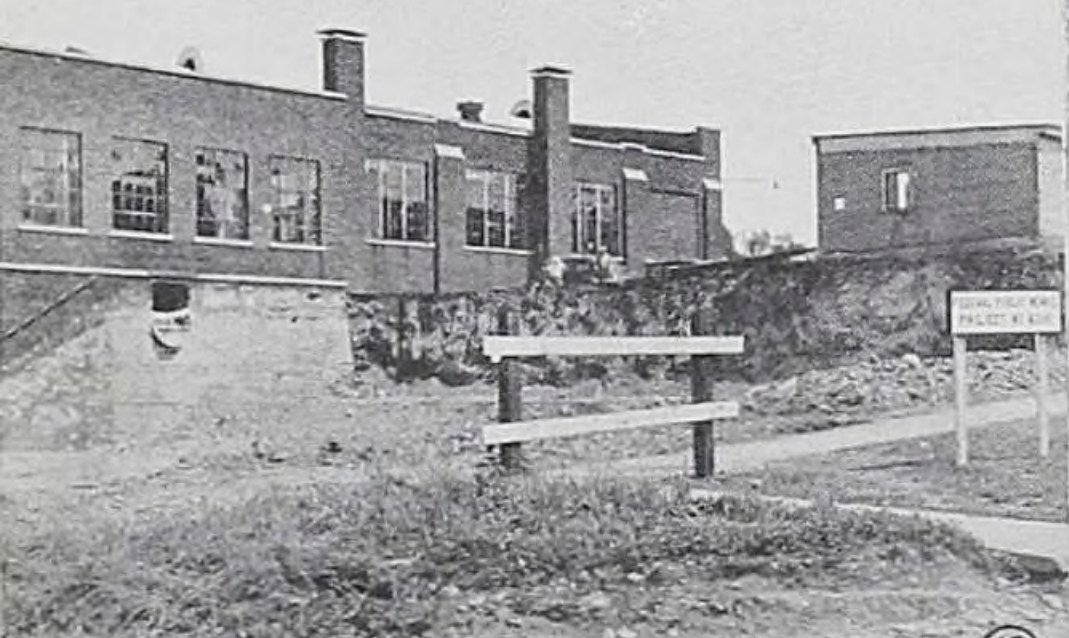
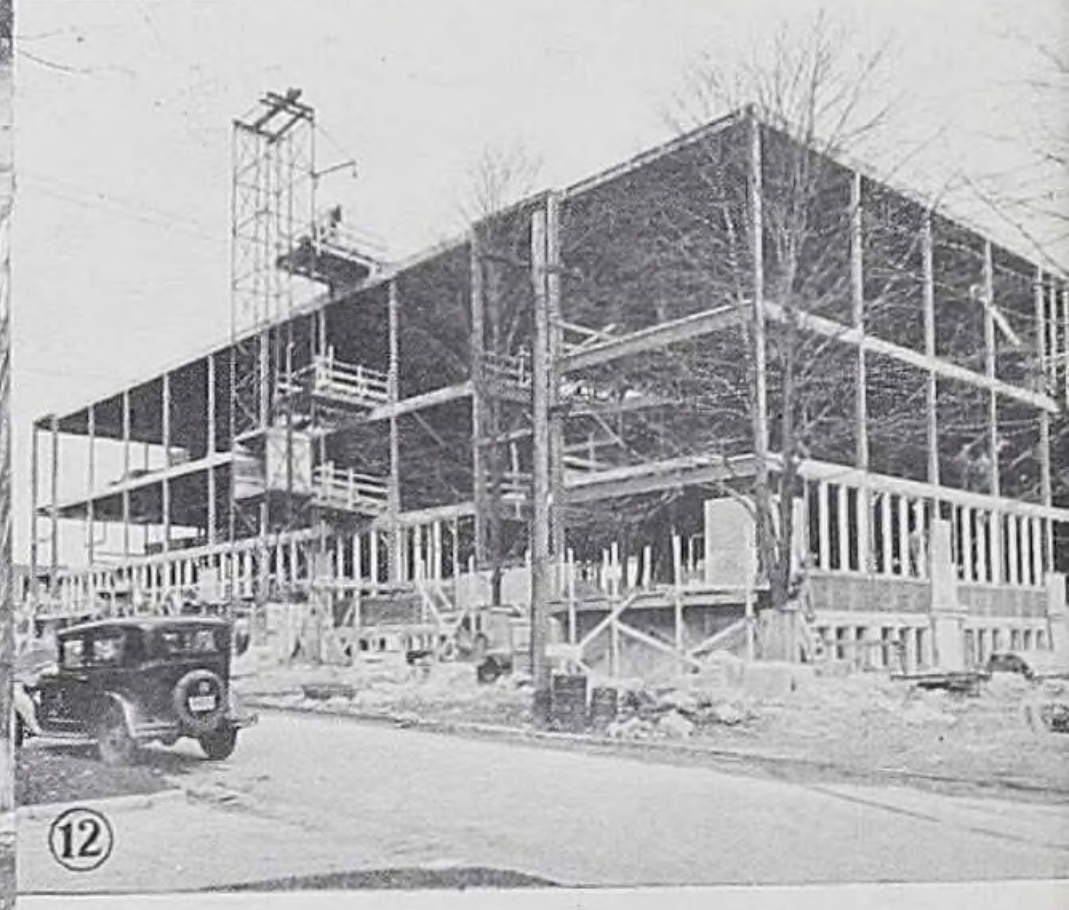
