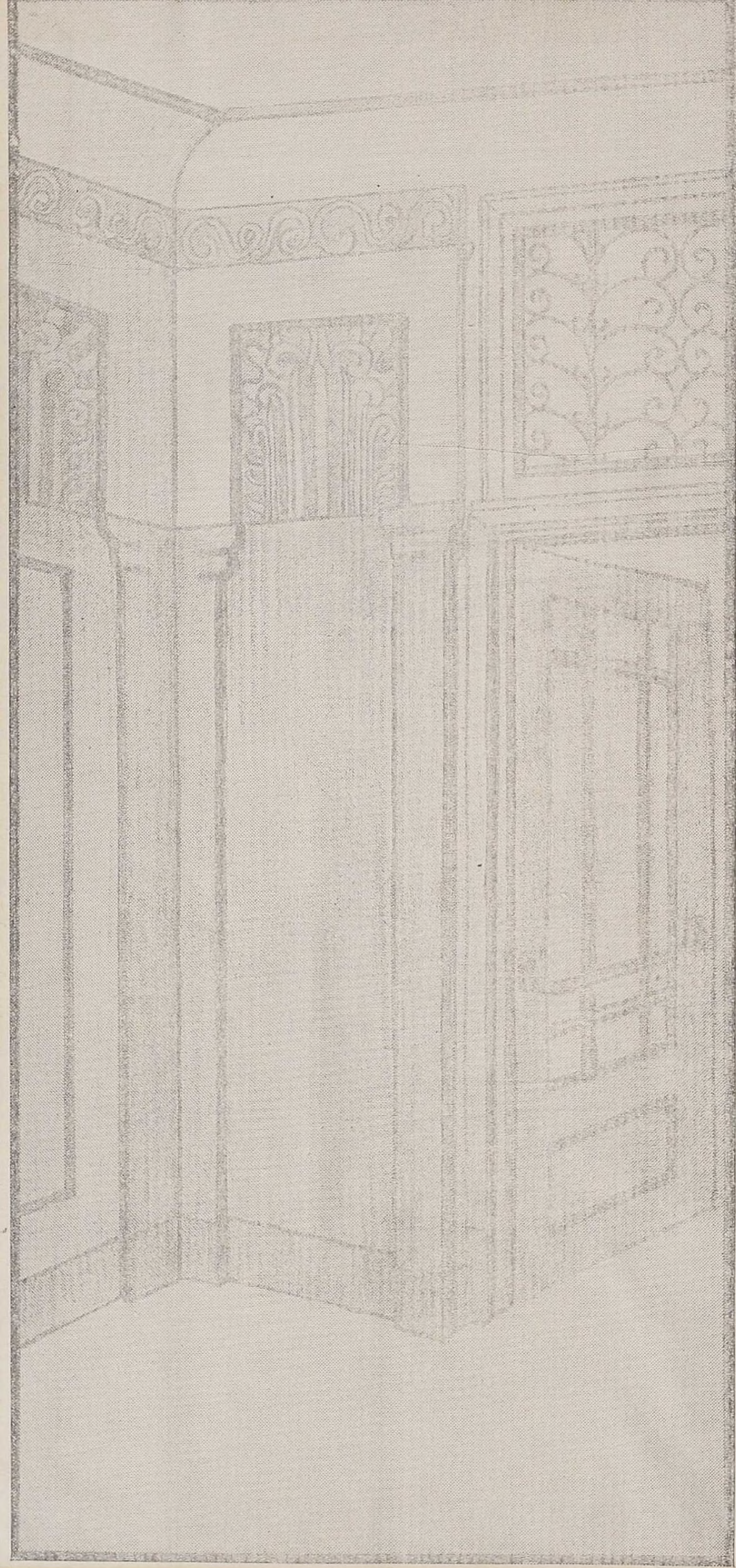
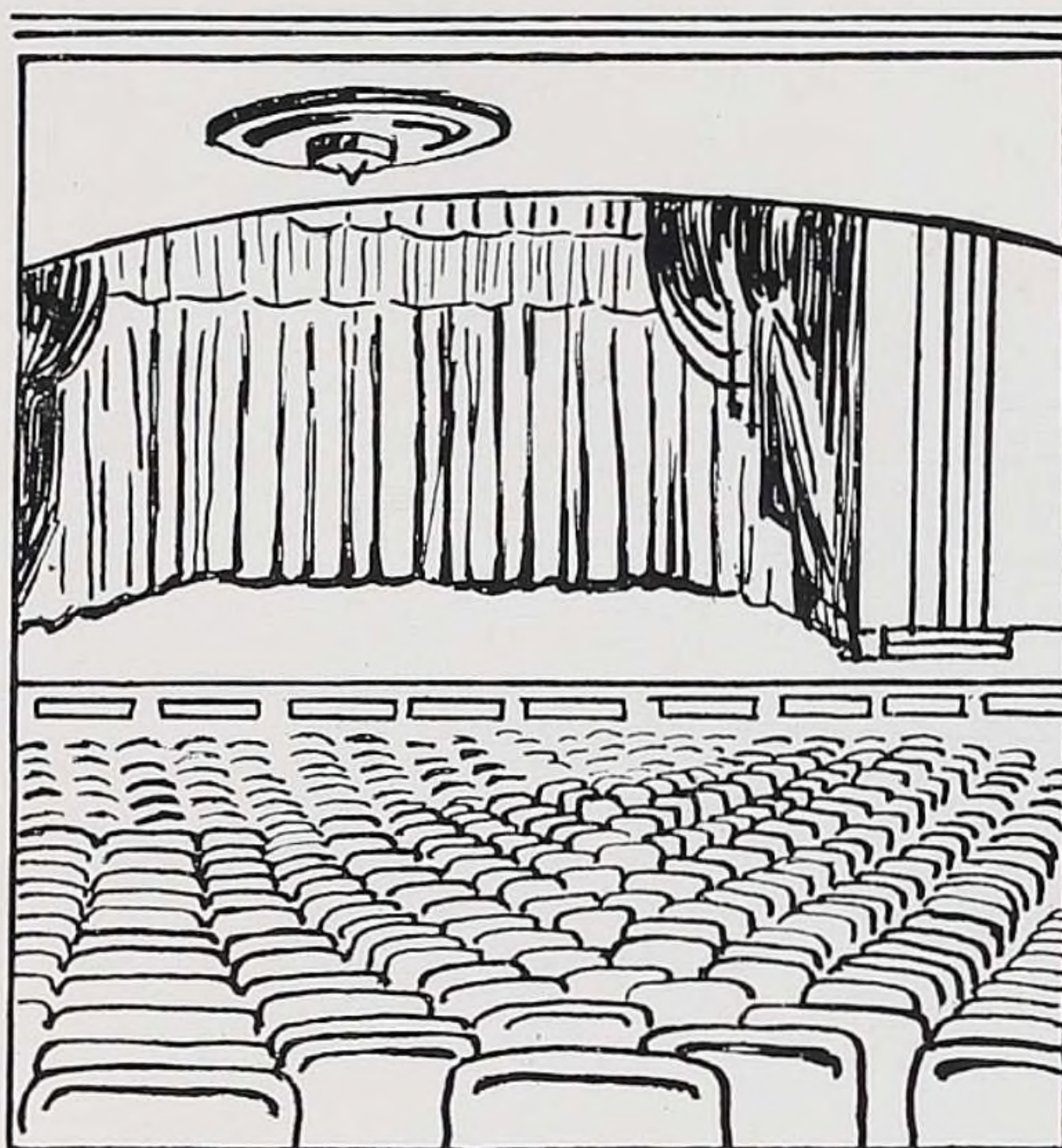

