Dedication


IN THE past hundred years, many teachers have devoted the best years of their lives to the Olean Public Schools. They have given far more than a tangible return could have remunerated them.

Foreword

THE YEARS of 1945 and 1946 will be recorded as the most important in human history.

This yearbook is a record of Olean High School in the year of 1945-1946. These events are not important in any national or international sense; rather, they are important because they represent another year in the lives of every student in this school.

The theme of this year's "Congress" is Olean High School throughout the years, honoring the generations of students in which Olean High stands personified.

Olean High School looks back with pride; it looks forward with confidence.

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Olean Schools A History

N THE handsome marble wall of the foyer in Olean High School is fastened a bronze plaque stating, "This property was donated in 1852 for school purposes by Ansel Adams." Perhaps a few of the students who hurry by it every day have noticed it; perhaps some have paused to wonder at the paradoxical situation it suggests: They are standing in a building constructed within their lifetime, but on a plot of land dedicated for that very purpose almost a century before. Yet

such is the case, for the first Olean Academy, the forerunner of our High School, was built on the very same spot a decade before the Civil War.

The idea of erecting an academy for "higher" education was conceived early in the year 1851 by a group of the leading citizens of Olean. Professional men, business men, and men of God, they had a common pride in the town of Olean, and an honest desire to present their children with an opportunity for a more finished education. The most immediate problem to be surmounted in this plan was the lack of funds to erect an adequate building. The men decided that entering upon the project as a business venture afforded the best chance of success; so a meeting was accordingly held, and the Olean Academy Association was formed to raise the necessary money. The spectacle of these men devoting their time and financial support so unselfishly to such a community undertaking was gratifying to say the least; but it was not surprising, for the people of Olean had always con-

sidered the education of their children important.



OLD OLEAN HIGH SCHOOL


Perhaps it is significant that the early records of the Holland Land Company show that at the time of the purchase of the land of Cattaraugus County, in 1803, promise was given to aid education. At any rate, 1810 saw the first school established in the section now known as Pleasant Valley, a scant seven years after the first settler of Olean had built his home. Nine years later school was being taught in Olean proper, in a log cabin on South

Barry Street; and in 1822 a frame schoolhouse was erected by Seth Simmons and his son Ephrian, approximately on the location of the present School No. 3.

In actuality, little is known about these early schools of Olean; certainly no comparison can be drawn between these schools of over a century ago, and the ones of today. The former were drab, cheerless, lacking in light and comfort; representing, perhaps, more the spirit of education than its development. The subects were as rudimentary as the facilities, reading, figuring, and writing being the staple ones. As different to us was the schoolmaster, or schoolmarm, as the case may have been, who as members of a learned although alien profession, enjoyed a unique position in


the community. One of their prerogatives was the privilege of boarding at the homes of the students, compensating for their board by helping with the tasks about the house, and by extra tutoring of the children.

The school slowly grew; by 1846 it numbered almost one hundred students and teachers. With the passage of time came the change from the one-man ruler of the schoolhouse, to a staff of teachers. The school-house itself progressed from the rude log cabin to a fine two-story building, put up in 1851


on the same spot as the first frame school twenty-nine years before. This growth was no quick mutation; it was the culmination of slow evolution, keeping pace with the growth of Olean itself.

Olean had indeed grown; in 1851 the population was numbered on the larger side of 900. The Erie railroad had recently been completed to Olean; local manufacturing was established; and the construction of the long awaited Genesee Valley Canal was to be undertaken. The town was ready for its next step in education—the Olean Academy.

The money which the Association had set out to raise was secured without difficulty. Con-

struction was begun, and the building was completed in 1852, after which Professor J. A. Woodruff assumed office as the first principal. But neither he, nor anyone else present at the opening of the new building, had any vision of what fate had in store for the product of their work and hopes. Three years later the building burned to the ground.

Again the citizens of Olean banded together, this time to rebuild their school. A temporary building was immediately constructed; but because of fi-

nancial embarrassment work was not begun on the permanent building until a few years later. The school was completed in 1858, with Fayette Royce as principal.


The school itself was situated on a prominence overlooking the city, and only a few minutes ride from the railroad track, as an early Academy Bulletin expressed it. While the location is perhaps familiar, the curriculum was certainly alien to a student of today. Such beguiling subjects as Metaphysics, Ethics, Orthography, Rhetoric, Astronomy, and Intellectual Arithmetic were among those subjects pursued by the scholars of the Academy. Since the institution was privately owned,

tuition was also paid; the sum of fifteen dollars was the cost of the entire three-year course.

The history of the Olean Public Schools actually began in the year 1864, with the establishment of Olean Union Free School District No. 1. Four years after the District was organized it purchased the Olean Academy; and in 1880 funds were voted to construct a new building. This was to form the central portion of the "old" high school which was demolished in 1935.


The year 1882 marked the beginning of a rapid growth for the school system, due probably to the influx of people into Olean, attracted by the oil and other industries springing up here at that time. That year the trustees of the School District No. I first employed a Superintendent of Schools, and a building program was undertaken. A four-room frame school replaced the former School No. 2 on the corner of West State and South Eleventh Streets; and a two-room building designated as School No. 4 was erected at Chestnut and Bishop.