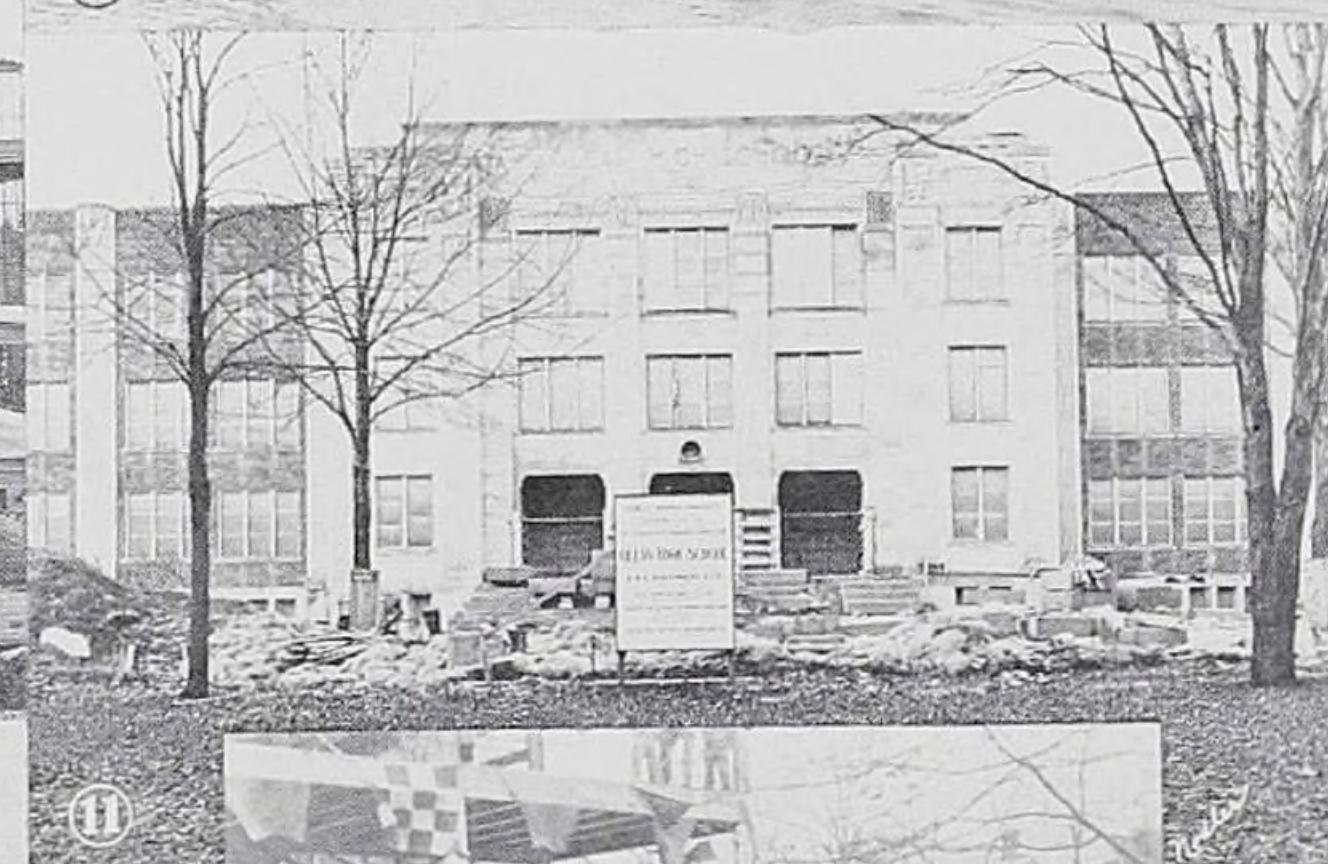
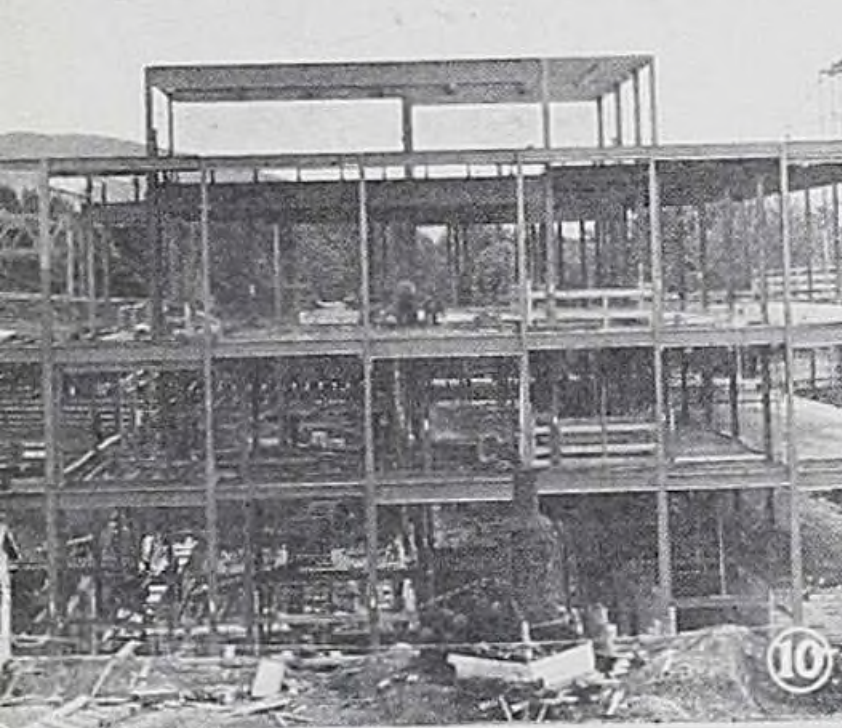