FOREWORD

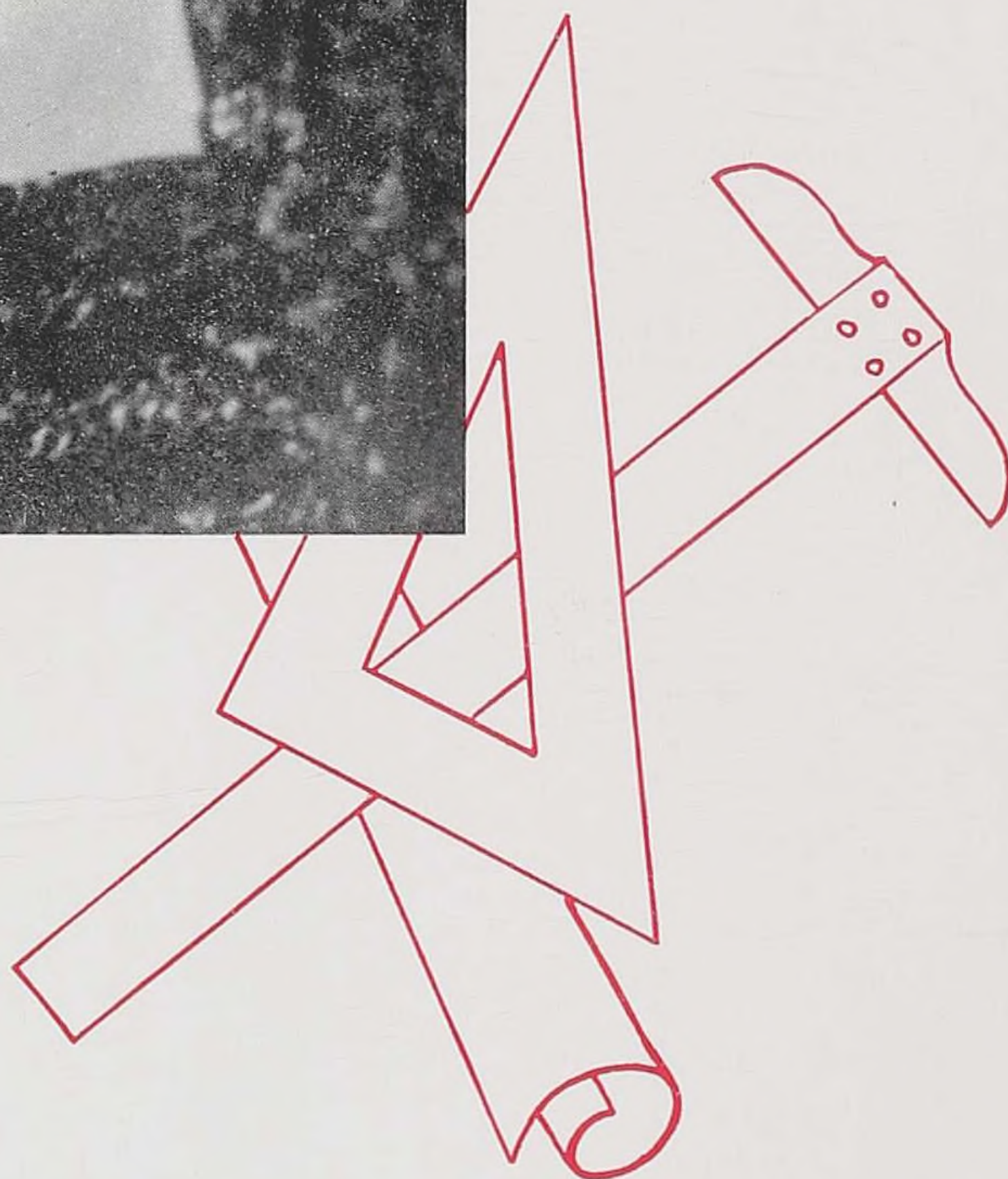

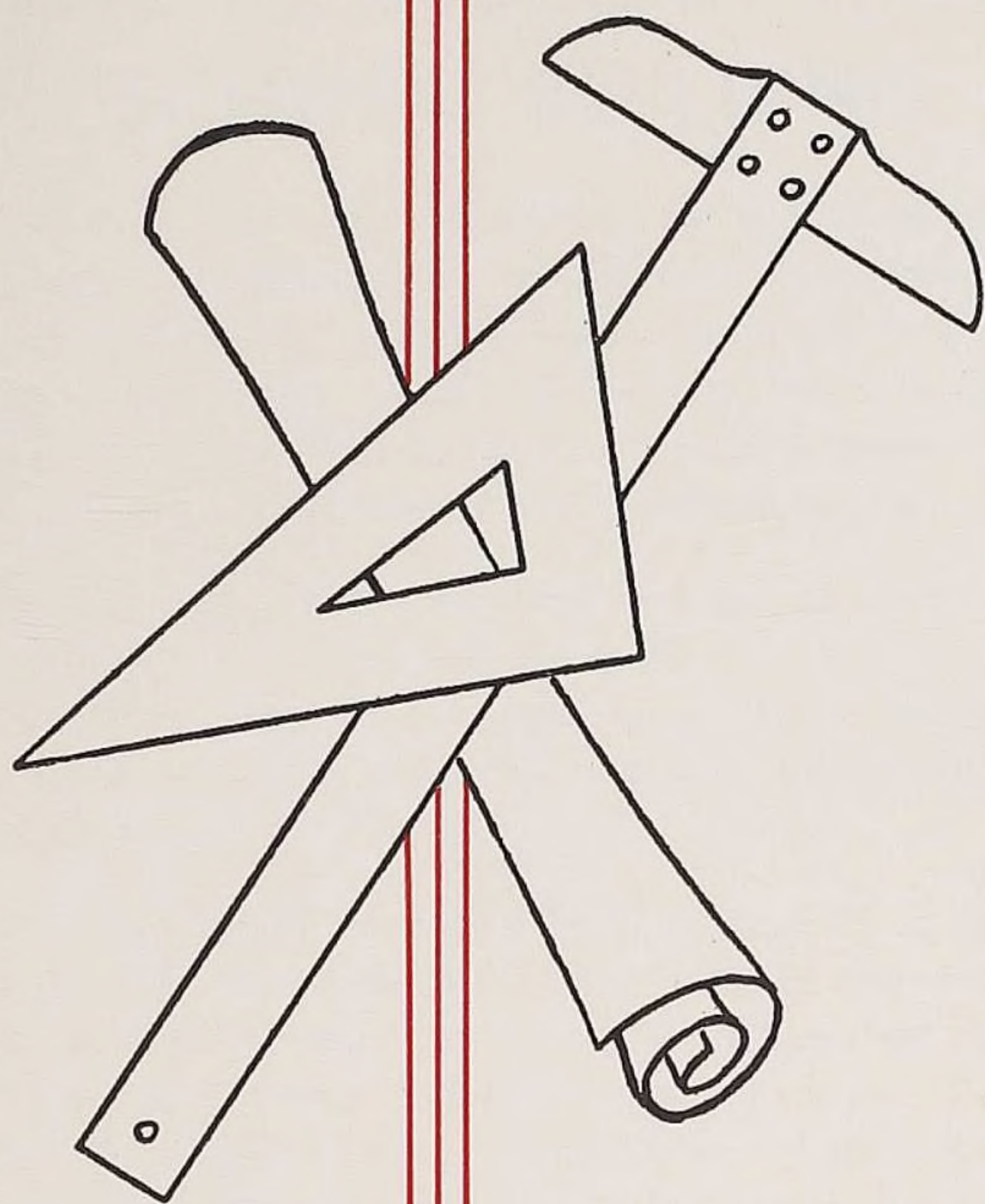

BOOK ONE

NEW SCHOOL

THE NEW OLEAN HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

For years the old red brick building that was Olean High School building stood unchallenged on the tip of Sullivan Hill. It served its purpose faithfully for over fifty years. Many students had called her corridors and rooms 'home'. But at last, her duty fulfilled, she became unsuited, too old and infirm to outfit the coming generation. She must needs pass to allow a new structure to rise in her place.

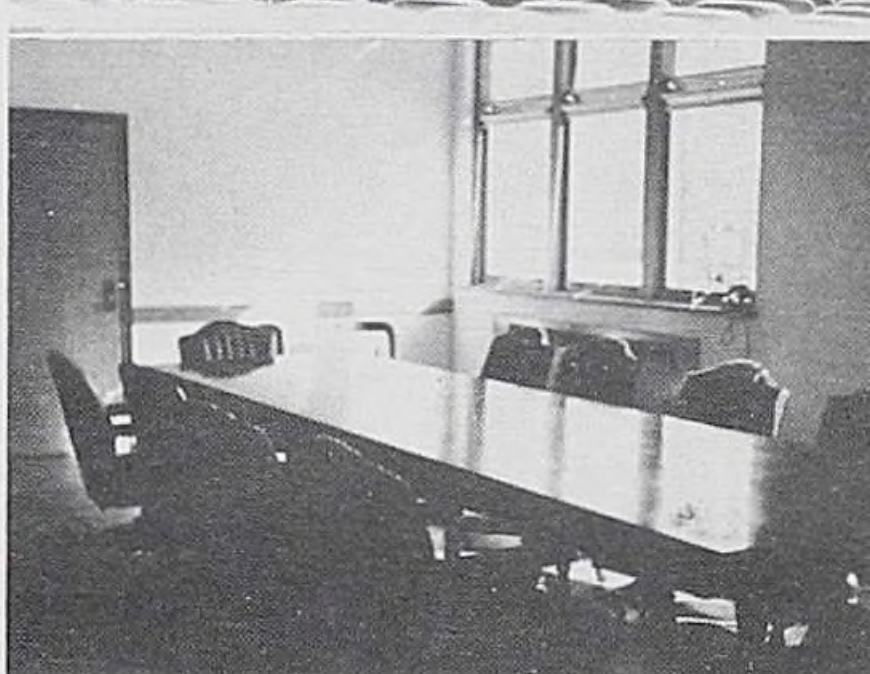
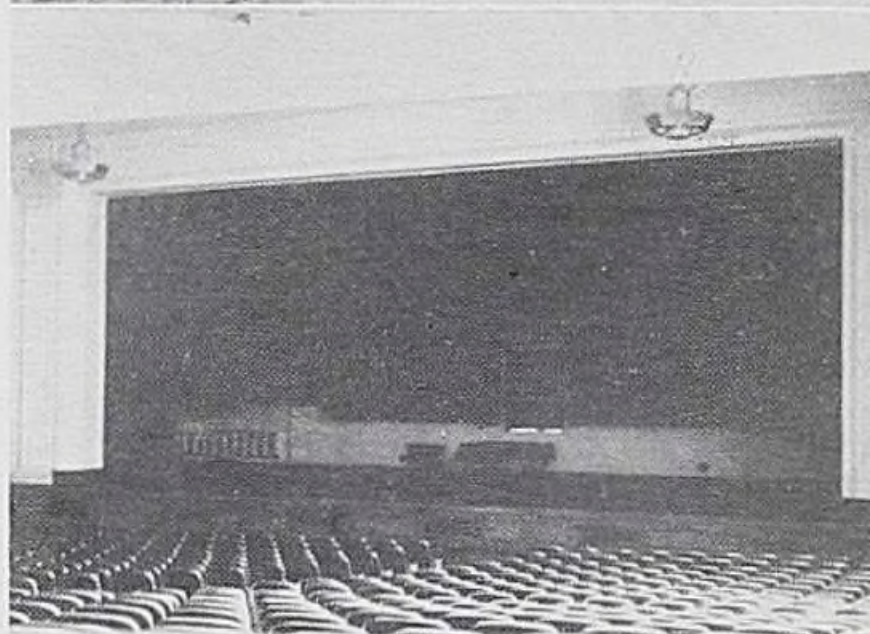
Fifty years the old High School had served youth finely and nobly. But as time passed and the number of pupils grew, many far-sighted citizens could see in their mind's eye a new and better school. It was seen even more clearly that a new building was soon to be needed.

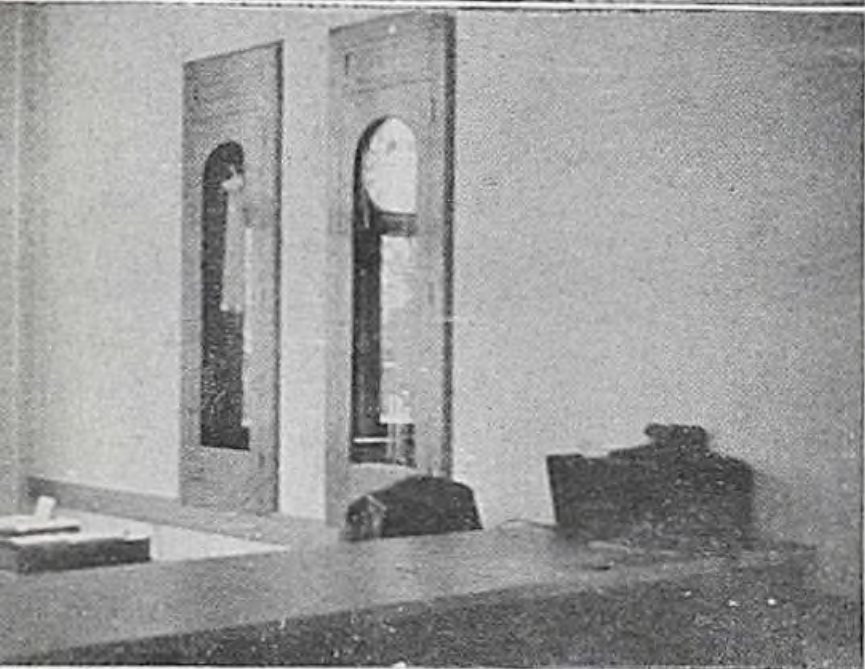
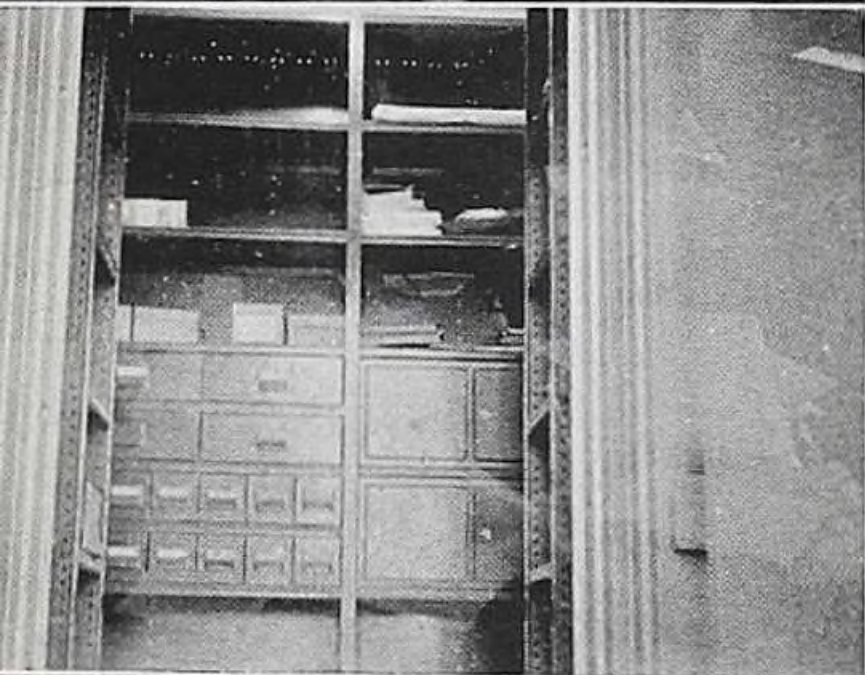
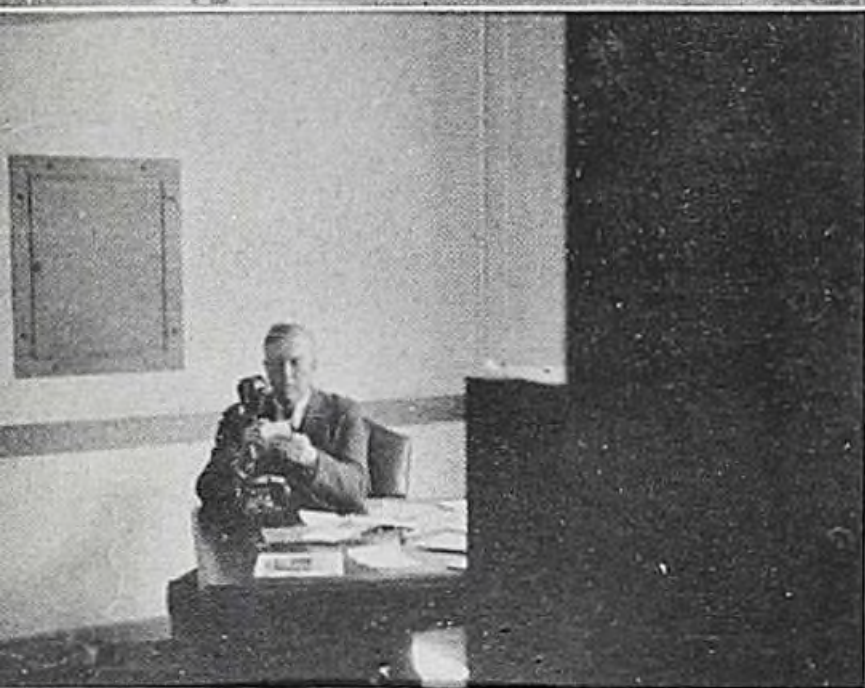
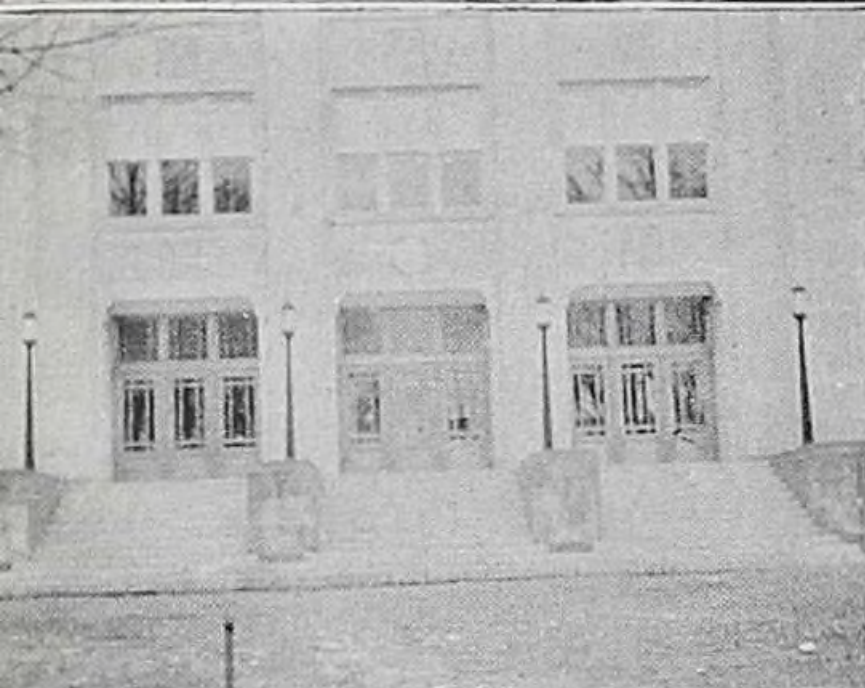
As the number of subjects offered to students grew, so grew also the need for more space to carry on both the curricular and extra-curricular activities of our school. The facilities for teaching science, for example were inadequate and many important experiments had to be done in theory alone. Many of the other activities so vital to school life were hampered and curtailed to a great extent by lack of space. The gymnasium was in need of enlargement. German classes overflowed to the Open Air School building.