In 1886 a brick building was constructed to replace the frame school formerly located at State and North Barry Streets, and was called School No. 3; however, this new edifice burned a few years later, and the present School No. 3 was built in 1896. School No. 6 was erected in 1888, on the corner of Reed and North Tenth.

It is easy to trace the expansion of Olean by the corresponding exent of its grade school

system. The year 1907 seemed to inaugurate another building program, this time for the accommodation of the children in the outlying portions of Olean. School No. 4, in East Olean, was sold and a new building was consequently constructed on the corner of King and Railroad Avenue. At the same time, a small building was put up on School Street in Boardmanville, to serve as School No. 5.


Prior to 1907, North Olean had maintained a separate school district, District No. 3, but in June

of that year District No. I annexed the former; and as a result two new schools were built in that section. School No. 7 was located on the corner of North Union and West Forest, while School No. 8 was put up on Homer Street.

In 1909, District No. I was again enlarged to include a section lying south of the Allegheny River, and the first School No. 9 was built on South Union Street in that year. A site was also purchased on the corner of West Henley and South Fourth to erect a School No. 10.



The High School enlarged as rapidly as the grade schools. In 1892 it was found necessary to build a West wing, and an East wing was completed in 1896. This latter addition made possible what is believed to be the first Junior High School in the country. Known for many years as School No. 1, this was finally discontinued in 1910 because of lack of room in the High School building.

Perhaps more important, however, were the additions made to the curriculum of both the High


and Grade schools. In 1883 drawing and penmanship began while Music was added in 1889. Industrial Arts was introduced in the grades in 1888; free text books for the grades were first used in 1894; 1904 saw Manual Training inaugurated; and Domestic Science was offered to girls of grade school age in 1905. Art courses were introduced into the High School in 1908; the next year a Commercial Department was added. Medical inspection, however, was not started until 1915, the same year that a library was established in the

High School. One year later Physical Education became a part of the students' daily routine.

With 1917 came what could be aptly entitled the first chapter of the Olean Schools' "War History." As early as 1914, the students had contributed to the Belgian Relief, both by raising funds and by making bandages; now they continued the work for the Red Cross. Under the guidance of Mr. Sackett, then in his first year as principal, the students of the High School raised \$400 to buy


Liberty Bonds for the High School; while in 1918 the Seniors contributed the receipts from their play, amounting to \$622, to the Red Cross.

Following the war, the Board of Education again undertook a series of rennovations in the school buildings. A new addition was made on School No. 4 in 1922; and the next year the present School No. 5 building was completed. In 1924, the existing School No. 9 building was erected in Seneca Heights.

Since the old School No. I had been discontinued, a new one was built in 1925 on the corner of West Sullivan and North Sixth Streets, a site formerly occupied by St. Mary's Academy. The last grade school in the Olean system was School No. II, erected three years later on West State Street to facilitate the education of the children in that area.


For a number of years, Olean had felt the need for a new High School, and now the inade-

quacies and age of the old building made the need acute. Therefore, in conjunction with the Federal program for the construction of High and Central Schools throughout the country, the existing High School was razed in 1935, and work was started on project No. 6318, destined to become Olean High School. The million dollar building was completed in 1936. It now insures the best educational opportunities for the future citizens of Olean.




OUTSIDE THE LOG SCHOOL-HOUSE, 1842 JOSIAH TRACY HOLLIS HUMPHREY



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

A clarinet quartet played for the P.T.A. and a small band, directed by Mr. Grant, has furnished music for assemblies.


From the Orchestra has come a string ensemble which has appeared on several programs.

A small Orchestra played for the Minstrel Show and Revue.


Many soloists from all of these groups have competed in the Music Festival in Fredonia, given in May. Both the Band and the Orchestra were given the highest State rating in this competition.





A REVUE - MINSTREL



STAMPS AND BONDS

THE SALE of Bonds and Stamps in Olean High School was begun on November 30, 1942, by the P.T.A. as a result of a survey held by the "Congress" staff showing that pupils would buy more stamps if they were sold at school.

In 1943 two jeeps were purchased with the help of Mrs. Callahan as saleswoman.

During the year 1944 and 1945 \$16,664.25 worth of Bonds and Stamps were sold through the undying efforts of Mrs. Anderson. Jeeps were purchased by Home Rooms 210, 216, 215, 101, and 316.

In the year 1945 and 1946 a goal of \$3,000 was set to care for a hospitalized veteran. The students of Olean High School purchased \$5,976.25 worth, a record to be proud of. Corporal Charles Martique occupies our bed in Rhodes General Hospital. Mrs. Prentiss and Mrs. Hollands had charge of the sales this year. Mrs. Sheldon had general charge of this work in all of the schools.

THE DRAMATIC CLUB






THE STAMP CLUB, newly organized this year, is composed of those students of Olean High School who are interested in stamps and stamp collecting.






OLEAN 6-DUNKIRK 13



OLEAN 17-RANDOLPH 21


The Huskies played host to Randolph for a second time. It was close all through the game, but fate held the reigns and the Huskies were on the short end.