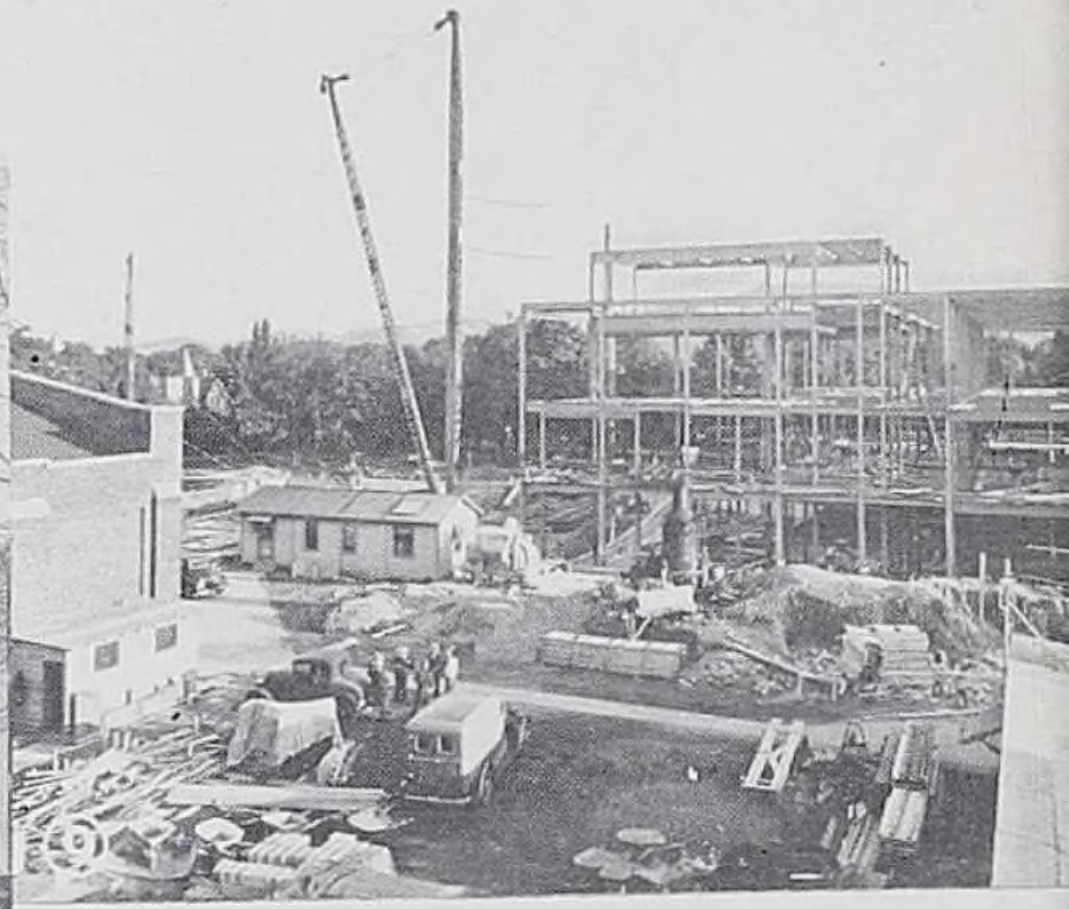