Soon people began commenting upon the inadequacy of the old edifice. It was labeled a "fire trap". Her stairs were shabby; her rooms and seats, were battle scarred from combat with students for over thirty years; the sanitary conditions were not of the best; the lighting facilities were bad and study space was needed. The library was taxed to capacity with new books and reading material, looking sadly out of place on the well worn shelves. The laboratories were antique and did not fulfill their duty. With the advent of the new continuous session it was found that the cafeteria was entirely unsuited to the large numbers who flocked there for their lunches. "Surely," said many, "Something can and must be done."

"Is it fitting," asked parents, "to have students go from new and modern grammar schools to an old high school building?" Few of the grammar schools were as old as the institution of higher learning. The old structure antedated most of them and she showed her age.

In 1930 the first step in the high school reorganization program was carried out. The gymnasium first available in 1923 was enlarged. This gave to the physical education instructors space to carry on a constructive program of health work outlined by the New York State Syllabus. It gave the High School athletic teams sufficient room for practices during inclement weather and also provided a room in which to hold assemblies denied to pupils when the Senior study hall moved to the old auditorium. This was the first step toward the new.





For several years after this the need for a new building was hidden behind the shadow of depression. People were busy avoiding this shadow and money was scarce. But suddenly again into the open appeared the discussion. There were those who stated that the building was good for another twenty years. They scoffed at the idea that the world was progressing to the extent of two high schools in fifty years, but they were in the minority. Others, the champions of youth, took up the torch. At a meeting of the Board of Education held November 20, 1933, it was decided to take the necessary, preliminary steps to secure a loan and grant from the Federal Government for the purpose of erecting a new high school building.

After the appointment on November 23, 1933, of A. W. E. Schoenberg as Architect and Carl W. Clark as Consultant Architect, plans and specifications were drawn. These included many modern devices, and conveniences, the lack of which in the old building was one of the reasons for its destruction.

With the preliminary plans and sketches complete, a motion was made at the meeting of the Board of Education held June 4, 1934, that on June 25, a special district meeting be held to submit the question to the public for their authorization. At this time the qualified voters of the school district authorized the Board of Education to proceed with the new high school project by a vote of 1423 to 528. The application made to the Federal Government for funds both as a grant and in a loan was accepted by the Public Works Administration. On October 11, 1934, the United States Government entered into a contract with the Olean Board of Education agreeing to aid in the financial end of the project.

School was discontinued in the old building at the end of the first semester in January 1935 and High School classes opened in the high school gymnasium and in Schools Five, Six and Ten.

Early in February of 1935 the General Material and Wrecking Company in charge of Samuel Sogg, president, commenced the razing of the building so well known to residents of Olean and vicinity.

For two months the sounds of men busy with the work of abolishing the old to make way for the new could be heard. The building took on a skeletonized appearance. Rooms disappeared and the halls became crowded with old equipment and rubbish. Finally there were no more walls. The walls of the old building were demolished brick by brick. Then at last, there was no more of the old structure which had made its first appearance in 1880. In March the task of razing the old building was completed.

From March to June of 1935 was a very busy time for the members of the Board of Education, the architect and his aids. When plans were completed and approved by the State Engineer and the Board of Regents the Board of Education advertised for

bids. Early in June the contracts were let. The General Contract was awarded E. L. Van Sickel & Company of Bradford, Pennsylvania. The electrical contract was awarded to the Robertson Electrical Construction Company of Buffalo. The heating, plumbing and ventilation contracts were given Chatfield and Sharp Contractors' Corporation of Jamestown, New York. In all cases the contracts were awarded to the lowest bidders. These were signed on June 7, 1935.

Soon the large excavation occasioned by the razing of the old building took on the appearance of a bee hive. Large wooden forms were erected to hold the concrete for the foundations of the building. Trucks buzzed to and fro from one place to another, all carrying supplies needed in the business of construction.

Next, huge beams of steel made their appearance and as they reared their sleek black length the shape of the building became apparent. In September, classes were again held in the gym and in the other centers, but the queerness of this had worn off in the preceeding term and only those at the gym can appreciate the final completion of the steel work.

An interesting event occurred November 20, 1935. This was the laying of the corner stone. To the tunes of the Olean High School Band and in an atmosphere of good feeling and fellowship, with bunting flying in the cold winter wind, the corner stone was laid. The address of the occasion was given by Mr. A. N. Van Vlack, engineer, acting for the state director of the Public Works Administration. Contained in the corner stone were: a roster of school teachers then employed in the system, an Olean Times-Herald Anniversary, the 1935 Olean High School "Congress" along with a few coins.

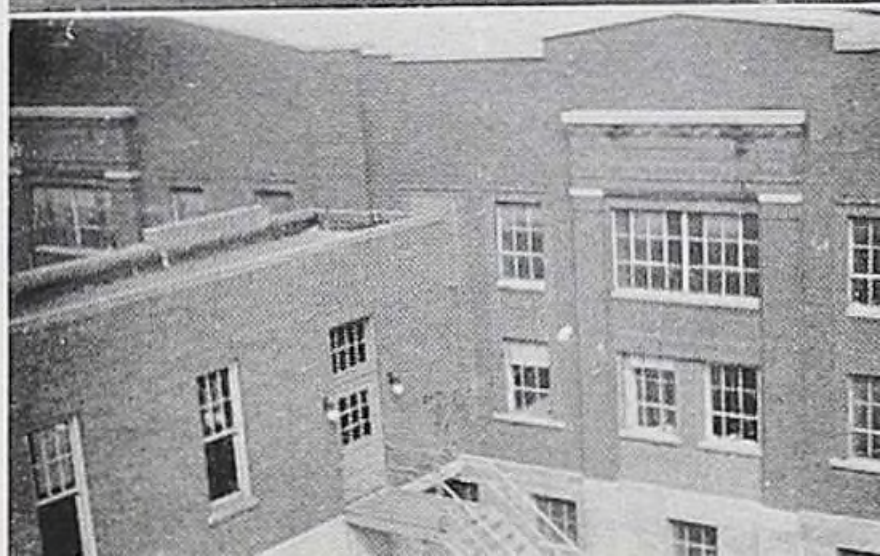
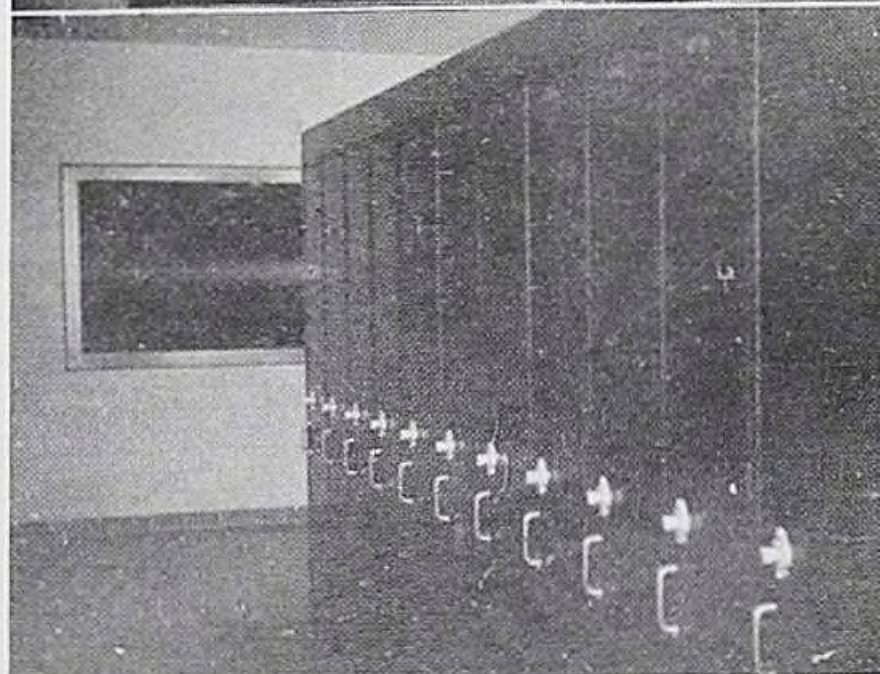
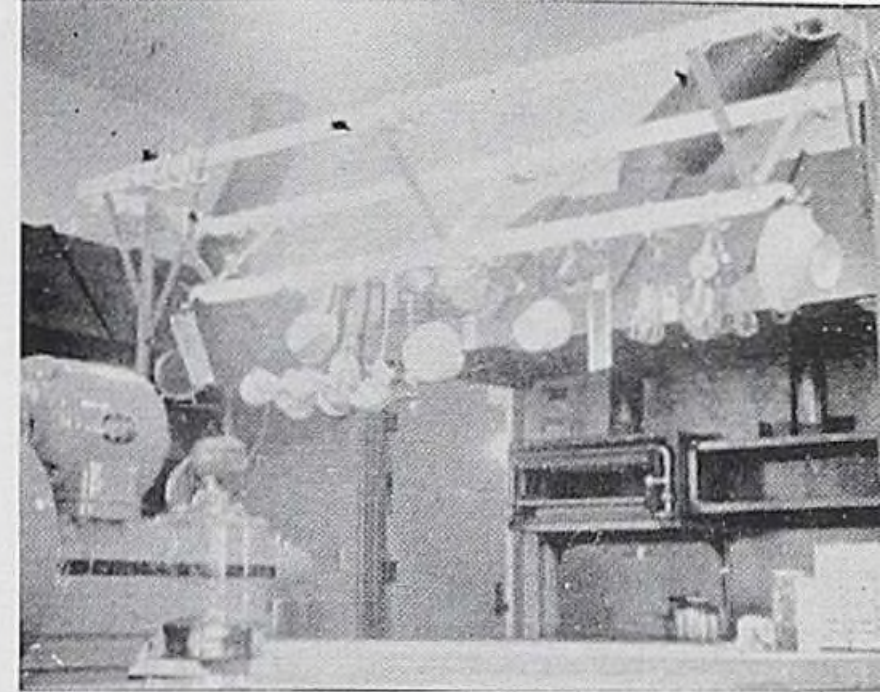
Bricks made their appearance. The structure lost its look of emptiness and began to look like a building. Solid and massive and giving a feeling of strength were the huge columns of stone. Finally the exterior was complete and the first lap was concluded.

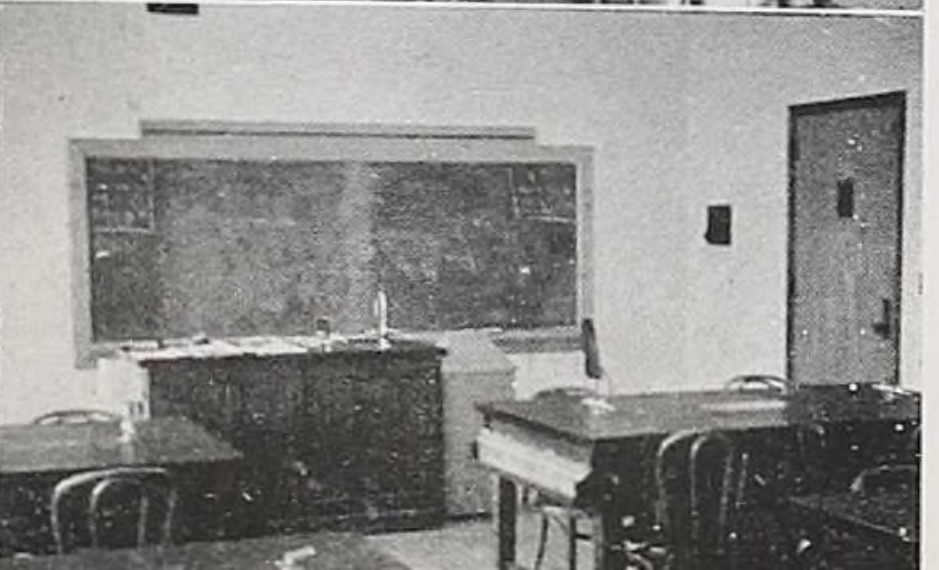
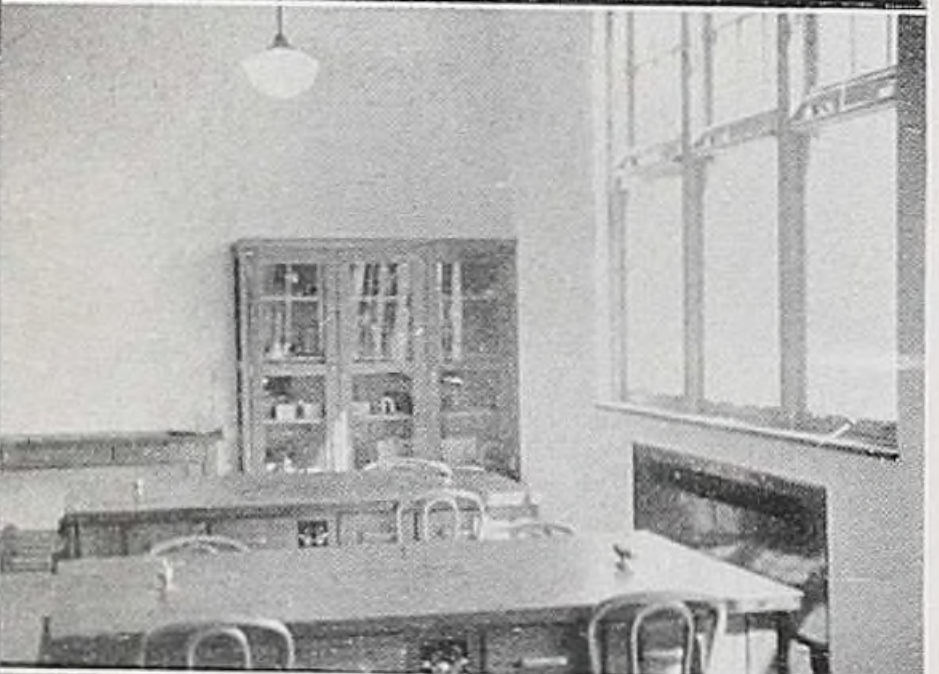
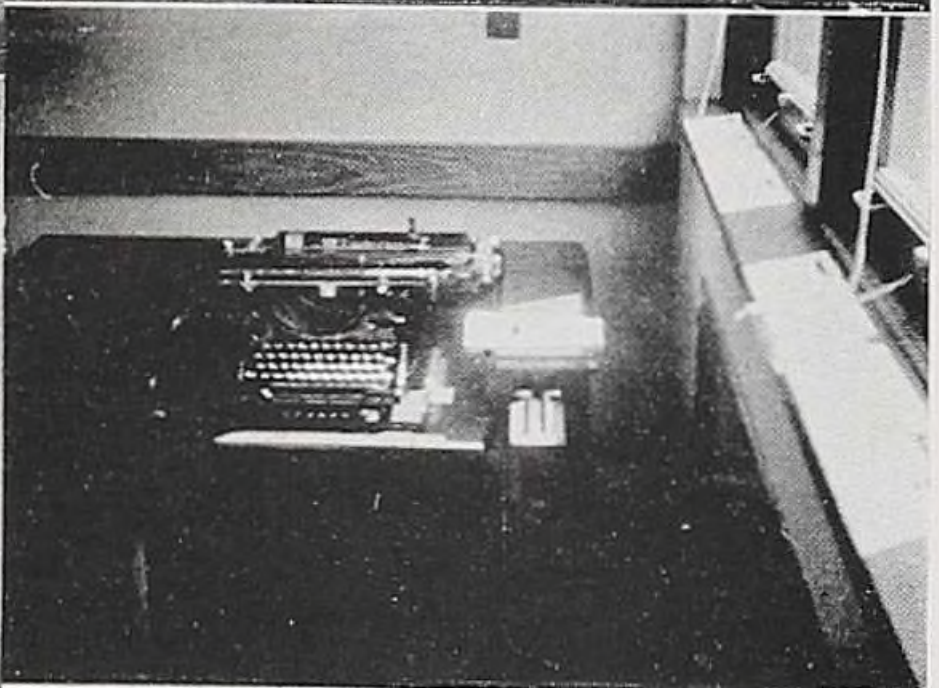
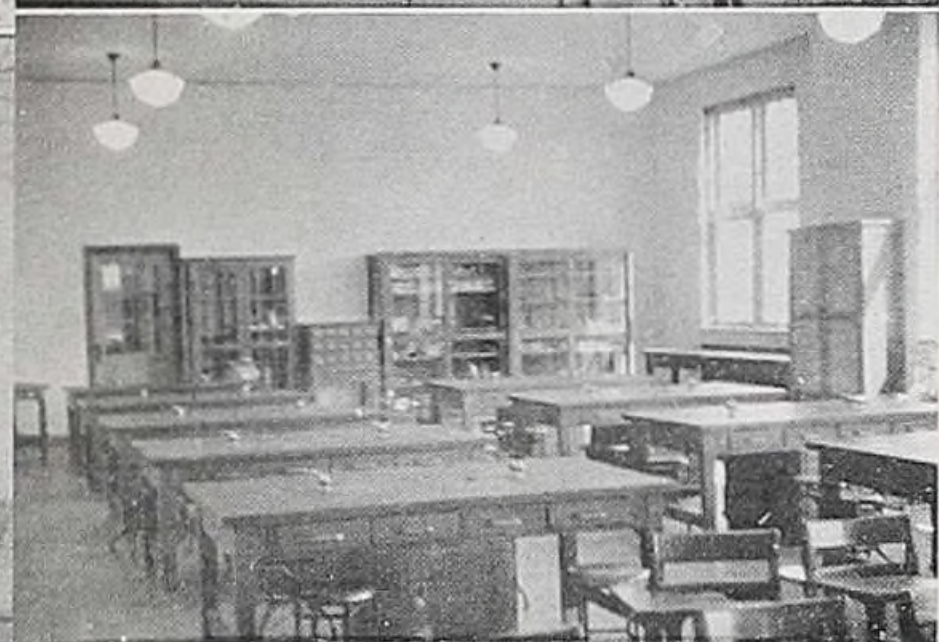
The second lap began. Day by day many trucks arrived and departed, coming loaded with supplies and swept clean of their cargo.

The interior was now in form. Rooms took shape, halls were tiled, walls smoothed and electrical equipment installed. After nineteen months of hard work and serious effort on the part of the Board of Education and those working with them, the building was substantially complete and was ready for conditional occupancy.

On January 25, 1937, the building was accepted conditionally on the grounds of substantial completion and classes met within the building for the first time on January 27 after just two years in temporary quarters.

The Dedication Ceremonies were held on Washington's birthday, February 22, 1937.





Beginning at ten o'clock in the morning, the beautiful edifice was open to the inspection of the general public and for twelve hours thousands of people walked through the portals of the new and modern Olean High School building. They were amazed at the very modern conveniences which the student ushers pointed out to them.

The formal dedication exercises were opened in the evening with an Invocation by the Rev. A. Frank Houser. This was followed by two numbers given by the Girl's Glee Club, after which Mr. William C. Greenawalt, Superintendent of Schools, gave the address of welcome. "Spiritual Values" was the subject discussed by the Very Rev. Thomas Plassman, President of Saint Bonaventure College. Following this Mr. Herbert L. Sackett, the Principal of Olean High School, gave a brief talk in retrospect and discussed the future of the school. Following Arthur J. Benline's address on the task of the Public Works Administration Mr. C. Pascal Franchot gave the main talk of the evening speaking on "A Community's Responsibility". At the conclusion of Mr. Franchot's speech Mr. A. L. Fremming representing E. L. Van Sickel, general contractor, presented the keys of the building to the architect who in turn presented them to Dr. Donald A. MacDuffie, President of the Board of Education who made the Dedicatory Address. The exercises were concluded with a Benediction by the Very Rev. Joseph Groves.