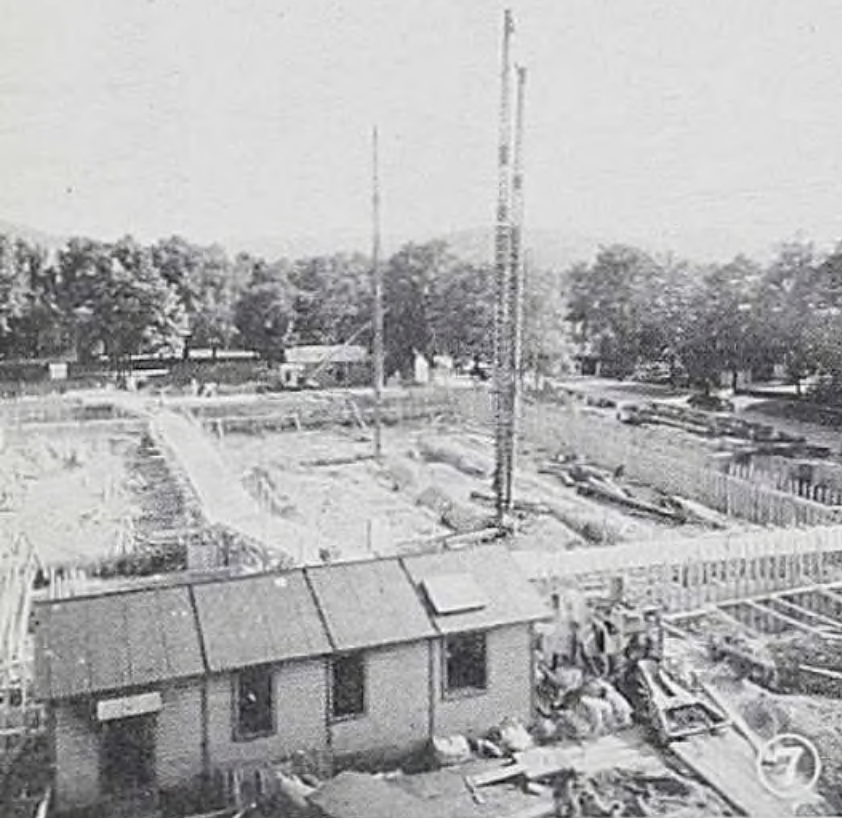
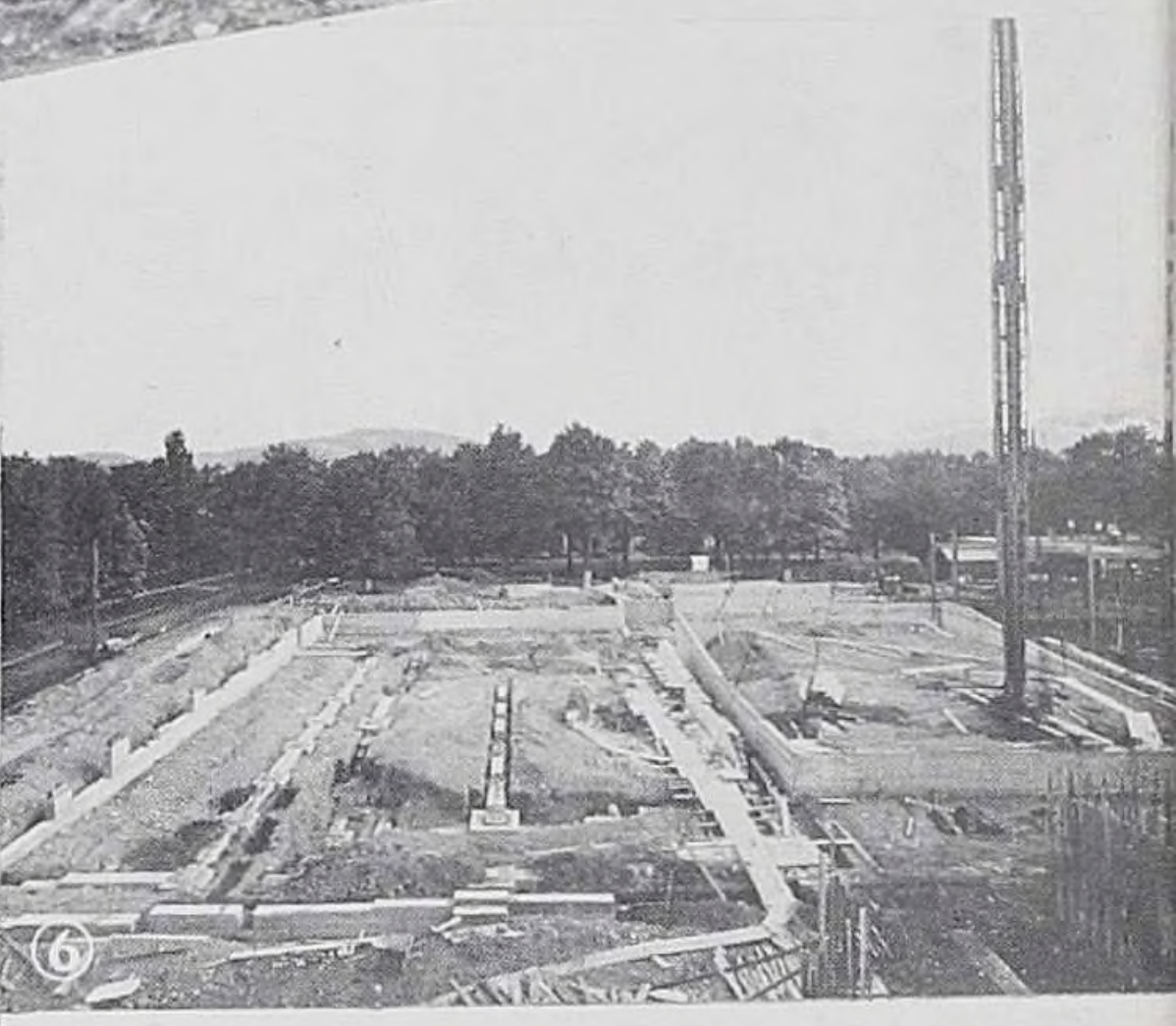