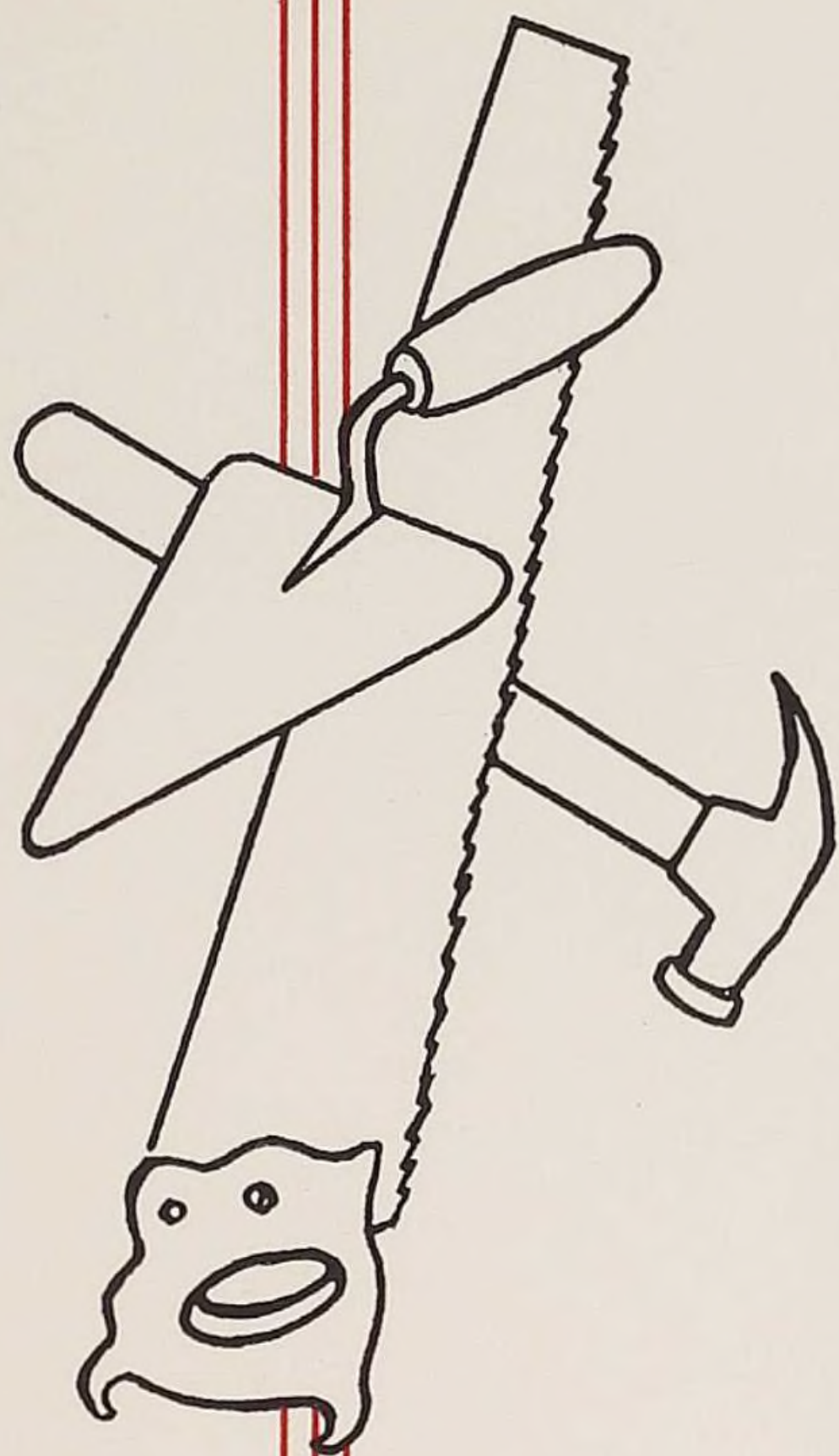
Within the walls may be found the most modern auditorium in Western New York. The chemistry, physics, and biology laboratories are the most modern to be found in any high school giving students complete experimental practice. The cafeteria is well lighted, large and capable of holding three hundred persons at a time. A model apartment is a feature of the homemaking department. The library, a symphony in gray, is a room beautiful to behold; and the art room also done in gray gives art students an exceptional place to find inspiration.

Other features include a standard electric time clock system, a complete inter communicating telephone system and a radio speaker system with receivers for every room over which the principal makes daily homeroom announcements.

To the west of the old industrial arts building, an addition completed before the rest of the new building, is the New Industrial Arts Division. In this unit consisting of old and new is the Machine Shop, the Wood Shop and the Mechanical Drawing room. There are class rooms on the second floor of the new building.

The New High School with its three large units, the High School proper, the Gymnasium and the Industrial Arts Building, all connected presents an imposing appearance.

This building stands on Sullivan Hill a symbol of man's achievement and an evidence of a task well and efficiently done.

A MESSAGE TO SENIORS

The request for another Year Book "Message to Seniors" brings to me a period of retrospect and of sobering reflection. Another class going out from the Olean High School, and whither?

"Will we be successful?" "Will we be happy?" you jubilantly and confidently ask. "I think so". "I hope so",—I can only reply,—and to myself, I add, "I only wish I knew". For these are troubled days into which you are graduating,—days of strange confusions and perplexities, when society seems devoted to upsetting all its standards of yesterday and when civilization seems madly bent upon undoing itself.

"What is the best resource for such an era?", you ask. "A poised and open mind", I would reply,—a mind that senses the worth of that which experience has proven to be valid,—but which can unerringly discern the worth of that which, though untried, is yet based upon the correct understanding of human nature and honest appreciation of human needs".

This poised and understanding mind is the goal for which your school has striven with you in its program of open-minded enquiry into the fields of history, science, literatures, departments of vocational activities, of social relationships,—and in its opportunities for working together, of achieving results, and of testing values, under mature guidance, in your extra-curricular activities.

As members of a graduating class, you have had an unique and significant experience. It is an established fact that any biological form, deprived for a time of conditions conducive to growth, reveals a wonderful capacity for development, when suddenly confronted with more favoring conditions. Wheat, corn, or any grain, purposely reseeded under starvation conditions for a few years and then used as a seed crop under more favorable conditions of moisture, soil, and climate, will produce a marvellous harvest.

You, who have continued for one-half of your normal school life under conditions of near-starvation of school spirit and growth in fellowship, are now confronted by all conditions advantageous to fullest and richest form of self and of group expression. Yours has been the happy privilege of releasing, during your last semester of school attendance, that vigorous and virile leadership in the group life of the school for which the years of famine have so effectively prepared you and endowed you.

A school and the pupils of a school are moulded, perhaps, quite as much by its traditions, its usages, and its loyalties,—as by its class-room and its curricular programs. You have aided in originating, in establishing, and in re-founding these traditions. You have helped to give color to the symbols of a new group life for future,—even un-born generations.


More than all, you have helped, immeasurably, at this significantly formative period, to define by example a type of free-thinking, cooperative, fine spirited, high-minded student,—which it is the mission of the school to develop.

This school is fortunate, at the significant time of re-defining and of re-establishing its spiritual corner-stones, in the fine leadership which has been exercised throughout the year by your class and its official groups.

That the satisfaction of having thus served your Alma Mater and the many generations of young life that will follow, may go with you and may give you pleasure, as you leave this school, is the sincerest and most appreciative wish of your teachers.

And, as the spirit of the new building and of the re-animated and re-inspired life of the students shall be re-told and re-lived down the vista of years, then past,—yours will be the privilege of saying as did Talleyrand, at the close of a period of significant growth and renewed life of the French republic, "All of this I saw,—and a part of it, I was".

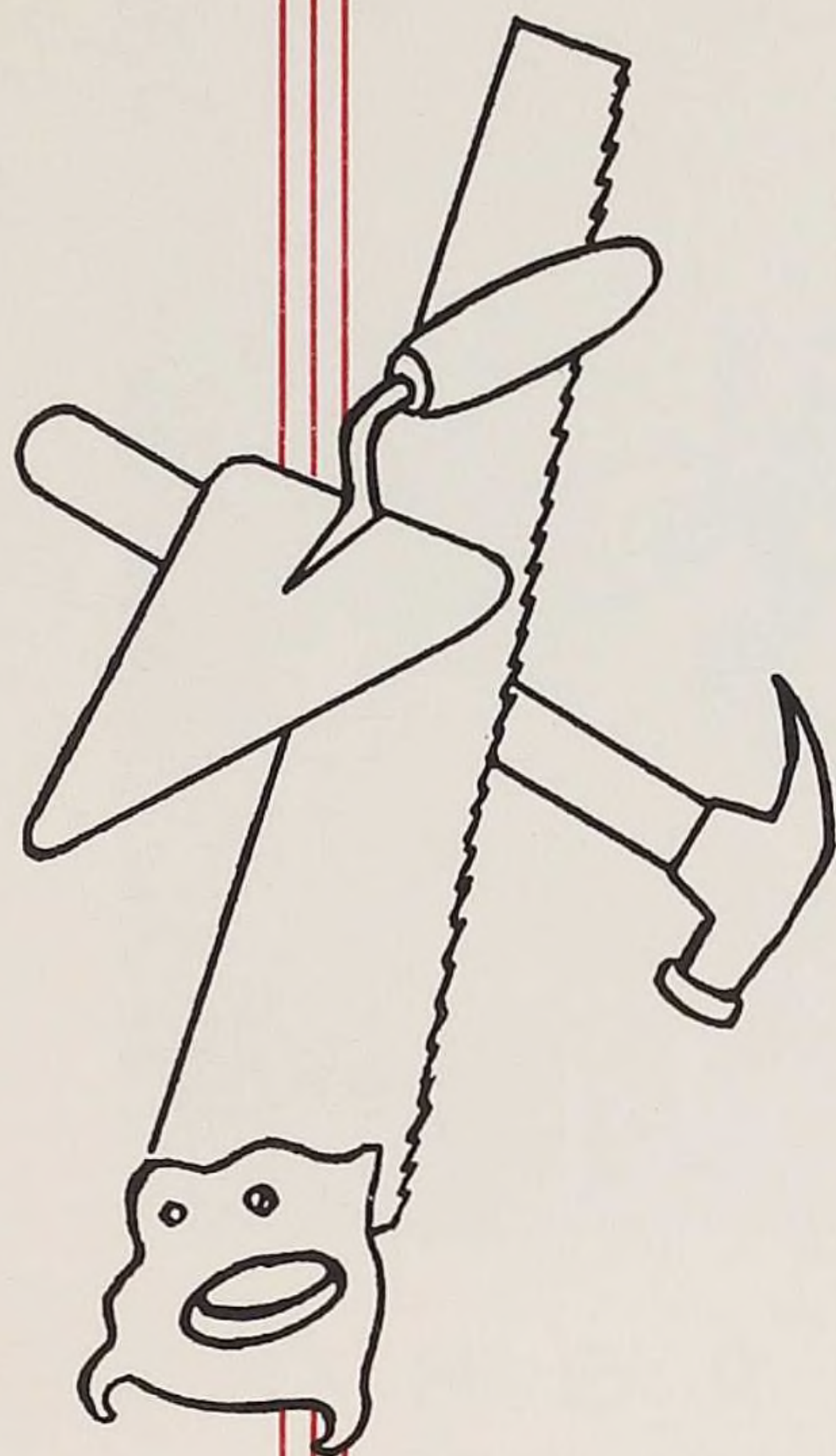
LIBRARY MEMORIES OF 1937

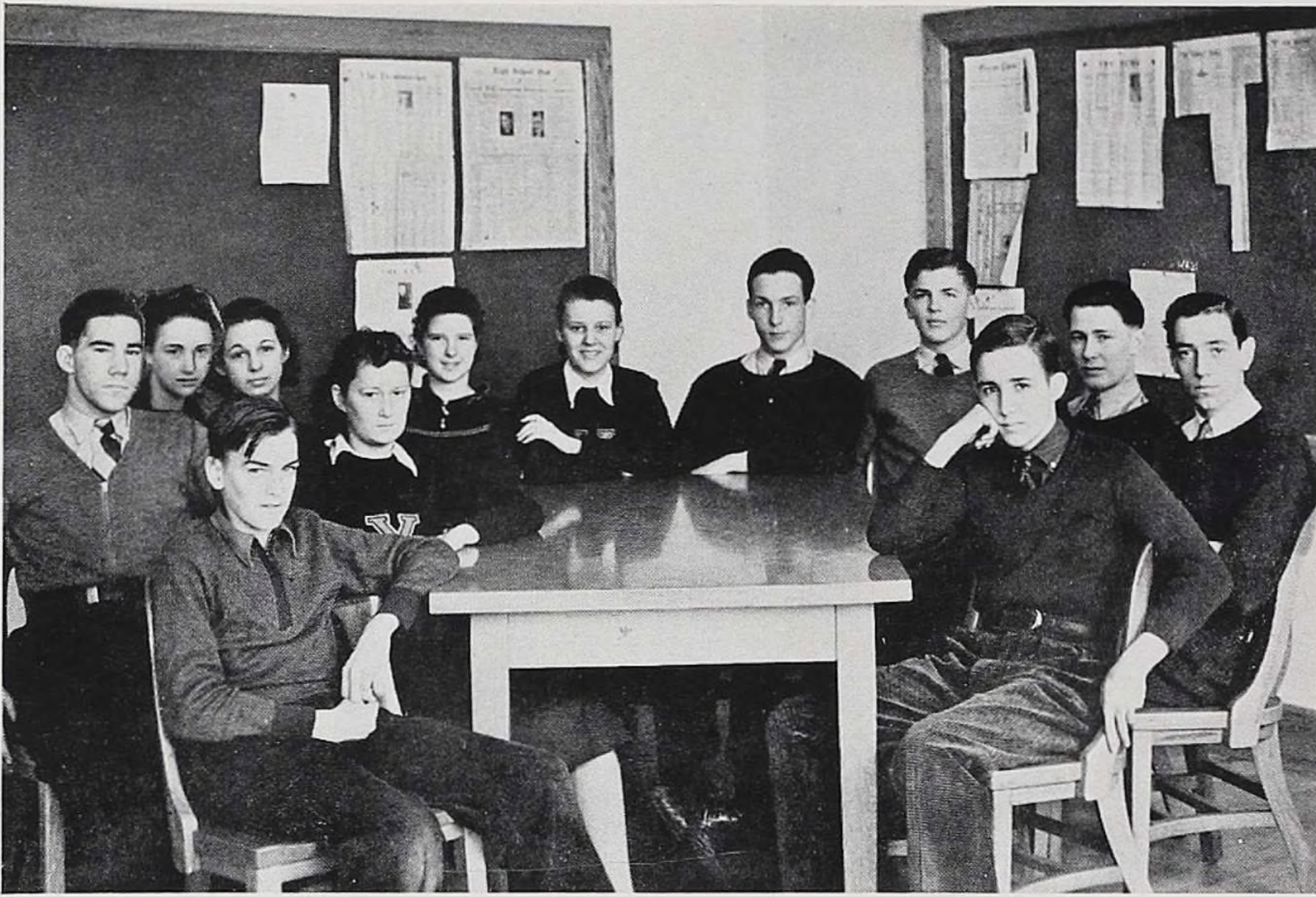

November—We sewed on coverlets for our chairs.