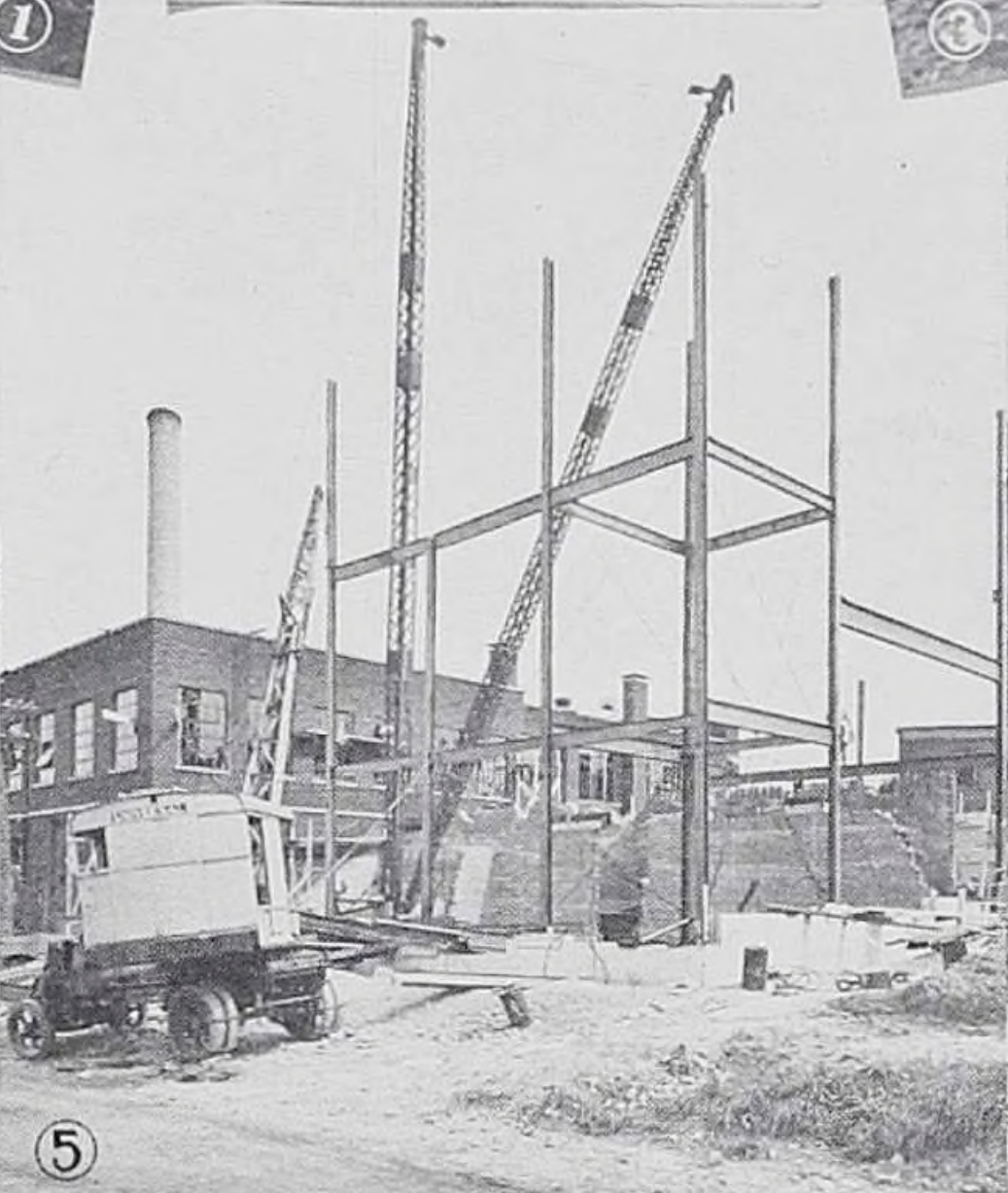
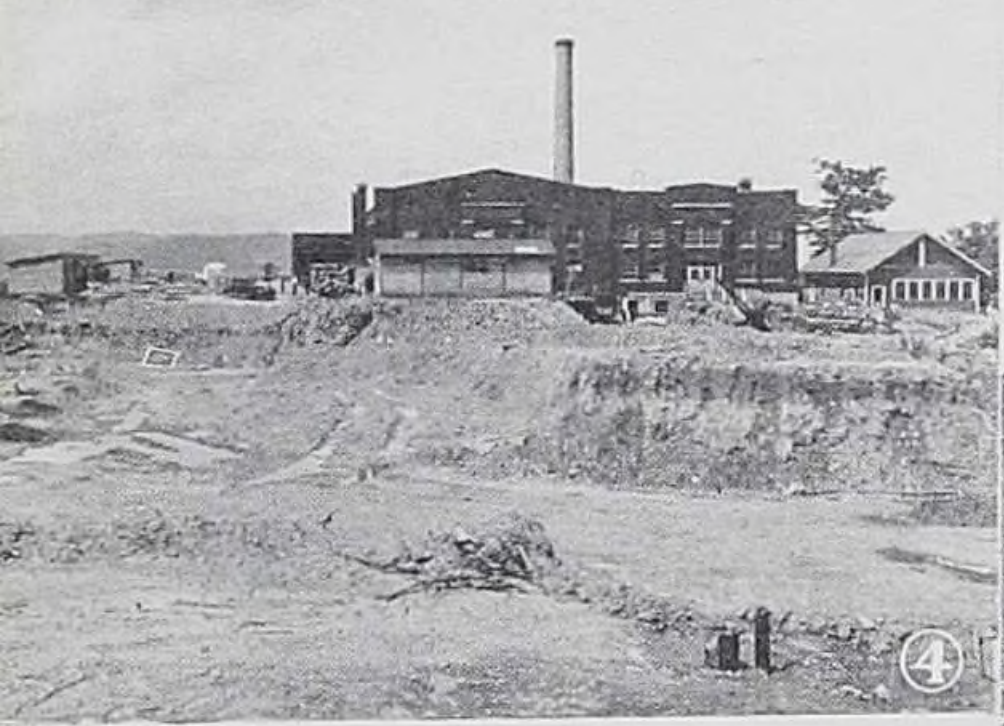

that it is possible for me to attain, at least in some degree, to the standard I have set for myself as a teacher.

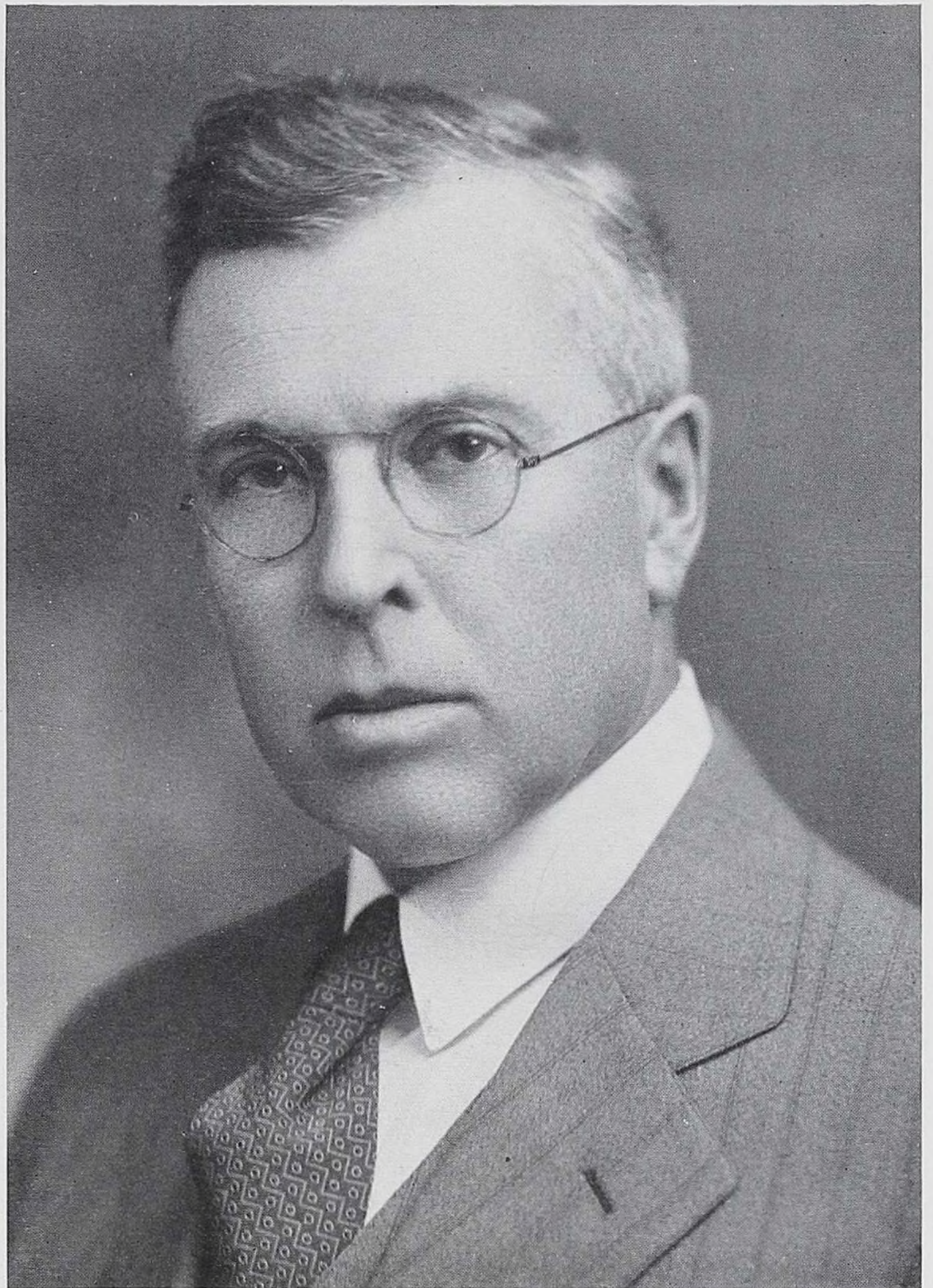

The Senior Class adopted a standard seal for their rings, and how proud we were of them, as well as of the pins which were made available to all the students.

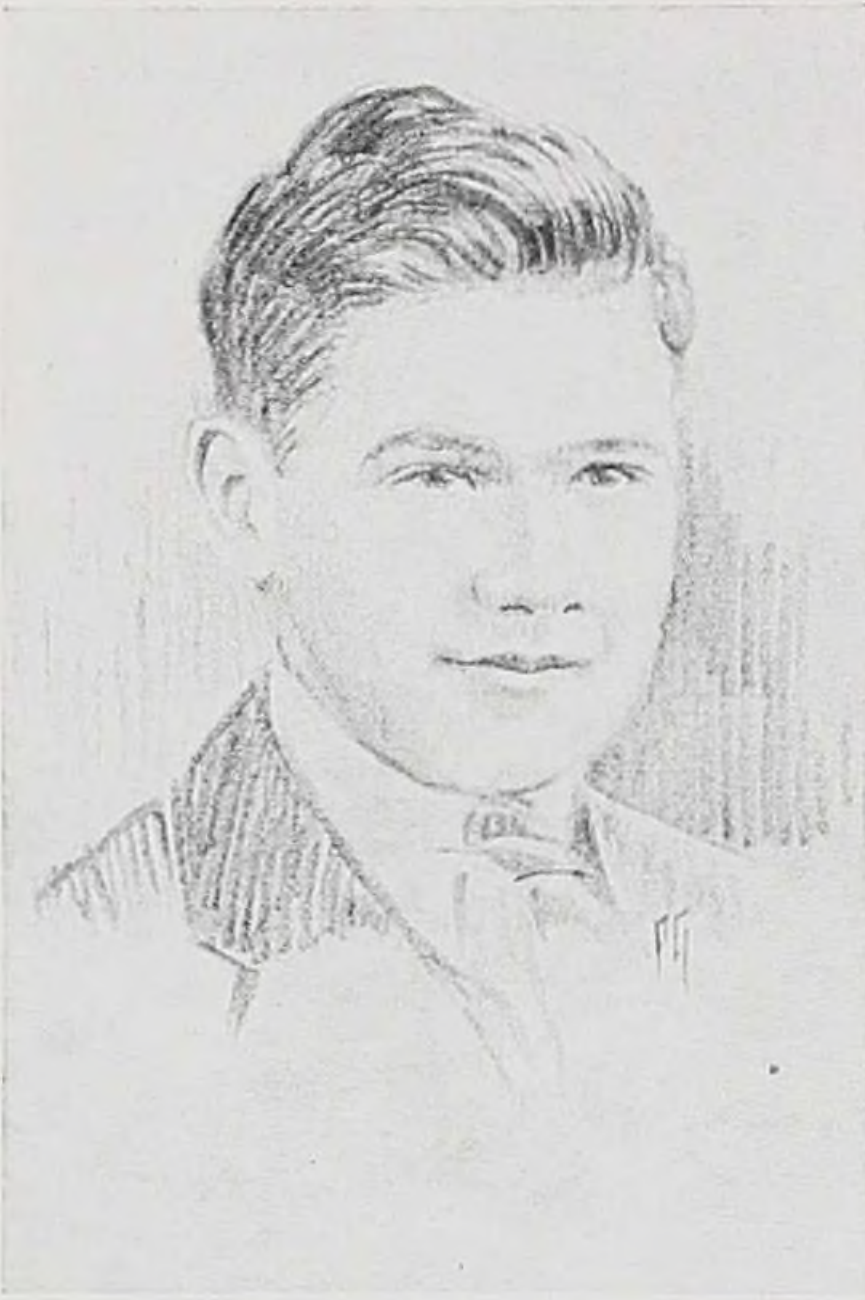

Our exodus was by way of Parnassus on Wheels moving O. H. S. Library, not along country byways but through city traffic, from the old high school to the side door of the Olean Public Library.