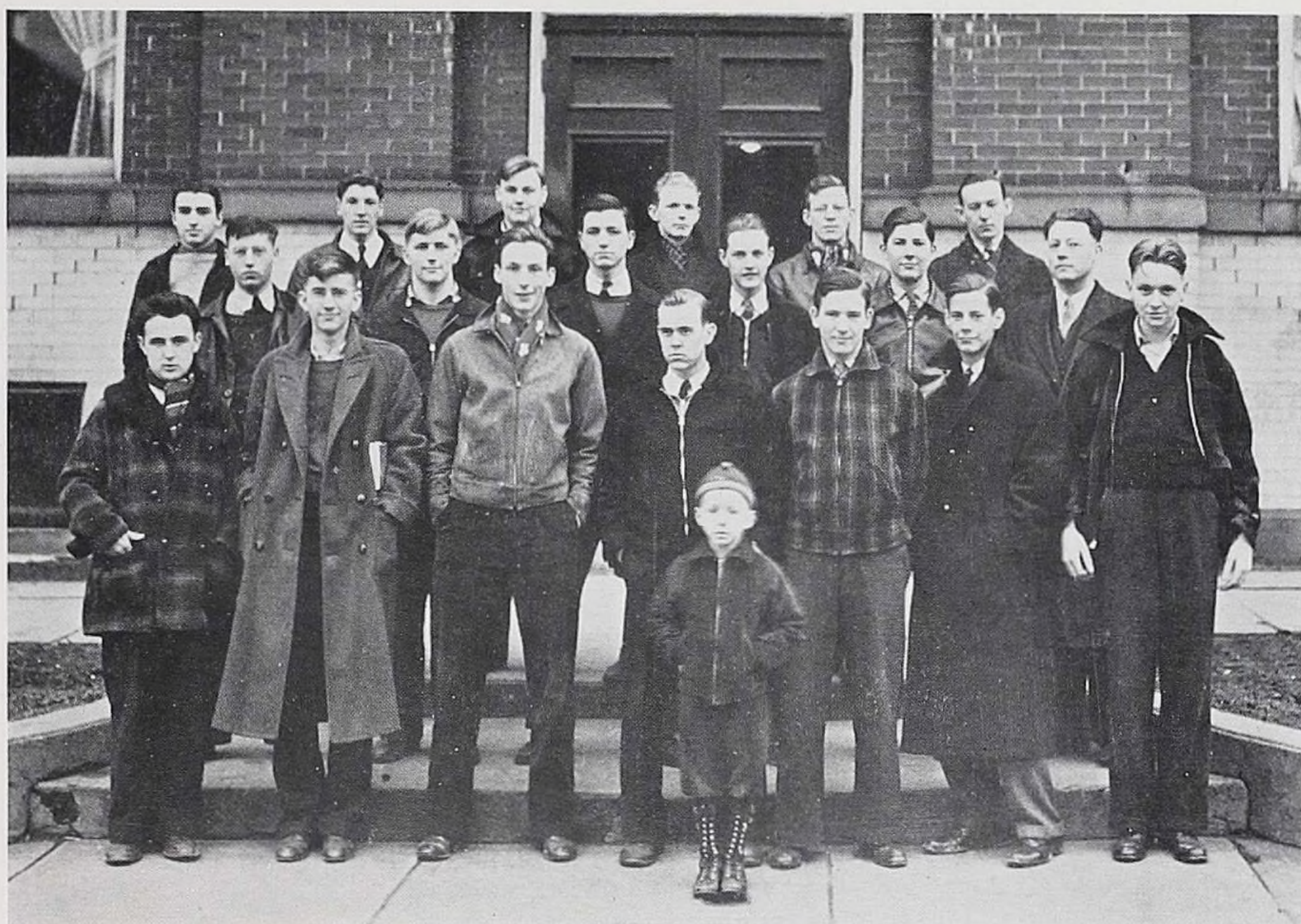

The Olean High School football team, led by Coaches "Hookey" Frey and "Norm" Utecht and co-Captains Bob Griffin and Jack Shortell, had a very successful season. The Crimson and Gold machine officially won seven and lost one.

The Red and Gold opened the season with a very decisive 40-13 victory over Falconer. No individual stood out in this game as a host of players were used.

The dazzling broken-field running of Griffin, Passerino, and Piechota enabled Olean to score a 19-0 victory over the boys from Lakewood.

By completely outplaying their opponents, the Hilltoppers hung up their third straight victory. The score was 18-0 and the victim was a plucky crew from Fredonia.

Olean journeyed to Salamanca for its first important game. With the score tied 7-7, John Piechota intercepted a pass and galloped fifty yards to a touchdown, the final gun sounding as the pass was in the air. Score Olean 13, Salamanca 7.

Despite an overwhelming majority of first downs, Olean lost a heartbreaker to Dunkirk by the score of 7-0. John Piechota and "Hank" Kubic were Olean's shining stars in a sea of mud.

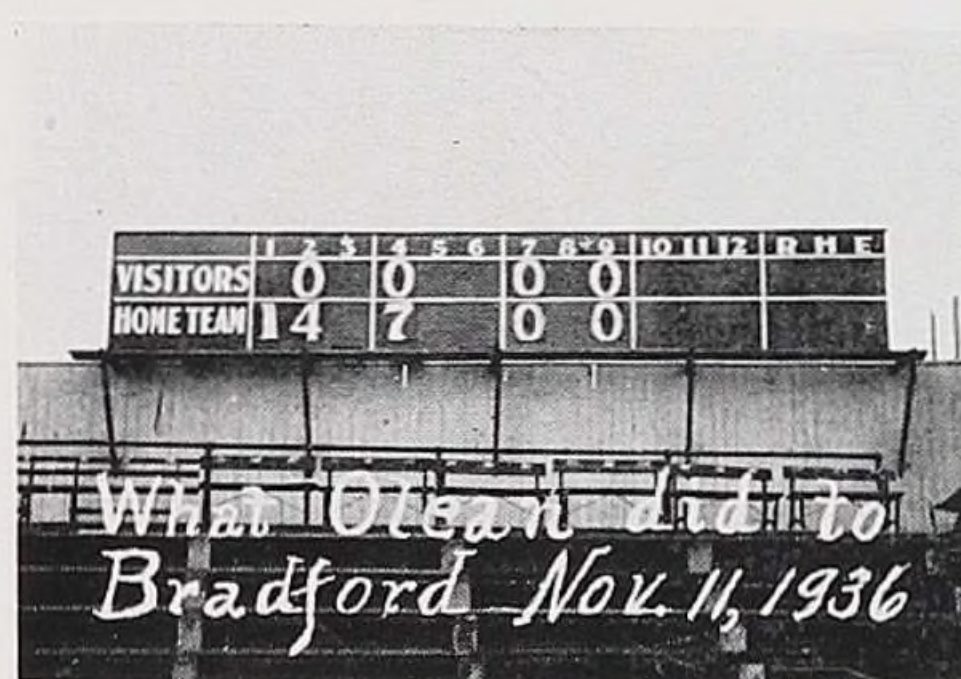
The Crimson suffered their second successive defeat at the hands of Jamestown by a score of 20-13. It was a hard fought battle all the way with Olean's line standing out against their much larger opponents. Later, however, because two ineligible Jamestown men were used, this game was forfeited to Olean.

Corning came to town with a young but aggressive team and led Olean at the half by a 7-6 count. The Yeomen came back in the second half with a smashing offense which carried them to a 25-13 win.

Before an Armistice Day crowd of five thousand, Olean, after three long years of defeat, took a 21-0 decision from a favored Bradford eleven. The aggressive Yeomen went to work soon after the opening whistle, Jack Shortell's touchdown culminating a thirty-eight yard drive. Two long runs by Bob Griffin and John Piechota completed the rout of the Pflugmen.

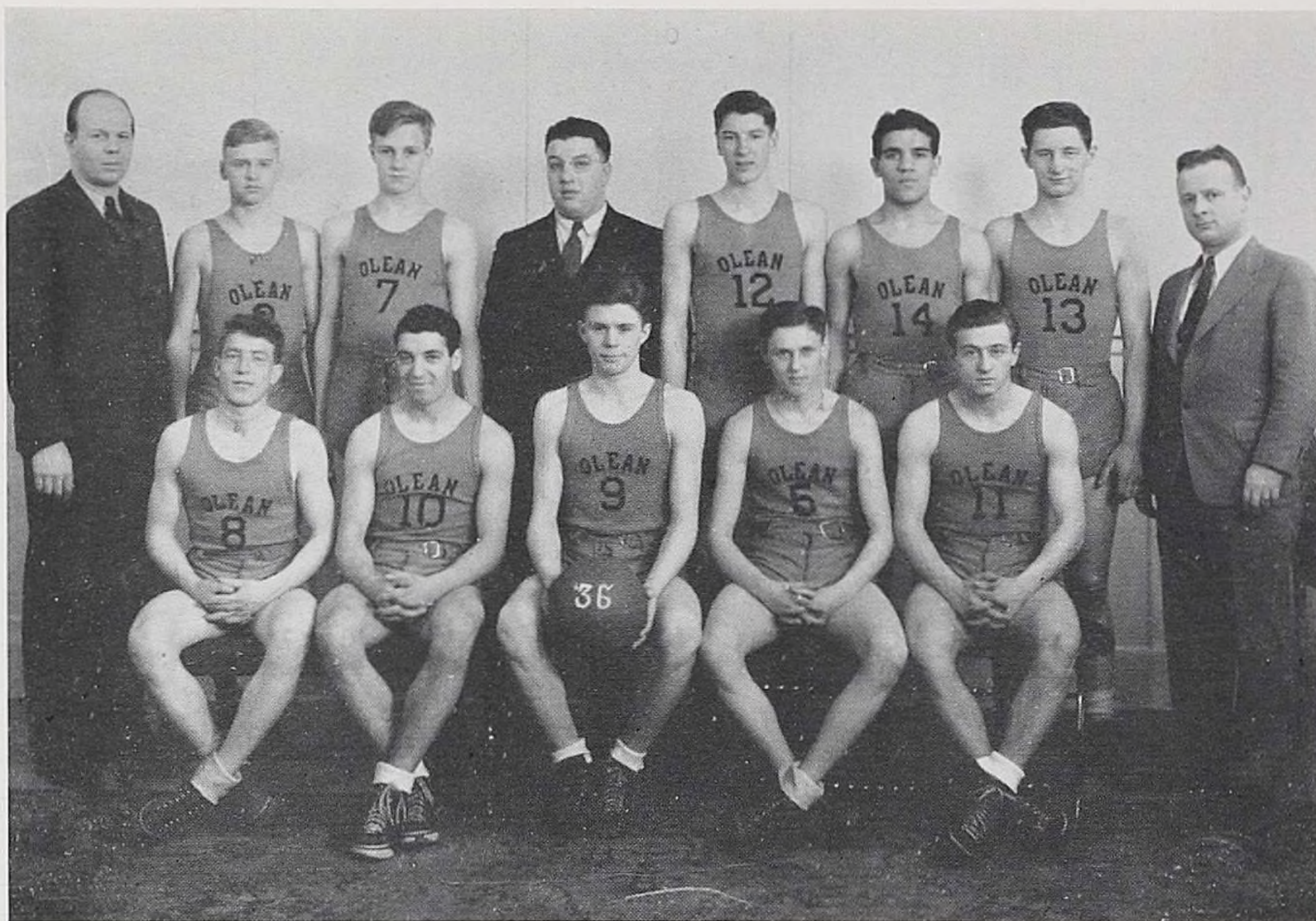

B A S K E T B A L L

The 1936-37 O. H. S. Basketball season was productive of seven victories in twelve games for the orange clad tossers of "Hookey" Frey and "Norm" Utecht. Captained by "Swede" Bergreen, the team managed to split with all teams in league play, beat Bradford one of two, and defeated Jamestown and St. Mary's in last second thrillers.