As the monasteries to the medieval wandering student of manuscripts, has the crypt of this shrine to the Patron Saint Andrew of libraries been to our Vagans Scholasticus. Down here no shattering sounds of truck, steam shovel, gears, drill and hammer disturbed the quiet reference work on commercial geography, science, economic citizenship and vocational guidance.

Instead of period bell, the gentle ticking of the clock, the pleasing regularity of neighboring chimes, the seasonal whisper of snow or drip of rain and the twittering of birds in the bushes overhanging these high basement windows had lulled the mind to sleep, had not been heard the modern telephone and buzzer, the noiseless typewriter, and the coming and going of frequent borrowers. Besides pupils and an occasional teacher, a varied clientele has found the way within these cloistered walls, not only attendant dogs but different members of the family to return a book for Mary or John who was ill or obligated to attend a club or rehearsal or who had forgotten the book was due.

What delighted surprise greeted the statement, "History books may be kept a week." A library for legitimate use only, not as an overflow study hall, necessitated by former crowding, has resulted in more time on the part of the librarian for the making of useful bibliographies and the long needed revisions of records required for more effective usefulness of library resources. Here, underground, pupil readers and librarian, after an occasional upward glance out of windows literally on a grass root level, have returned like their fellow workers the mole and the earthworm, to useful burrowings in the field of knowledge.

Miss Oliver's review classes and Wayside have found the lecture end of the room a meeting place by day, and the whole room has served as studio for the fortnightly evening Sketch Club of Miss Ball and her pupils.

All these beneficiaries unite in a grateful, "Sanctuary, hail and farewell."

The Olean High School football team, under the direction of Coaches "Hookey" Frey and "Norm" Utecht and the leadership of Captain "Billy" Smith, had a very successful season. The Red and Gold won three, tied two, and lost two.

The Crimson started off with a "bang" by defeating a strong Falconer team to the tune of 6-0. The lone touchdown was made by Leo Lazar, Olean's star halfback.

Canisius, a team from Buffalo, visited Olean with a result of a 0-0 tie. Next on the list came the plucky, but weak, Depew team. The Crimson ran wild and every man in uniform had his chance in the game and when the final whistle had blown, Lazar had crossed the opponent's goal three times with Piechota, Kubic and Gordon each having made one touchdown apiece. Score 39-7.

The Crimson chalked up another victory when Salamanca visited the Bradner Stadium. "Bulldog" Lazar made a tally in the first half with Piechota following in the last half to make the count 14-0.

The Yeomen made their first trip of the season when they went to Dunkirk. They suffered their first defeat at the hands of the Black and White and failed to score while Dunkirk chalked up 18 points.

The last game that was played under the flood lights at the Bradner Stadium was with Jamestown. This game, packed with thrills, ended in a tie 6-6 with Lazar making Olean's single touchdown.

The Hilltoppers played their last game of the season with their old rivals, Bradford. Despite the fact that the Owls won, 14-0, it was a fairly evenly matched contest. Joe Bizzaro scored both times for the Red and Black before the fray was over.

It is interesting to note that this was the first year football was played in Olean under the flood lights. All home games except with Canisius were played under the lights.

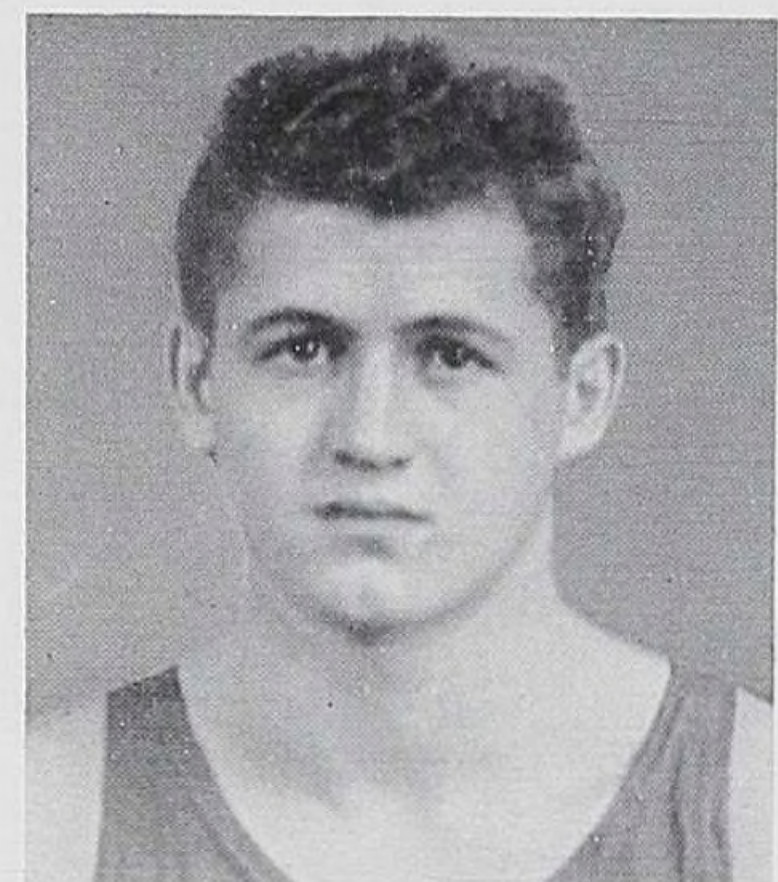

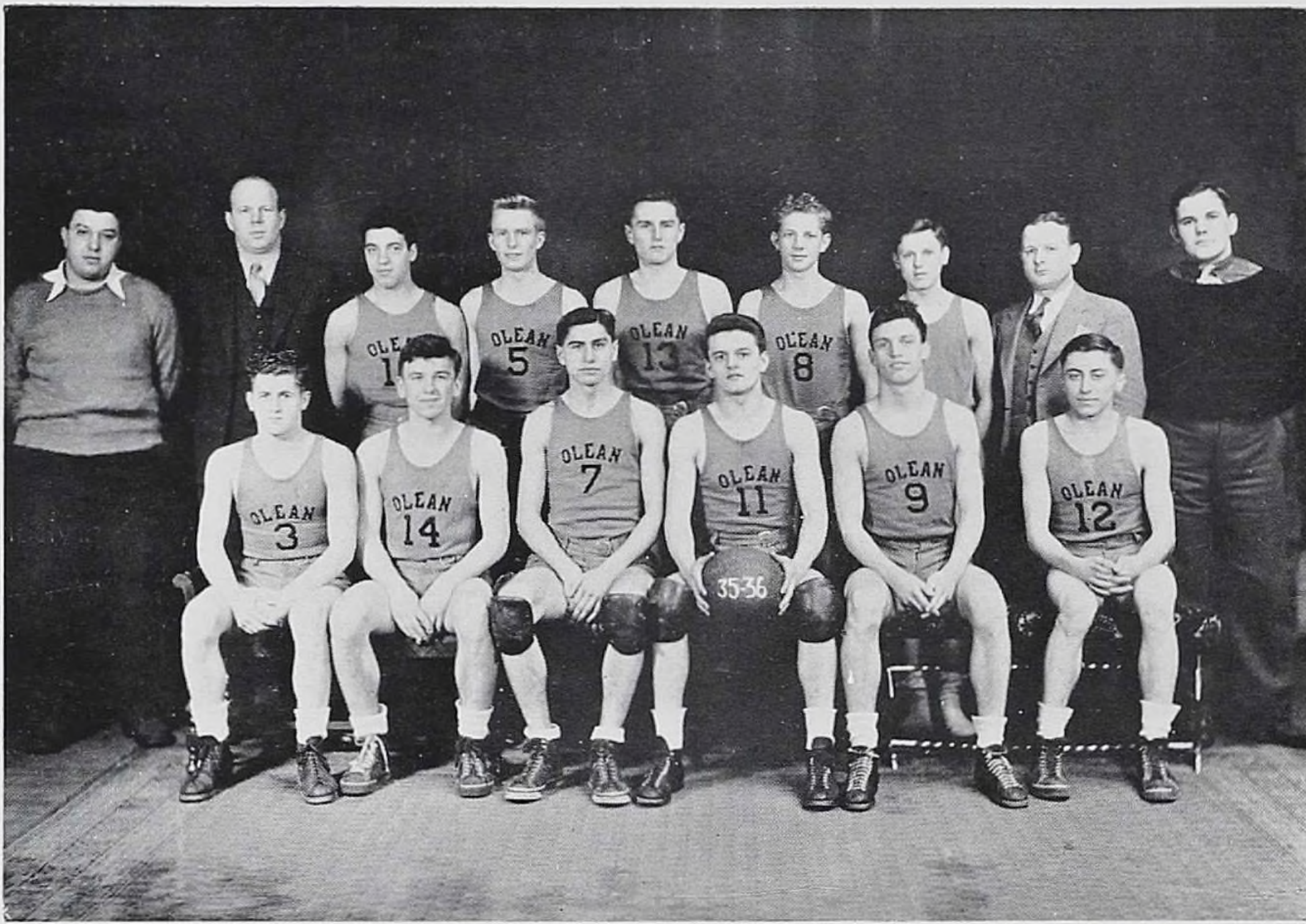

The Olean High School basketball team, coached by "Hookey" Frey and "Norm" Utecht and captained by "Clarie" Heinz, enjoyed a most successful season by winning eleven out of fifteen games.

Without a warm-up game, the Crimson quintet went to Franklinville to open their league schedule and won by the score of 27-22. St. Mary's, a team from Buffalo, was defeated by the Freymen after a last quarter rally by 24-21. Next, in rapid succession, the Red and Gold downed Portville and Salamanca to the tune of 32-25 and 16-13 respectively. Joe Hadzicki, Olean's colorful forward, had an average of 10 points the first four games.

Bradford, Olean's age old rivals, visited the Armory and after a close battle emerged victorious, 26-31. Led by "Joey" Hadzicki, the Yeomen had little difficulty in setting back Allegany and Franklinville. The Red and Gold took a close decision from Portville with Billy Smith breaking a tie with ten seconds to go. Score 23-21.

Olean suffered their second defeat of the season when they encountered Bradford the second time. The Ellicottville game was a complete rout for the Olean lads, the score being 31-13. The Yeomen overcame an eight-point lead in the last minutes of the game to defeat the Salamanca quintet.

The local five wound up their league schedule by conquering Allegany and making it eight league games to their credit. Despite the size of the score, the Crimson lost a close one to the Jamestown courtsters, 32-49.

The following week, Olean played Gowanda for the Class A County championship and easily defeated the foe to win the County title. The next week the Freymen journeyed to Jamestown to play in the sectionals and took the worst beating of the season, 47-13, to wind up the 1935-36 basketball season.

Honors were bestowed upon four members of the Olean High School team to represent the All-East in the annual All-East All-West game. Captain Clarence Heinz, "Mike" Ewanciw, "Billy" Smith and "Joey" Hadzicki were placed on this mythical team.