Facing Allegany and Franklinville on successive week-ends the O. H. S. cagers suffered two defeats in a row. Losing to Allegany in the last quarter 18-22 and Ten Broeck by ten points, 27-37.

"Da-Da" Shewairy's last minute foul allowed Olean to chalk up a first victory at the expense of Salamanca—Class A rivals. Score: 23-22.

Portville was defeated on the Armory court 25-16 to make victory number two. Another one point conquest was scored when "Cabby" Boberg dropped two buckets in the last minute to defeat the fast St. Mary's Deaf Mute school of Buffalo 29-28.

Victories number four and five were at the expense of Allegany and Franklinville. The former was defeated 27-16, the latter 22-13. These wins avenged the season's first two losses.

Bradford was stopped 31-21 as the Crimson Cagers succeeded in overcoming a seven game jinx and "took" the oil town club for the first time since 1933.

The next three games were recorded on the debit side of the ledger as Salamanca defeated the Freymen 34-24. Portville took their measure 26-34; and Bradford won 26-34.

Closing the season in a blaze of glory the Crimson and Gold basketeers broke another jinx as they sent the Jamestown High quintet smarting under a 24-23 decision. "Wild Bill" Kuhn sunk the winning bucket with thirteen seconds to play. Thus giving Olean their first victory over the Swedes in five games.

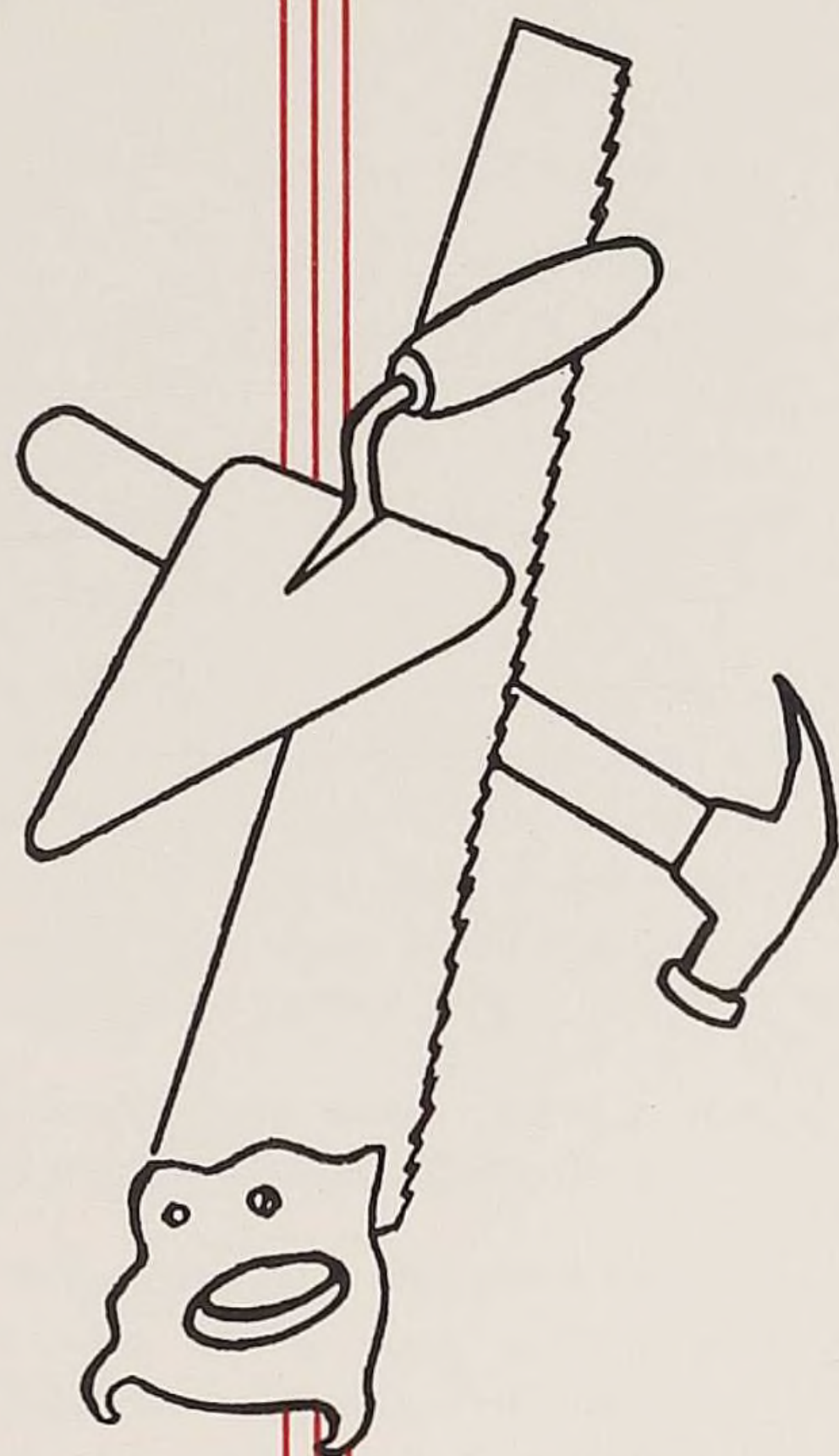

Senior pictures were a necessity.

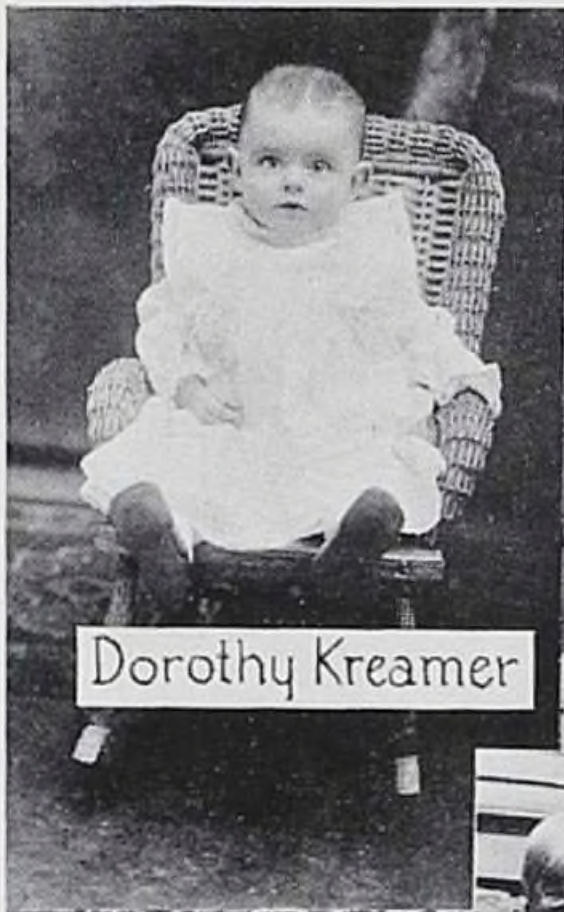

New clubs were in evidence as we went into the new school for which we had waited so long.

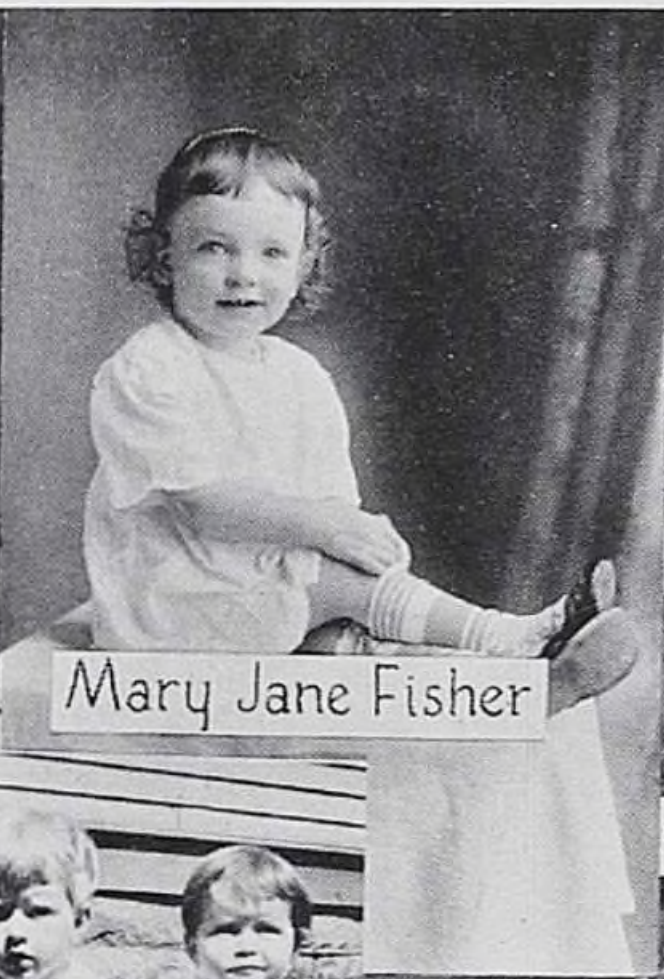
Dime dances returned to the gym and serious efforts on the part of all made them enjoyable social hours.

THE CLASS OF '37 HOLDS A PARTY

"Yes son, I can see it as clearly as if it were but yesterday. There he stood, Leon Chrzan, famous mathematics and science professor and honorary chairman of the first gathering of the Olean High School Class of 1937 since their graduation. It was June 15, 1957.

Loud applause greeted the efforts of the famous orchestra and it was several moments before order could be restored.

"In continuing the program," spoke the toastmaster, "I give you Carl Boberg, Publicity Director for Super Film Attractions, Inc., who will in turn present the cast of the play to be enacted for your pleasure." Said Mr. Boberg: "My friends I wish this afternoon to express the regrets of my employers, Williams, Weaver, Sutton and

Marshall, who were unable to be present today because of pressing business engagements. However, I wish to introduce to you the players in the season's smash television hit "Oh Say Can You See." They are, standing on my left, Marion Bolender, Audrey Fremming, Phyllis Kennedy, Marie Wagner and Howard Barnes and on my right Virginia Darlington, Clifton Phillips, Edward Stady, Doris McCormack and Jane Klein. For the next few minutes please give them your attention." When the players had finished their splendid enactment of the thrilling third act of their dramatic masterpiece loud measures of applause could be heard. When this was somewhat subsided the announcement was made that adjournment to the banquet hall was the next in line of the day's procedure.

At dinner in the Hotel William Driscoll many delightful delicacies were served under the expert supervision of professional hostesses Angeline Fusco, Dorothy Johnson, Dorothy Kreamer and Helen Waskow. While carefree eating was in progress Paul Smith, officer of the Navy, and George Hildebrandt, his bosom friend and successful financier, related many interesting yarns. Bill Yehl and Donald Walker, co-pilots of the New York to London Air Express; Clara Sprague, Comedienne; Dolores Reazs and Betty Scheiterle, successful novelists; entertained their nearby friends with tales of rare spice and humor.

With supper concluded our ranks were swelled by the addition of several prominent professional athletes who had hurried over from the annual dinner of "The Sportsman and his Wife" which, unfortunately for them had been held on the same day. These included Jack Shortell, Stan Chrzan, Edward Conley and Jay Worth, football notables, Bob Halliday, disciple of Izaak Walton, Francis Piechota, archer extraordinary, Dorothy Sain and Eva Punk, girl soccer stars and Wallace Senyk, basketball luminary.

At the ball held in the evening the splendid dancing of John Levett was the envy of all and the new step invented by Evelyn Morris had every one guessing. Mary Jane Fisher and Marjorie Curtis also came forward with a new innovation which involved two couples.

Much favorable comment was given to the committee in charge of the decorations at the conclusion of the opening ceremonies. Included in this committee were Caryl Harris and Gretchen Kautz, interior decorators, Sara Jane Metler, one of the outstanding dress designers of the day and Marianne Landsheft, the winner of the New York to Los Angeles auto race.

As the last event of an eventful day the queen was chosen to be Charlotte Yahn because of her winning ways. With the crown on her head and escorted by Beatrice Carver and Charles Anderson she made her way through the huge "O" at the end of the dance floor. Inscribed on the letter were the words, "Next Meeting in Ten Years, Be Sure to Come."

Yes, son, that was a mighty fine party, and the people who renewed old acquaintances there returned to their homes happier and with a better outlook on life, because of the successes of their friends."

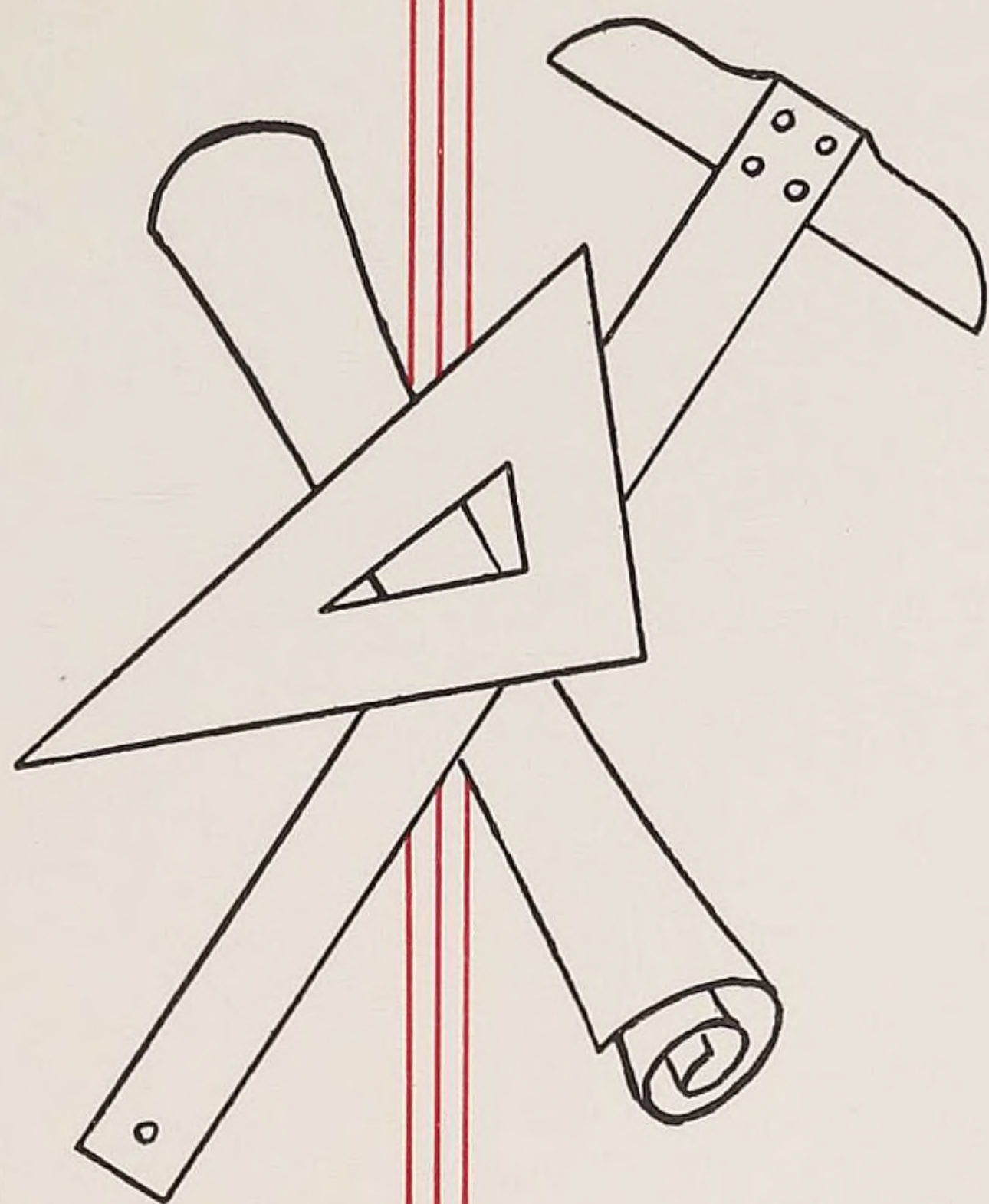

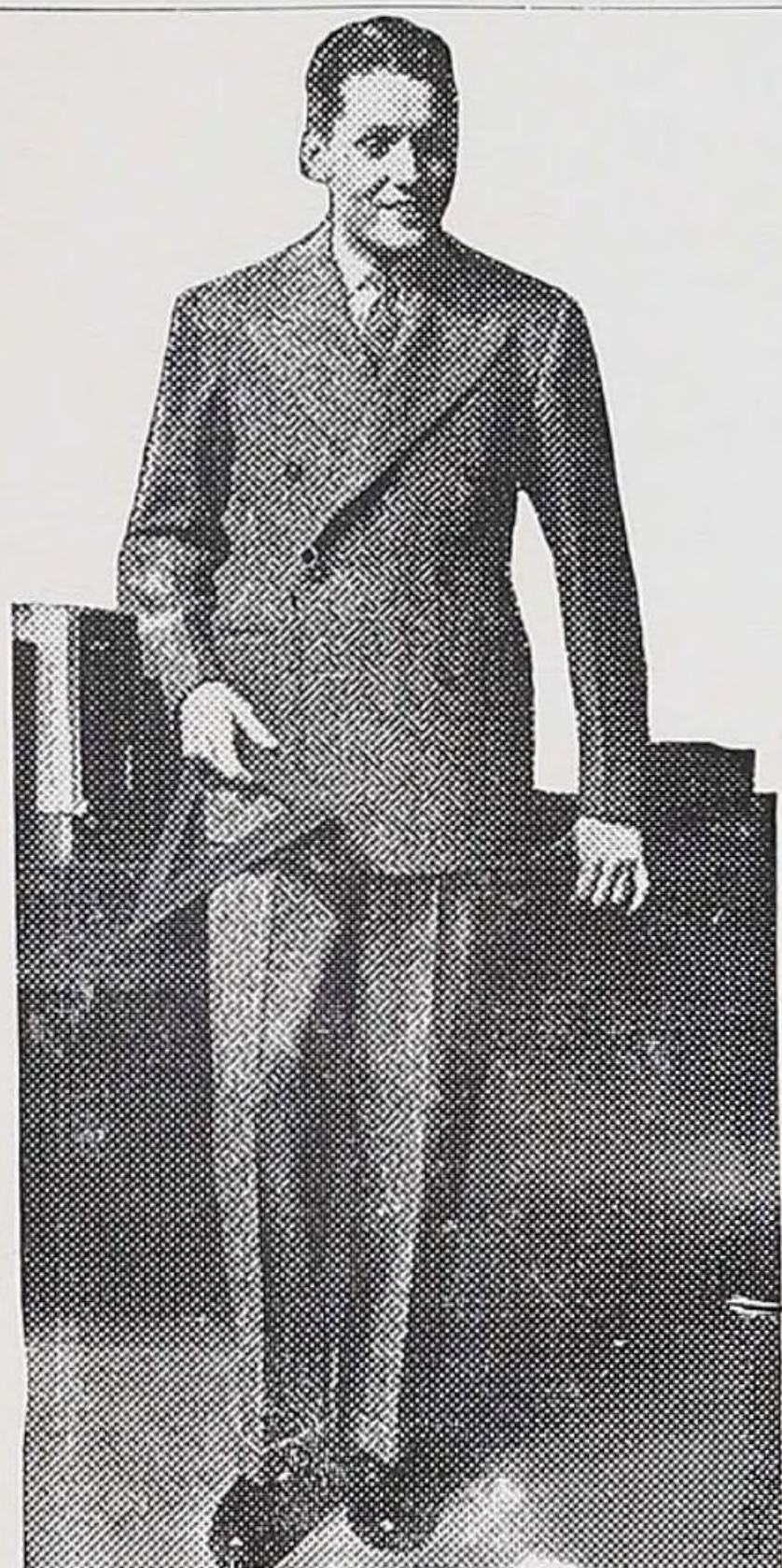

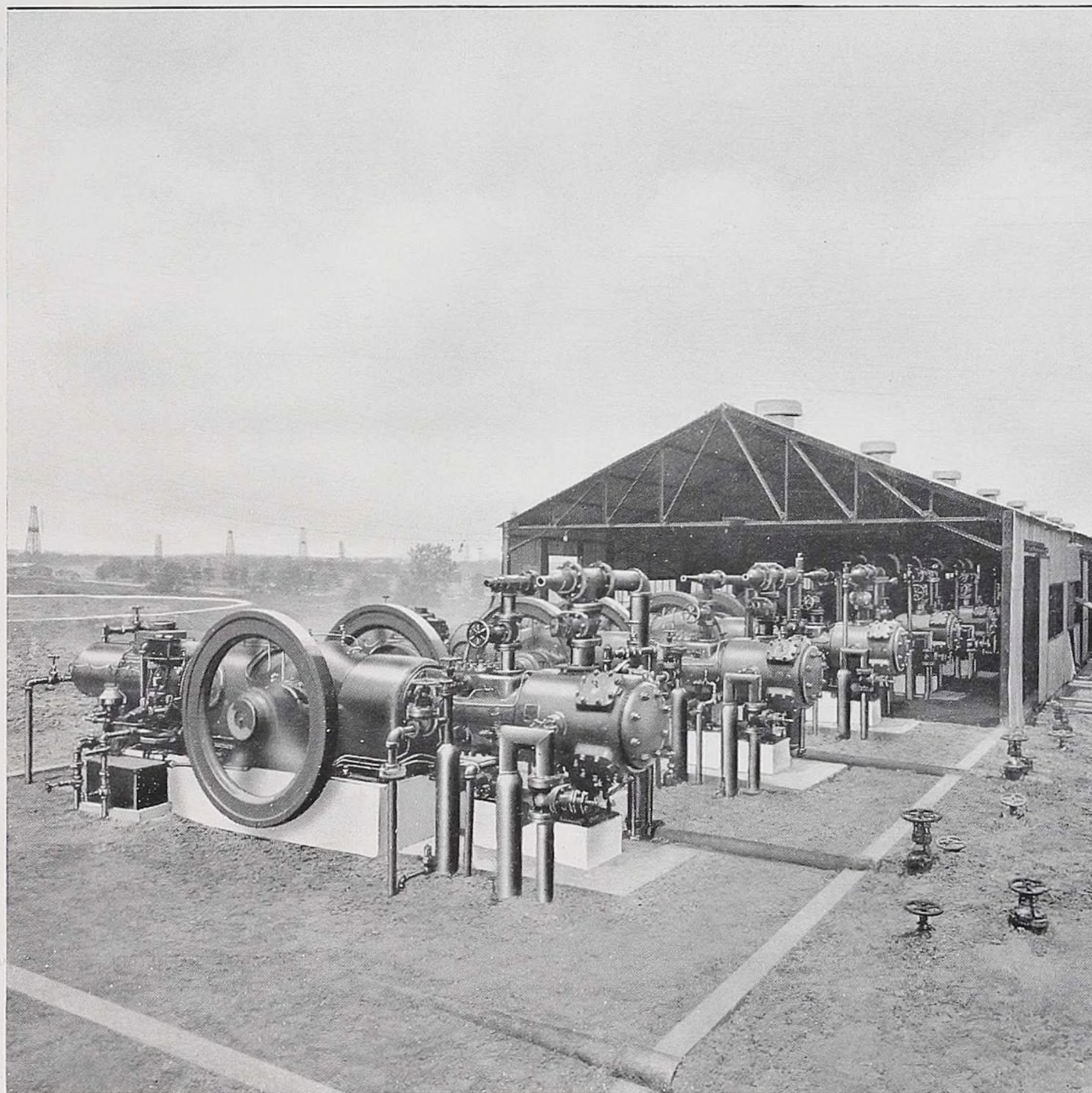
